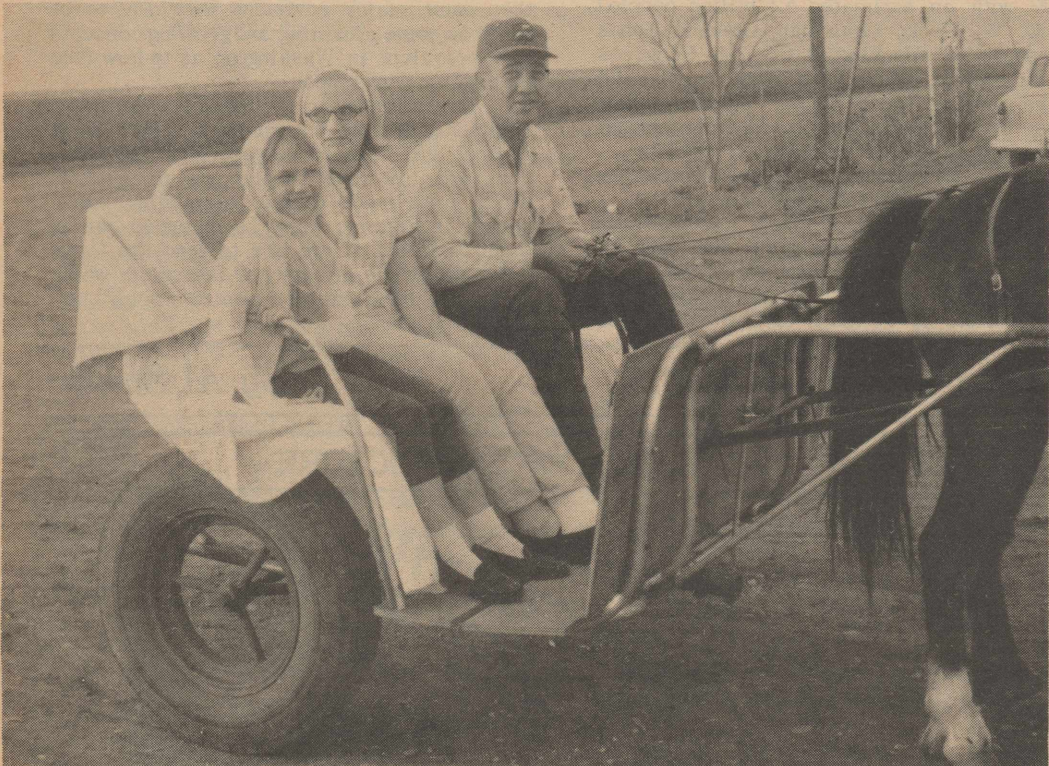

## Former Hart Resident Killed In Viet Nam

Marshal Lynn Horton, former Hart resident, was reported killed in action in Viet Nam.

Horton, born Aug. 11, 1943

in Plainview, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Troy Horton of Seal Beach, Calif. He was a dentist in the Medical Corps.

Funeral services were held

Wednesday at 2 p. m. in the Chapel of Forest Lawn Mortuary with military graveside service at Cypress, Calif.

Horton's father was a pilot in the USAF during World War II and Horton made his home with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Percy Hart, and started to school in the Hart schools. He was graduated from Long Beach High School and attended two years college there.

He arrived in Viet Nam July 25, 1966, and was to have been discharged April, 1967.

Survivors include his wife, a three-month-old daughter, Devon, his parents, one brother, Troy Jr., maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jess Beaty of Plainview and paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Percy Hart of Hart.

A total of .08 inch of moisture was reported. Temperatures have remained low enough so that a few patches of snow were still around for approximately a week.

## Wheat, Feed, Cotton

### Sign-Ups To Begin Feb. 6

Beginning Feb. 6 and ending March 3, a four-week sign-up period for farmers wishing to participate in the 1967 wheat, feed grain, and upland cotton programs was announced today by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Signups for the 1967 Cropland Adjustment Program (CAP), which got under way Dec. 1, also will conclude on March 3.

The new signup period for upland cotton farms represents a change from a Nov. 28 announcement which called for a signup from Feb. 6 through

March 31.

