Riding Club Second In State

Postal Rate For Packages To Increase

Use of ZIP CODE will make it easier to mail packages after Jan. 15, Postmaster Jewel Brooks of Hart said today.

New rates and a new system for identifying parcel post zones will go into effect on that date as provided in legislation signed into law by President Johnson on Sept. 20, 1966, the Postmaster pointed out.

The rate increases will average about 10 cents a parcel, Mrs. Brooks said. Starting July 1, the law provides for a series of size and weight increases on packages mailed between first-class offices. Hart is a 2nd class office. The size and weight increases will be in five annual steps, the last coming on July 1, 1971.

Use of ZIP CODE in the recipient's address will enable the sender or a mail clerk to determine the proper zone, and thus the rate, for the package. The zones will be based on the distance a parcel travels between the 552 sectional centers in the country, Mrs. Brooks said.

By consulting a simple chart, which is available at all post offices, the zone can be readily identified because three numbers of the ZIP CODE represent the sectional center. This replaces a method in which a directory often had to be consulted to locate the proper zone for each of the nation's 33,000 post offices.

The new rate will range from 40 cents for a three-pound parcel destined for local delivery to 60 cents for the same parcel to zone 3 (150 to 300) to \$1.05 to zone 8 (over 1,800 miles). The new zoning method will also apply to air parcel post, catalogs and to publishers who pay zone rates on the advertising portion of their periodicals.

Mrs. Brooks noted that all parcels mailed between post offices within the Amarillo sectional center will be charged at the first zone rate. There are 85 post offices within the Amarillo sectional center.

Voters Need Certificate

Despite elimination of the poll tax as a requirement for voting in Texas, persons must still register to vote.

That reminder came this week from the Hart City Hall, where registration certificates are available.

The office is open for registration from 10 a. m. to noon and from 1 p. m. to 3 p. m. each weekday.

Final date for registration is Jan. 31.

Longhorns Beat Olton, Drop Game To Silvertown

The Hart Longhorn boys team broke even in the win department in last weeks basketball action.

The boys took a victory from the Olton B team last Tuesday night and then fell to Silvertown on Friday night.

In Tuesday's action the 'Horns took a commanding lead over the Olton B team from the start and finished with a 58 to 35 advantage. Tommy Gonzales dropped in 16 points while teammate Bob Crick added

another 15 to pace the Longhorn scoring.

Stephen Fletcher led the Olton scoring with 16 points but none of his teammates provided much help and he was the only one able to shoot in double figures. The Longhorns were able to sink 63 per cent of their shots from the charity line while Olton could only drop in 40 per cent of their chances.

John Montague paced Silvertown's scoring with 15 points. At the free throw line the Horns could connect on only 48 per cent of their chances while Silvertown hit 60 per cent.

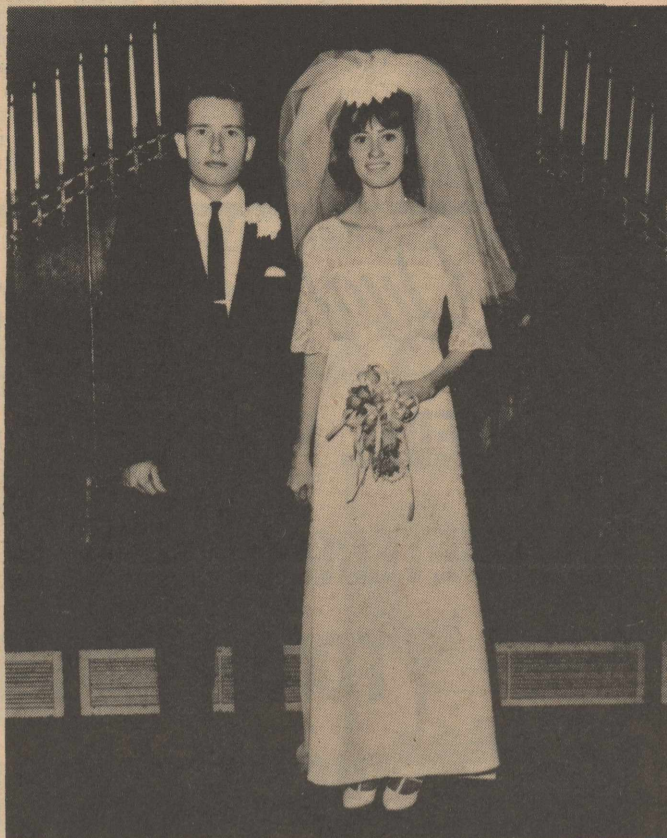

Motorists Reminded Of Inspection

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reminded Texas motorists today that most vehicles have not yet been inspected for their 1967 vehicle inspection sticker.

