
# **Education Cited As Reason** For Success Of Countries


A prominent businessman, Monroe E. Spaght, Royal Dutch-Shell Group, compares the strength and well-being of various nations to illustrate the impact of education: "For example if endowment with natural resources were the sole criterion, Japan and Norway would be poor, which they are not, while Brazil and Indonesia would be rich, which they are not. If, as some of the opponents of foreign investment allege, 'colonial exploit-ation' were the stumbling block to progress, Siam and Abyssinia would be rich, which they are not, while Canada and Australia would be poor, which they are not. If lack of heavy industry is the handicap, then Denmark and New Zealand, where agriculture predomi-nates, would be poor, which they are not. If

high population density drags down living standards, the Netherlands and Japan should be poor, which they are not. If capital for investment is the required ingredient, then Kuwait and Venezuela would be rich, which they are not."

Then this businessman asks, rhetorically, "Could a main factor be a high level of education spread widely over the population? If it is, the United States should be very rich, which it is; Western Europe should be fairly rich, which it is; Latin America should be fairly poor, which it is; and Africa should be very poor, which it is."

This is an impressive argument in behalf of unqualified support of education.

HAMBURGER-CHEESE BAKE

A trio of cheeses flavors this creamy casserole-

1 lb. ground beef

1 medium onion, chopped (1/2 c.) 2 8-ounce cans or 1 15-ounce

can (2 c.) tomato sauce lt. sugar

3/4 t. salt

1/4 t. garlic salt 1/4 t. pepper

4 c. uncooked medium noodles 1 c. cream-style cottage cheese 1 8-ounce package cream cheese

softened

1/4 c. dairy sour cream 1/3 c. sliced green onion

1/4 c. chopped green pepper Wins Scholarship 1/4 c. shredded Parmesan cheese

> In skillet, brown ground beef along with chopped onion. Stir in tomato sauce, sugar, salt, garlic salt, and pepper. Remove from heat. Meanwhile, cook noodles according to package directions; drain. Combine cottage cheese, cream cheese, sour cream, green onion, and green pepper. Spread half the noodles in llx7xl 1/2 inch baking dish; top with a little of the meat sauce. 



CONSUMER CREDIT CODE -- A hard crackdown on certain firms offering credit is the recommendation by a governor's study committee on consumer finance.

Committee found that the public is being defrauded by such organizations as homeimprovement firms and smallloan businesses. Governor's recommendation is that the state set up strict regulation of these businesses -- all the way from banks and savings and loan associations down to retail merchants giving credit.

Code would set maximum credit charges, limit insurance required for credit transactions, make clear to consumers amount of credit or cash advances and all charges or pertinent data and prohibit deceptive advertising in the field.

Also included in the recommendations was altering the state statutory ceiling on interest rates which the various types of business may charge for credit.


He has been in the Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt for the past few days and will be in bed at home for some time.


