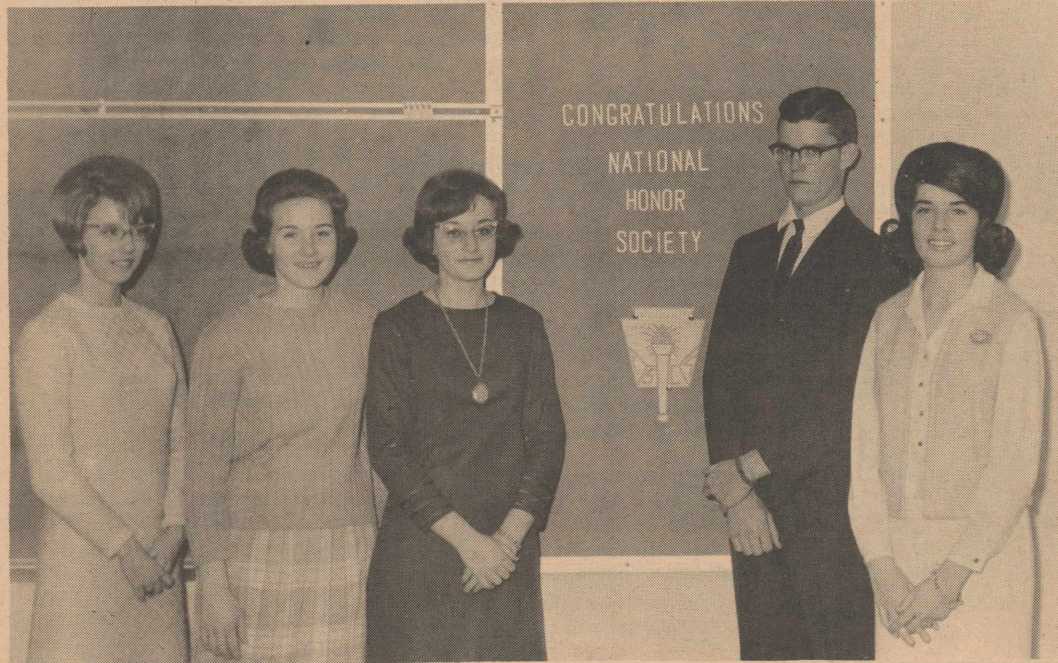

He expressed his appreciation to these people, as well as faculty, parents, and patrons for their interest and cooperation.

The National Honor Society is sponsored by the National Association of Secondary School Principals. The purpose of the National Honor Society is to encourage students to prove their standing in leadership, service, scholastics and character.

These four points are the check points by which students are determined for eligible membership. The student must have a scholastic rating in all studies of 90 or more.

The other points are all graded by the same high standards. Members of the National Honor Society are chosen by a faculty committee composed of not less than four teachers, and should represent a cross section of all school curriculum.

The Longhorn Chapter of National Honor Society was chartered in September of 1966. W. C. Smith has been appointed sponsor for this Chapter. Smith is a math teacher in the Hart school system. The Dimmitt Chapter, of which he was sponsor eleven years, performed the installation at the banquet.

Susie Diaz Is Named Betty Crocker Homemaker

Maria J. Diaz (Susie) by finishing first in a written homemaking knowledge and attitude examination for senior girls Dec. 6, became Hart High School's 1967 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow.

Susie Diaz is now eligible for possible state and national scholarship awards. Her test also earned her a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, sponsor of the

Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

A state Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected from the winners of all schools in the state, with the former receiving a \$1,500 college scholarship; her school will be given a complete set of Encyclopedia Britannica by Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc. The runner-up will be awarded a \$500 educational grant.

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow from this state, together with those from all other states and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by her school advisor, will join in an expense paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C., next spring.

The national winner -- the 1967 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow -- will be announced at a dinner in Williamsburg. She will be chosen from the state winners on the basis of original test score plus personal observation and interviews during the tour. Her reward will be an increase in her scholarship to \$5,000. Second, third, and fourth ranking national winners will have their original scholarship grants increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

EDITORIALS

Three New Governors Just Might Fool Outside World

Outsiders have a tendency to judge American politics by the more exotic or unusual facets of the vast whole. Within the Republic, there are, of course, 50 state governors. Of these, the 47 most typical are not making the news pages of the press around the world. The three about whom people overseas are reading and hearing most are in some ways the three least typical. They are Ronald Reagan of California, Lester Maddox of Georgia, and Lurleen Wallace of Alabama.

What makes these three holders of high office news to the outside world is the film-star past of the first, the ax-handle and pistol-wielding against Negroes of the second, and the wife-and-husband relationship that apparently secured election of the third. There is, in other words, something unusual about each of them. But the outsideworld will almost certainly cite each as being typical of American politics.

Each, of course, has yet to prove himself - or, in Mrs. Wallace's case, herself. Each, we can be sure, will be watched from outside with unusually critical eyes. And each may well yet confound present

critics. Each could bequeath to his (or her) successor an administration with a solid record of constructive and imaginative achievement. Each has the opportunity to accomplish more in office than might the new state governors whose inaugurations at this time are not making the headlines.

And to those who might think such speculation funny or cynical, we would say that the responsibility of office can bring wisdom and courage in unexpected measure to those whose qualifications for office were initially much questioned. Already Lester Maddox has made an inaugural address which it is hard to reconcile with his earlier chasing of Negroes away from his restaurant. Already Ronald Reagan is having second thoughts about his suggestion that economies should begin with measures likely to involve tuition-fees for California's public institutions of higher learning. And Mrs. Wallace's oath, on assuming office, opened with a pledge to abide by the Constitution of the United States. If that is the guideline for state government in Alabama in the years ahead, who can complain?

KITCHEN KORNER

Almost one month of the new year has passed and it doesn't seem possible does it? It seems as though there are less months in the year than there used to be or could I just be getting older and notice it more. I'm sure many of you feel the same way. Then too, we have so many more things to do that time slips away before we know it. My appetite has not yet returned from the Holidays so picked some recipes at random that we have tried and like very much.

HUSH PUPPIES

2 c. cornmeal
1 Tbsp. flour
2 tsp. baking powder
6 Tbsp. chopped onion
1 tsp. salt
1 egg beaten
2 c. milk

Sift dry ingredients together. Mix egg and milk and onion. Stir all together and beat. Drop by tablespoonfuls into kettle of deep fat. Drain on paper towels.

CRACKER PIE

Beat together 3 egg whites with 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar until stiff. Gradually add:

1 c. sugar
Beat after each addition.
Fold in:
12 soda crackers (crumbs)
1 c. pecans
1 tsp. vanilla
Pour in buttered pie pan and bake until brown. Cook in a 375 degree oven from 30 to 40 minutes.

DATE PUDDING

1 c. flour
2 Tbsp. butter, melted
1 c. nuts, chopped
1 egg
1 c. brown sugar
1 c. dates, chopped
1 tsp. baking powder

Mix ingredients. Add enough milk to make stiff batter. Pour into buttered pan.

Make syrup of:

1 c. brown sugar
1 1/2 c. boiling water
1 c. white sugar
2 Tbsp. butter

Boil 2 minutes. Pour over batter. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees F.

ORANGE FLAVORED YAMS

6 medium sized yams
2 Tbsp. butter or more
1/2 c. maple syrup
1 Tbsp. grated orange
1/2 c. sugar
1/4 tsp. salt

Boil yams in jackets. Peel and cut in thick slices. Arrange in baking dish in alternate layers with other ingredients. Bake 1 hour in medium oven.
