

When Brooks Rogers was 10 years old he bought a .58 caliber Springfield muzzle-loading rifle from a New York gunfirm.

It was a big gun for a little boy who had only shot .22s on rabbit hunts. This big gun turned out to play a big role in the life of Rogers.

Today, the 35-year-old gunsmith, who lives four miles west of Amarillo, looks back and laughs. "You could say that .58 caliber rifle really got me interested," he said.

Rogers makes sporting rifles of all calibers and sells them to individuals throughout the United States. He also does the usual small repair jobs required of a working gunsmith. His shop is located at the rear

"I've always had a .45 caliber rifle," he said.

"After I shot that .58 caliber for a couple of years, I began shooting a .45-70 Springfield and reloading my own shells," he added.

The .45-70 Springfield is the rifle General Custer's men carried to the Little Big Horn to meet Sitting Bull. Custer's defeat has been blamed on a lot of things, but it has never been blamed on the performance of the .45-70 cartridge.

Rogers said the large rifle cartridge is capable of knocking down any game on the North American continent. During almost 20 years of experience, he should know.

His latest shooting with the 45-70 has centered on prairie dogs.

Rogers said his specialty in gunsmithing is rebarreling.

This means that he takes some type of rifle action-military, sporting or even single shot- and converts it through rebarreling and rechambering into a more desirable caliber. He has built high-powered rifles in calibers from .22 to

.45. Rogers is presently working on a .50 caliber rifle.

Rogers began gunsmithing on a part-time basis about 10 years ago. "I just tinkered around working on guns," he

said. "I decided to take it serious-" he added. ly,

He went to Trinidad Junior College - which offers gunsmithing course - and

crack. Rogers said his favorite gun

" is an accurate one."

Though he refuses to make the flat statement that the .45 caliber remains his favorite, he is still obviously partial to the gun.

Rogers still owns- and shoots - the 1873 Model Springfield that got him started. He has three or four .45 caliber rifles that he shoots regularly. ularly.

He walked out on the range near his shop and pulled a shell out of his pocket.

The .45-70 cartridge almost always impresses the un-initiated. It looks like a short, fat cigar when it is held in the hand.

When it is shoved into the chamber of a rifle, it looks

"These guns don't really kick," Rogers said. "You know, you can load

these cartridges to shoot just about like you want them to. They can be mild or they can be loaded to stop elk or bear."

Rogers said he thinks the .50-110 rifle he is currently building will impress most gun nuts. He said it will shoot a 500-grain bullet ( a bullet that weighs more than three bullets from the average deer rifle) faster than the .22 long rifle.

With that type of ballistics, Rogers said it will hit with the energy of a speeding train. After a little experimenting Rogers should have him another passable varmint rifle in the .50.



# **Governor Calls Attention To Needless Traffic Deaths**

Governor John Connally saidtoday in pro-claiming Sunday, Dec. 11, "Safety Sunday" in an abuse of God's most precious gift --life itself."

The Governor also called attention to the fact that 3,028 persons were killed and 186,-062 injured on Texas streets and highways in 1965 "despite an intensive and continuing campaign by both official State agencies and citizen-support groups."

"Safety Sunday" is sponsored each year by the Texas Safety Association. S. Ross Carr of Houston, TSA President, said purpose of the observance is to focus public attention on the moral obligations and responsibilities of vehicle drivers to protect their own lives and the lives of others. It is observed each year during one Sunday in December to give further empasis to the need for accident prevention during the Christmas-New Year's holiday season.

In his proclamation, Governor Connally said: "It is essential that every Texas driver realize that safety for himself, his loved ones and his friends, as well as other drivers and passengers is a matter of moral responsibility, and that useless infliction of human injury is an abuse of God's most precious gift -- life itself."

He urged all citizens to join in a united

effort to awaken the conscience of every driver and further urged the pastors of all churches to remind their members of the personal and moral responsibility " to drive carefully, to obey the traffic laws and to protect the sanctity of human life in our State."

Carr reported that the Texas Safety Association Holiday Safety Campaign begins the first of December and is carried through New Year's Day. Approximately 1,000 kits of holiday safety campaign materials have been mailed to the various individuals and groups throughout Texas planning to participate in the campaign activities, News releases on holiday safety will be furnished to all Texas newspapers, and spot announce-ments on holiday safety will be sent to all radio and television stations in the state.

Each year TSA holiday publicity efforts are coordinated with the Governor's Office and state agencies, such as the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Texas Highway Department.

The TSA Holiday Safety Campaign is sponsored by the group's Church Activities Section under the direction of J. O. Musick of Austin, TSA General Manager and Mrs. W. B. Streetman of Fort Worth, TSA Vice President for Church Activities.





#### MARSHMALLOW FUDGE

Mix in a heavy 2 quart saucepan:

2 1/4 c. sugar 2/3 c. evaporated milk 1/4 c. butter 5 oz. jar marshmallow creme

Bring to a bubbling boil quickly, stirring all the time. When bubbles appear over all the top, boil and sir over medium heat 5 minutes.

Remove from heat and add:

6 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Beat until chocolate is completely melted and blended into mixture.

Pour into buttered 9 inch square pan. Cool thoroughly. Cut into 1 1/2 inch squares. Makes 2 lbs.