"The inspection period is two-thirds over and only about one-third of the vehicles have been inspected," said Garrison. "This means that during the 14 weeks remaining before the April 15 deadline for inspections, more than twice as many persons each week must have their car inspected to avoid long lines forming at the end of the period."

In urging motorists to have their vehicle inspected at an early date, Garrison pointed out that official inspection stations are easily identified by the standard sign displayed at or near the service entrance of the garage.

He advised that inspection stations are being urged to request permission to inspect any vehicle brought into the garage for repairs or regular service.

"In this way," Garrison pointed out, "time will be saved for the motorists as well as for the inspection station."

"And if you have not had your vehicle inspected, take it to one of the 5,500 authorized inspection stations for a 'check-up' and start the new year off right with a safe vehicle."

This cold spell has really been staying with us and we can get a lot of pleasure out of our oven meals this time of year. Pork is at a more reasonable price than for quite a while, as are hams, which are good fixed in so many ways. Here are various ways to prepare ham.

SCALLOPED HAM AND POTATOES
Serves four to five

1 thick slice Ham
4 c. sliced raw potatoes
1 1/2 c. thin white sauce
salt and pepper

Method: Cut a slice of ham one-half inch thick and flour lightly. Fry each side until it begins to brown, then put into a baking dish, cover with the

HAM LUNCHEON SANDWICH

Method: Toast two slices of bread, butter well, and cover with slices of hot baked ham. Add a thin slice of Swiss cheese and cover with thin slices of fresh tomatoes and salad dressing. Close sandwich. Cut into four pieces. Serve with olives, pickles or radishes.

HAM TURNOVERS

1/2 c. lard
1 1/2 c. flour
3/4 c. water
2 c. minced ham
1/3 c. white sauce
salt

Method: Make pastry, roll thin and cut in rounds. Place one tablespoon finely chopped ham moistened with thick white sauce on each round. Brush each piece with water halfway around close to edge. Fold like a turnover and press edges together. Bake in hot oven 400 degrees F. for 15 minutes.

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q - I was hurt in a car accident and was compensated for my injuries by an insurance company. Is that money taxable?

A - Damages for injuries suffered in an accident are tax free.

Q - I rent a car for business use. Can I use the mileage rate for expenses instead of adding up the rental fees?

A - On a rental car, use the rental expenses plus what you pay for tolls, parking fees and gasoline and oil as the expense figure. These costs, when incurred for business purposes, are deductible to the extent they are not reimbursed by your employer.

If a rental car is also driven for personal or family use then the costs have to be allocated between business and personal use. In this case, only the business portion of the expenses qualify as a tax deduction.

Q - I understand that farmers can now take gas tax refunds as a credit against income tax. Can this credit just be taken on gas used in 1966?

A - The credit can be taken for a period stretching back to July 1, 1965, on the return filed for the first tax year beginning after June 30, 1965.

For most taxpayers, this will be the return filed for calendar year 1966. Be sure to file your tax return on time however. The credit is lost if the return is late.

Q - Do you have to support a person all year to be able to claim his or her dependency exemption? My mother moved in with us several months ago and I have been providing her full support ever since.

A - The support test is not concerned with how long you have supported a person but whether you provided more than half the support required by the person for the calendar year. If you provided this support for your mother and the other tests are met, then you may claim her as a dependent.

Q - How do you handle a year end taxable dividend on stock. Do you report it the year declared or the year received?

A - Report it in the year it is constructively received. This means that if you received the dividend or had it credited to your account in 1966, then it must be reported on your 1966 return.
