In the Lamb show W. A. Hawkins, III exhibited the Grand Champion and Jerry Smith the Reserve Grand Champion.

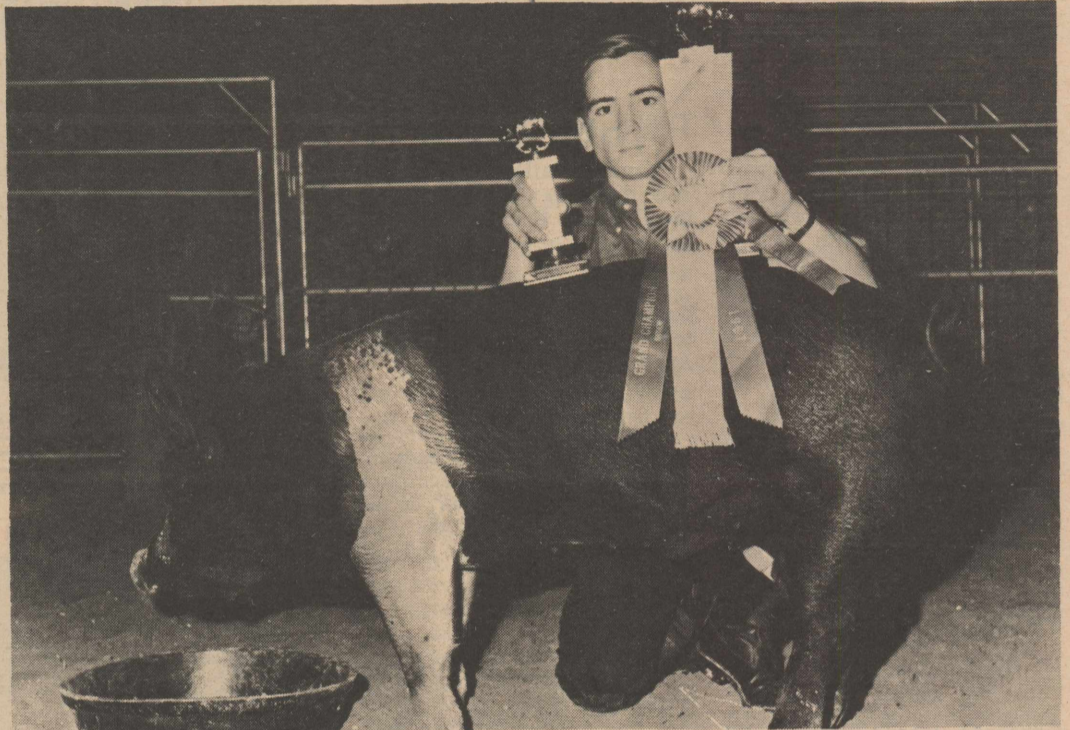

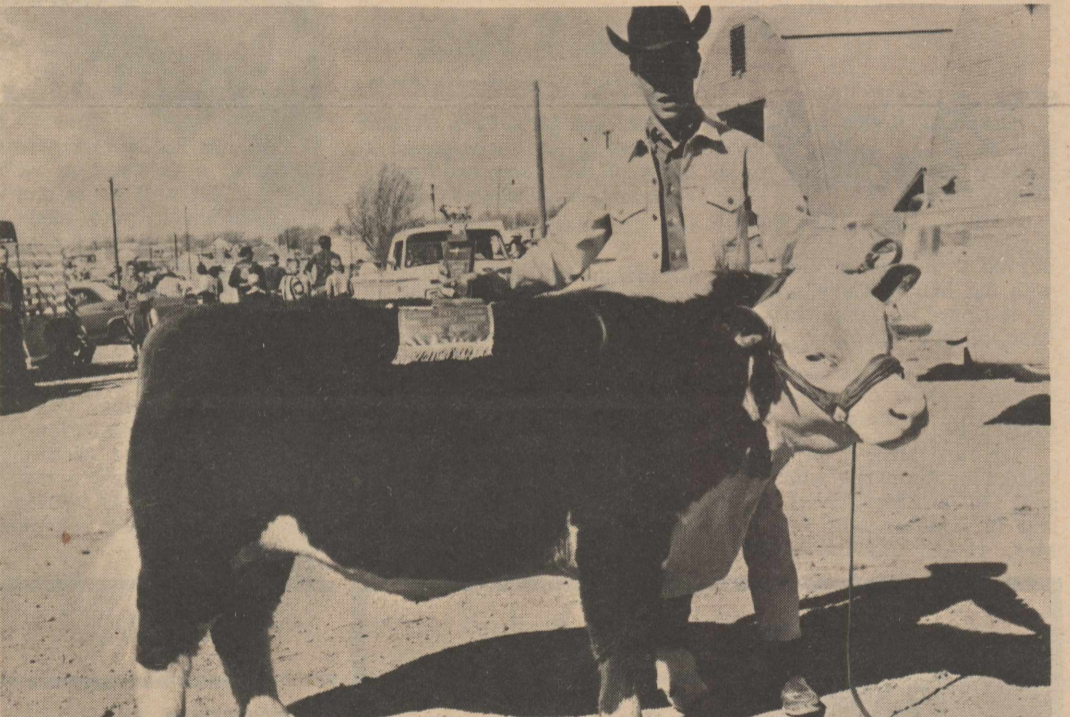

EDITORIALS

Time To Beware When Talk Is All Of Honesty

When a fellow talks too much about his honesty, it is time to beware. The same thing might well be said of the near zealots in government, who infer that industry is engaged in a lasting campaign to bilk the purchasing public and that only the government can protect consumers from these predators.

There is plenty of evidence that the standards of too many government officials fall considerably short of perfection when it comes to ethics. One agency, the Food and Drug Administration, some time ago, accused one third of the members of the nation's leading drug manufacturers association of advertising violations. The association immediately examined the alleged

charges and finally succeeded in securing a list of its offending members from the Food and Drug Administration. The list indicated that fewer than five per cent of the association's membership were involved in violations that were forwarded to the FDA's legal department where formal allegations of violations must be made.

A misstatement of this kind by a government regulatory agency is a grave matter. The resultant newspaper publicity of a derogatory nature is beyond recall. In commenting on the incident, a spokesman for the pharmaceutical industry asks, "Isn't it fair to require that an agency which demands the truth deliver the truth?" There can be only one answer to that question.