Weekly national complications of returns are planned. Reports on the first week of the signups will be available about mid-February.

In 1966, program signups were as follows: nearly one and a half million farms producing feed grains in 48 states; 828,000 wheat farms in 46 states and 515,000 upland cotton farms in 20 states. About 36,000 farms took part in the Cropland Adjustment Program signup in 46 States.

A grower may not receive approval for export cotton acreage unless he posts a bond to guarantee that all his cotton production will be moved into export without benefit of any price support. Failure to export the cotton would make the producer subject to damages at the marketing quota penalty rate of 50 percent of the parity price for the amount of cotton not exported.

## Deadline Set For New Grower Cotton Allotment

Jan. 17, is the final date for applying for a "New Grower's" Cotton allotment. Neither the operator or owner of the farm covered by the application can own or operate any other farm in the United States for which a cotton allotment is established for the current year. Land must be suitable for production of cotton, and the operator must expect more than 50 per cent of his income from agricultural commodities, excluding cotton production from the farm.

# EDITORIALS

## Problem Of Feeding World May Be Acute By Year 2,000

How will the world be fed in the year 2000 with an estimated 6.1 billion people? C. W. Cook, Chairman, General Foods Corporation, speaking at the 71st Congress of American Industry in New York, said, "The driving force of our private enterprise organizations can, and must, be brought increasingly to bear on this vital problem... American agribusiness has the skills to do the job, in partnership with government."

He stated that government and business must plan for accomplishing our national goal of peace and security. He added, "And if America's food industry, from farm through distribution, is to take on the formidable

task of carrying know-how around the world, then some major revisions will have to be made in some alarming and growing concepts now prevalent in Washington as to how free enterprise works best.

"The present trend toward ever more limitation of free enterprise by government control will have to be reversed. The freedom and incentive to plan and to operate, which have made us the outstanding 'have' nation in history, must be extended rather than curtailed if we are to lead the 'have nots' out of the misery and insecurity which threaten the security of the entire world," Mr. Cook concluded.

### ONE YEAR AGO IN HART

Hart ginning totals topped the 12,000 mark this week as the harvest neared its finish. The three Hart gins reported 12,317 bales over the scales this week. That total is more than 3,000 bales above results reported just before the Christmas holidays.

The Castro County ASCS office recently announced several revisions in the farm programs available to Hart area farmers in 1966.

A 1966 construction and improvement program which calls for the investment of an additional \$19,353,000 in new facilities throughout the company's service area was announced by A. R. "Lon" Watson president and general manager of Southwestern Public Service Co.

### THREE YEARS AGO IN HART

Gins were operating full steam in Hart this week with 13,649 bales reported ginned and 487 bales on the yards.

Hart residents didn't have to dream of a white Christmas this year. All they had to do was look out the window. Saturday, Dec. 21, the area received one inch of dry snow. This was followed by three more inches of wet snow Sunday, Dec. 29.

Hart population now tops 750, according to figures arrived at by using the federal government's procedure in figuring the statistical population.