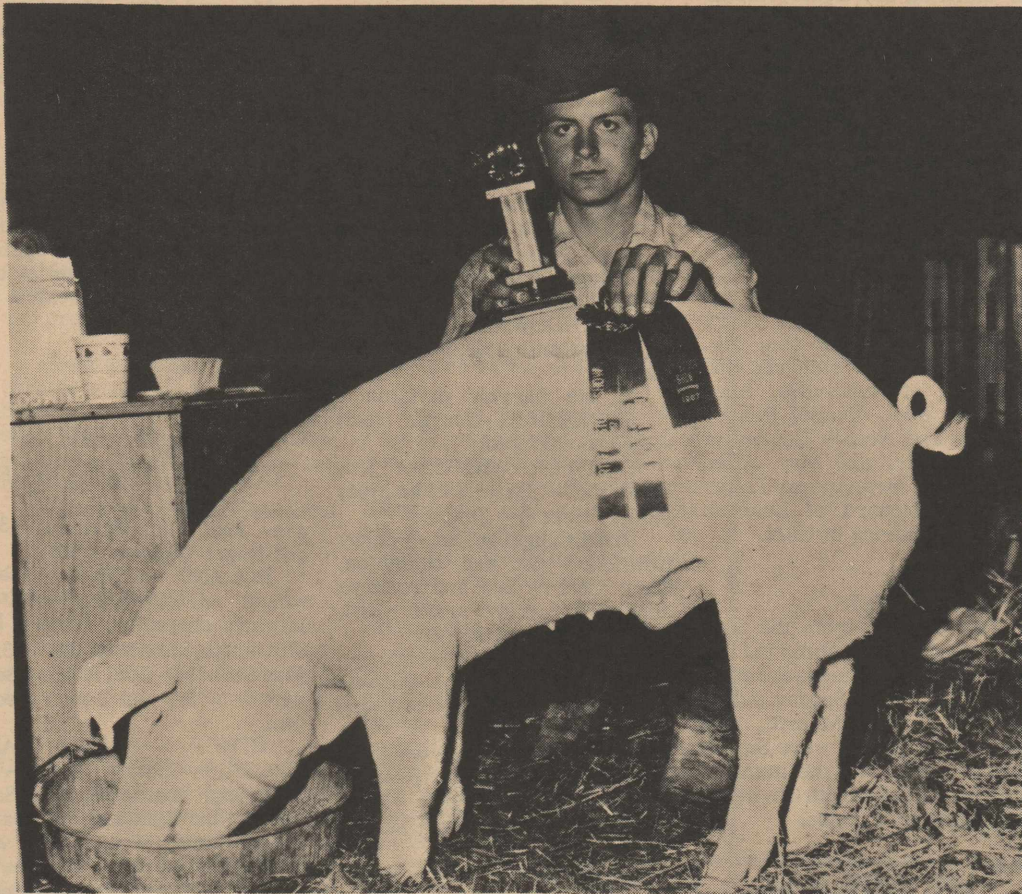

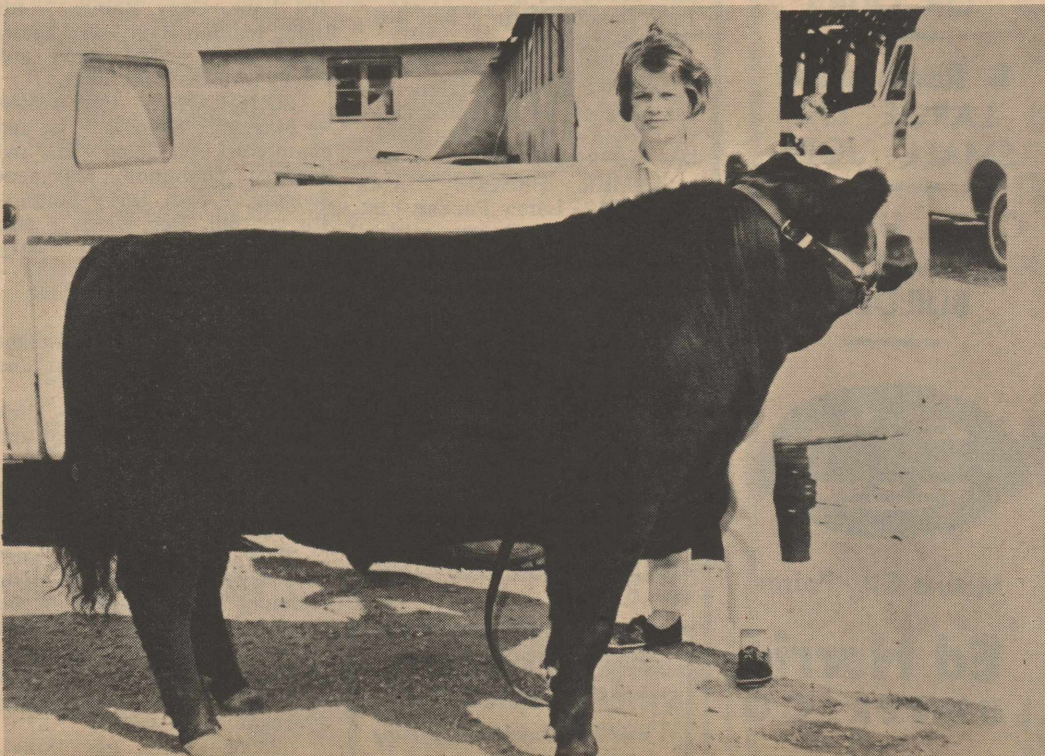

Flying Queen Tryouts Set

(Special)- The second tryout for high school senior girls for the Wayland College basketball team is scheduled April 8 at 2 p. m. in the Plainview High School gymnasium.

The first tryout was March 11 and was arranged by Harley Redin, coach of the Wayland College Flying Queens who a few years ago set one of the most fabulous records in amateur sports with 131 consecutive victories under the hoops.

Redin said that if a player is going to enroll in Wayland anyway, there is no need to participate in a tryout, as scholarships are not awarded on basis of tryouts.

"We had much rather have the girls attend Wayland and then come out for the team," Redin commented.

During a year on the freshman team, they will have a fair chance to demonstrate basketball ability and if they can play for us, and maintain a good academic record, they will be eligible for scholarships in their sophomore year. Or, if a scholarship is awarded in the freshman year, it will be renewable on basis of scholastic standing and achievements of the basketball court," Redin said.

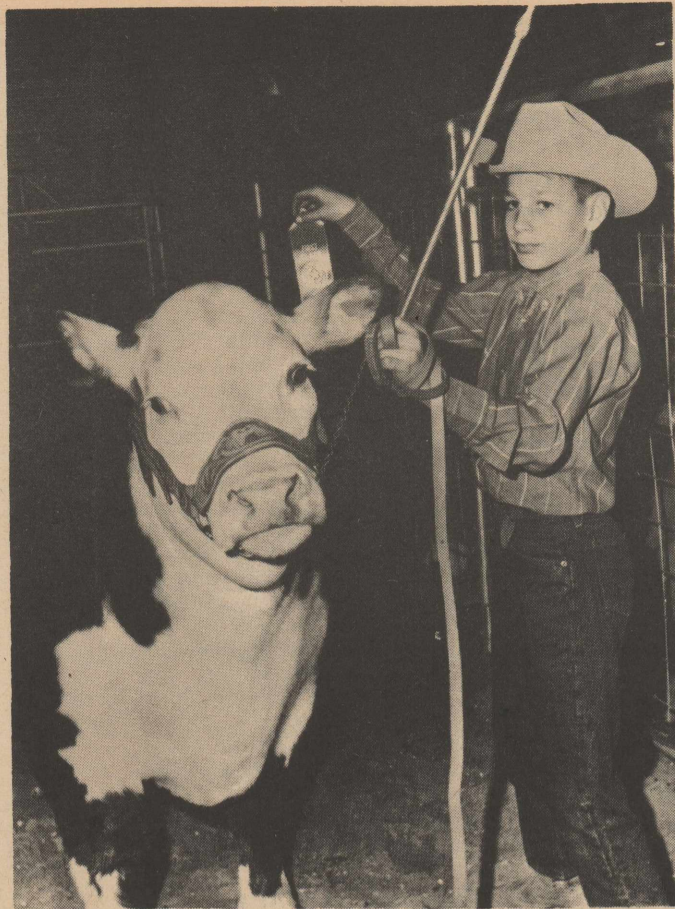

KITCHEN KORNER

By Lela Gallion

For this week I've selected some of my favorite Chocolate cake recipes. Before you start reading and saying, "Oh no, re-runs, just like TV", I would like to explain that these are some recipes I've had requests to re-write.

SHEATH CAKE

2 c. flour
2 c. sugar
1 stick butter or oleo
3 to 4 T. of cocoa
1 c. water
1/2 c. shortening
1/2 c. buttermilk
1 t. soda
2 eggs
1 t. vanilla

Pre-heat oven to 400 deg. F. Mix sugar and flour together in a mixing bowl. Heat butter, cocoa, water and shortening in a saucepan until it reaches the boiling point. Pour hot mixture over the dry ingredients and add buttermilk with soda, egg and vanilla. Mix well. Pour batter into pan 11x15x1. Bake for 20 minutes.

ICING

1 stick oleo
3 T. cocoa
6 T. milk
1 box powdered sugar
1 t. vanilla
1/2 c. chopped nuts.

Put oleo, cocoa and milk in pan and heat until it begins to boil. Remove from stove and add sifted powdered sugar. Blend well and add vanilla and nuts. Pour over HOT cake. Add coconut if desired.

WACKY CAKE

1/3 c. cocoa
1 1/2 c. flour
1 c. sugar
1 t. soda
1 t. vinegar
1 t. vanilla
1 stick melted margarine
1 c. water

Sift flour, cocoa, sugar, and soda together. Melt Margarine. Add melted margarine, vanilla, and vinegar to the water. Pour liquid ingredients into dry ingredients. Stir until well mixed. Pour into ungreased 7x12 pan or 9x9 pan. Bake at 350 degrees F for about 30 minutes.

ICING

1 c. sugar
1/4 c. cocoa
1/4 c. milk
1/2 stick oleo

Bring entire mixture to boil and boil for 1 minute. Remove from heat and add 1 tsp. vanilla. Beat until it thickens and then spread over the cake in the pan. Cut in squares and serve.

2/3 c. oleo
1/2 c. milk
Beat 2 min.

Then add:

2 eggs, unbeaten
3/4 c. milk
1 tsp. vanilla
Beat 2 more minutes. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes.

Ladies this is quick, easy and only one dirty bowl.

SEVEN MINUTE FROSTING

Boil together until forms long thread:

1/2 c. water
1/2 c. white syrup
1 c. sugar

Beat 2 egg whites until stiff. Add above mixture and 1 tsp. vanilla. Beat until correct consistency.