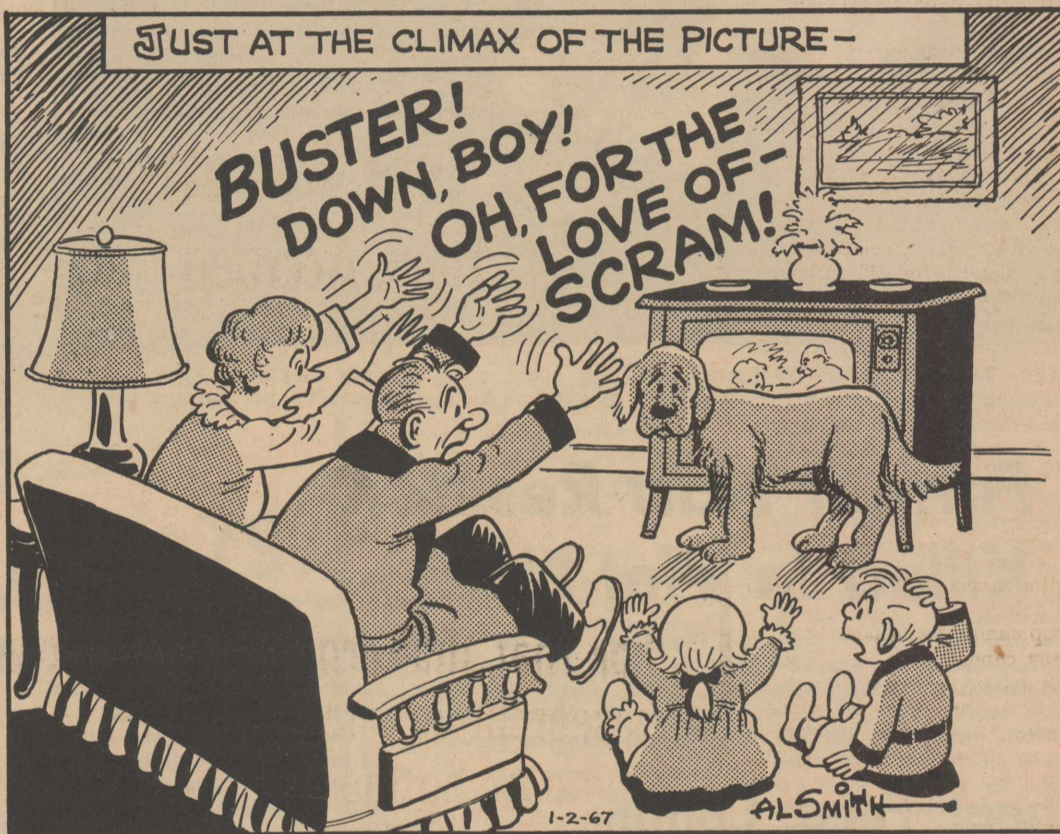

## KITCHEN KORNER

Now that the holiday season is over it is back to the business of every day living and cooking and most every one enjoys the plain foods after all the rich foods, also the easy to cook meals.

### CREAMED CHICKEN AND SPAGHETTI

5 ounce pkg. of spaghetti  
1 cup chopped celery  
1 tablespoon chopped onion  
1/4 green pepper, chopped  
3 tablespoons butter

1/4 cup flour  
chicken broth and enough milk to make 1 1/2 cups  
1/2 cup cream  
salt  
1 1/2 cups diced canned chicken

Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water. Cook celery, onions and pepper in butter for a few minutes. Stir in the flour, blend thoroughly. Then stir in the broth, milk and cream. Cook sauce until smooth and thickened. Season to taste with salt. Add the chicken, cook the mixture slowly for 15 minutes, pour over spaghetti that has been cooked in salted water until tender. Top with buttered bread crumbs.

### ONE DISH DINNER

Egg noodles (5 oz. pkg. or 3 cups cooked)  
2 tablespoons butter  
1 small green pepper, chopped  
1 medium onion, chopped  
1 pint canned beef (cut in small cubes)  
1 cup canned tomatoes  
1 pint canned corn  
salt and pepper to taste

Boil noodles until tender. Drain. Melt butter, add green pepper and onion. Brown lightly. Add meat and liquid from jar. Add the tomatoes. Heat. Drain liquid from canned corn. In a buttered baking dish add layer of noodles, layer of meat mixture and layer of corn, until all are used. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees F.

### SAUSAGE CORN CAKES

1 lb. sausage  
1 can whole grain corn, drained  
12 tablespoons flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 tablespoons corn liquid or milk  
2 eggs  
2 tablespoons lard or drippings

Crumble sausage in frying pan and heat 10 minutes. Pour off any drippings. Combine sausage and drained corn. Sift flour baking powder and salt together. Add liquid and beaten eggs to sifted dry ingredients. Stir meat and corn mixture into batter. Add lard or drippings to pan in which sausage was cooked. Drop mixture by spoonfuls into hot drippings, brown on both sides. Serves 6.

1 pint canned apples  
1/2 cup raisins

3 to 4 slices of bread  
buttered and cut into small cubes  
1/2 cup brown sugar  
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Drain some of syrup off canned apples. Mix all ingredients thoroughly, adding enough syrup from canned apples to slightly moisten bread. Place in greased baking dish and bake in moderate oven about 25 minutes. Serve with whipped cream.

### PEACH TORTE PIE

3 egg whites  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Dash salt  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup chopped nutmeats  
1/2 cup cracker crumbs  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 quart canned peaches sliced and drained well  
whipped cream

Beat egg whites with vanilla and salt until foamy. Add sugar gradually; beat until stiff peaks are formed. Mix nutmeats, crumbs, and baking

powder; fold into egg whites, spread in well-greased 9-inch pie pan, push meringue higher at the sides. Bake in slow oven (300 deg. F.) 40 minutes, or till dry on outside. Cool. Just before serving, fill center with peach slices. Top with whipped cream.

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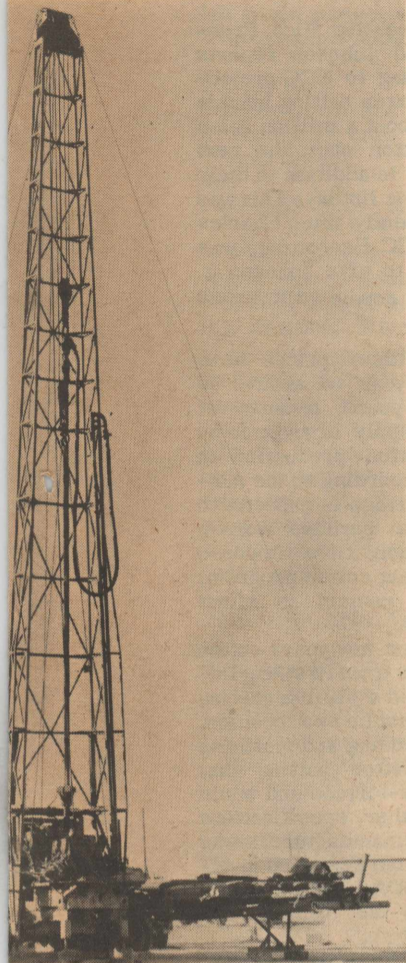
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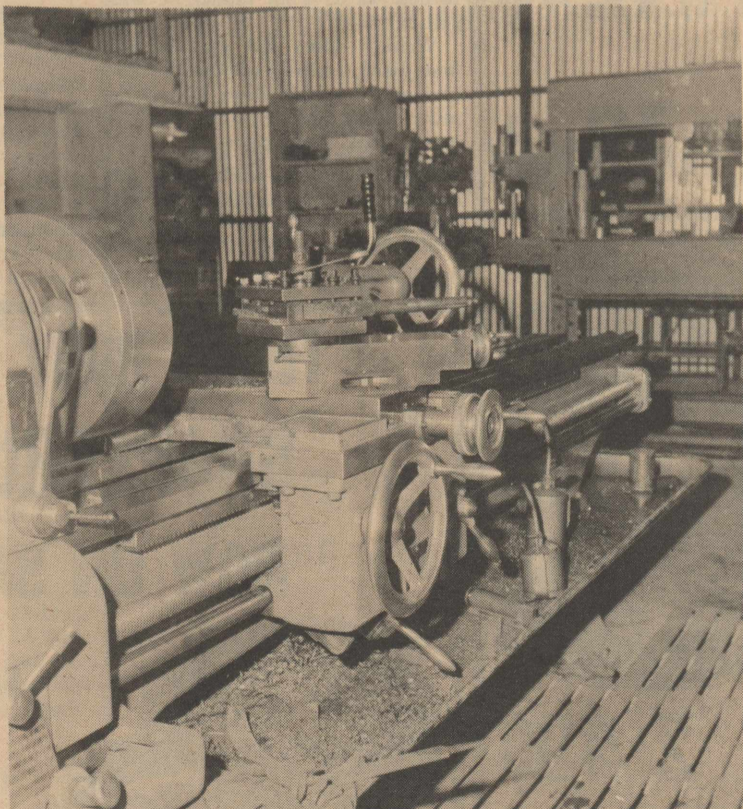

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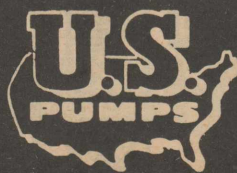

**"OK"**

Williams decided he did not need that air conditioning system for his office after all. But the manufacturer insisted:

**THE FAMILY LAWYER**



"You have already confirmed the order."