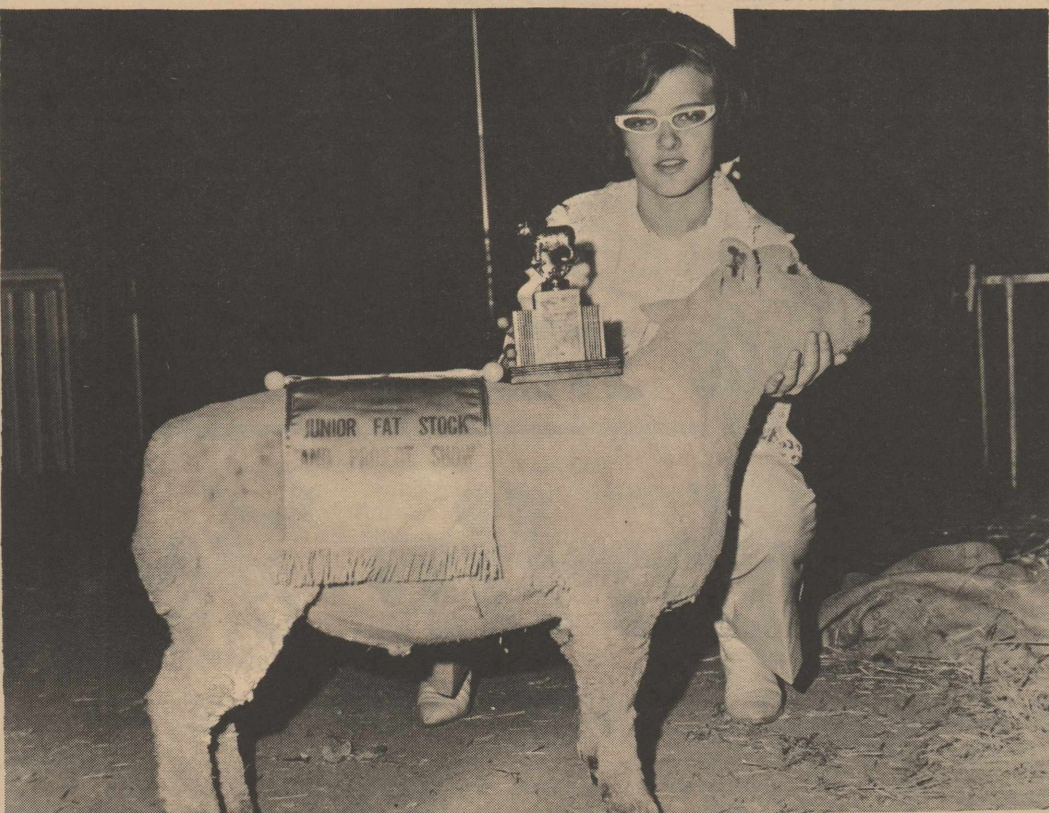

Five Months Left For VA APP Applications

Less than five months remain for veterans of World War II to use their guarantee privileges for a loan to purchase a home, farm or for business purposes.

This warning came from Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco.

Present statutes provide that the absolute cutoff date for World War II veterans will be on July 25, 1967. This deadline is the result of Congressional action which has delayed the final date of eligibility several times.

The cutoff will not affect veterans of the Korean Conflict or veterans who have served since Jan 31, 1955, Coker pointed out, as these veterans are covered by different legislation.

Almost seven million loans have been guaranteed by the Veterans Administration to veterans since the beginning of the

program following World War II. One out of every five homes constructed in the United States following World War II was with VA guarantee.

The Veterans Administration will guarantee up to 60 percent of the purchase price of a home for a veteran with limitation as to the total purchase price.

Coker urged veterans planning to purchase a home to make their selection as soon as possible, avoiding the last minute rush for certification.

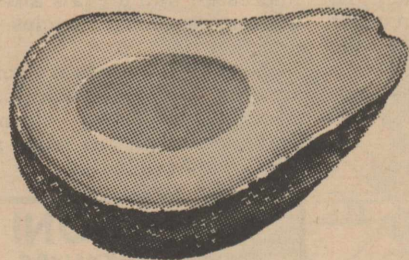

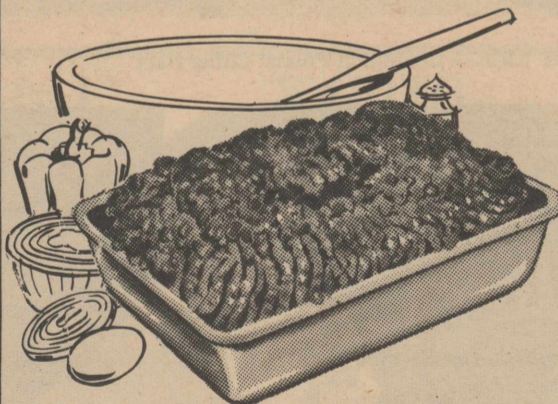