"It is true that I marked an 'OK' on the order form," conceded Williams. "But that is not legally binding. 'OK' is just an abbreviation, not formal enough for a written contract."

Nevertheless, in a court test, the judge held Williams bound by his agreement. The judge said that, if "OK" is not elegant English, its meaning is clear—and clarity is what counts.

By and large, the law takes a tolerant view of abbreviations. For the purpose of language, whether formal or informal, is communication. If the abbreviated form succeeds in that purpose, then the law is usually satisfied.

Thus: a receipt by a bank president was held valid, even though he designated himself as "pres.;"

a promissory note signed "W. G. S." was held valid, because it was clear whom the initials stood for; and "3/7/54" was held a sufficient substitute for March 7, 1954, in establishing the date of a transaction.

What about nicknames? They, too, are generally acceptable if there is no doubt of identity.

For instance, a bequest to "my dear Joe" was upheld when there was only a single Joe whom the deceased could possibly have meant. "Jack" has been held an acceptable substitute for John, and "Geo." for George.

But a short form that leaves room for doubt can be costly. "Emma" was held too different to pass for Emily, and so was "May" for Mary.

In one case, a man who sold a truck used a three-letter abbreviation on the bill of sale to identify the model. But he failed to add the model year. The buyer later sued him, successfully, on the ground that he had not been properly informed as to what model he was getting.

Writing down the year in the first place, instead of just the abbreviation, would have taken the seller about three seconds. The litigation took three years.

A distinct possibility for consumption of up to a million bales of short staple, low quality cotton which might otherwise be left in storage has come to light in the course of a short staple market survey being conducted by the National Cotton Council at the request of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson reports that according to NCC projections the cotton batting market could use about a million bales of such cotton over the next three years in addition to their use of cotton linters. This was learned recently when Charles Russell, NCC Economist, was in Lubbock to give Johnson a preliminary report on progress of the study.

Cotton linter prices have risen this year to around 10 cents per pound because of the short supply brought on by reduced cotton production in 1966. And according to the survey, the shortage is expected to continue and perhaps worsen under the conditions imposed by the current cotton program, which will remain in effect through 1969.

In the past few years cotton batting made from first-cut linters captured a sizable portion of the automobile seat cushion, furniture padding and mattress markets. Cotton batting that could be pre-formed and would meet the other specifications required by manufacturers was developed from research involving both USDA funds and money supplied by the Cotton Producers Institute.

Johnson points out that price is the only apparent difficulty in using the cotton held by Commodity Credit Corporation to fill the gap between supply and demand for linters.

In order to successfully compete with foam rubber in the batting markets, makers say they must have cotton or cotton linters at around 8 cents per pound. If an adequate supply is not made available in the neighborhood of that price, they are fearful that markets gained through research may be lost.

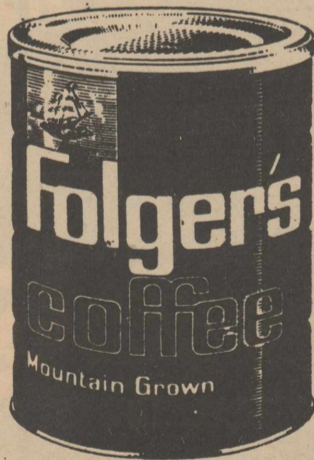

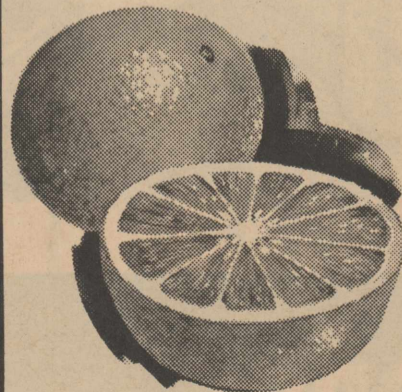

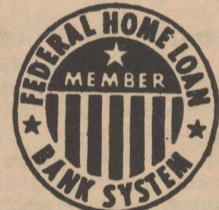
