The Hampshire, bred by Buddy Winter, widely known registered swine breeder of Idalou, was judged champion by Dr. Donald Pinney of Oklahoma State University who commented that Ray's barrow was a "standout pig" and "a real real outstanding credit to this show."

## Look At Social Security Deductions May Be Shock

Have you looked at your paycheck lately? If you have, you probably were shocked, and even more shocks are coming.

On top of a Social Security tax increase on January 1st, the administration is now asking for another tax boost in the payout program. This would raise the minimum benefits for retired workers to \$70 a month, and would assure workers with a twenty-five years of coverage at least \$100 a month. In addition, it's currently proposed to extend medical insurance to disabled beneficiaries, and allow larger earnings without loss of benefits.

Young Americans in the work force will pay for these increases, if they are enacted. Young people particularly should realize

that the foundation of all financial provisions for retirement security is a sound dollar. They should demand, as should all Americans, that the Social Security system be properly managed so as that one day the working public will not rebel against the system. Even under present benefits the combined tax on employees and employers will rise to 11.3 per cent within a few years.

Social Security benefits should be adequate but they should not be vulnerable to political influences.

It might be wise to make a careful appraisal of the system, which is now three decades old, to see if it provides real security.

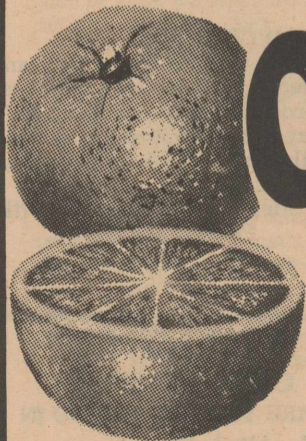

## Easter Seal Appeal Made

The Easter Seal Society is providing treatment and services for 16,031 physically handicapped children and adults in Texas. Mrs. Maynard said, and this program needs to be expanded. Many people are going without services that would increase the productiveness of their lives and make them happier. With increased growth of the Easter Seal Society, more and more of these people will be reached, he added.

The Society is carrying on a continuing program to seek out the disabled who are going without services and see that they

The Texas Easter Seal Society helps support 23 treatment facilities in Texas where crippled children and adults are treated regardless of their ability to pay. A complete referral program to ensure equal rehabilitation services to every person in Texas is included in Easter Seal Society services, he added.

## KITCHEN KORNER

We now know that it can rain a little if it wants to, don't we? How fresh the air smells right after a rain makes us realize that spring is really here with us, but I still wonder where winter went.

In the mood for spring? Why not turn Deviled Eggs into dainty white-and-gold flowers? Notch small end of egg to make petal-like opening. Remove yolks and make filling. Refill whites, using pastry tube. If egg "wobbles" cut thin slice off base. Chill.

### DEVILED EGGS

6 hard-cooked eggs, halved lengthwise  
 1/4 cup mayonnaise  
 1/4 t. salt  
 Dash pepper  
 2 t. prepared mustard  
 1 T. minced onion  
 1 T. finely chopped celery (optional)  
 1 T. finely chopped stuffed green Olives (optional)

Remove egg yolks. Mash, and combine with remaining ingredients. Refill egg whites, using pastry tube if desired. Chill. Trim tops with pimiento diamonds or paprika.

(For plump Deviled Eggs, refill only 8 halves' chop extras and use for tomato-salad trim next day.)

\* Or, substitute crumbled bacon, chopped pimiento, chives sweet pickle, or parsley.

### FROSTY FRUIT SQUARES

2 T. sugar  
 1 T. enriched flour  
 1/2 c. honey  
 1/3 c. lemon juice  
 1 beaten egg  
 1 1-pound can fruit cocktail, drained  
 1 c. ripe banana slices  
 1/3 c. diced orange sections  
 1/4 c. halved maraschino cherries  
 1 c. heavy cream, whipped

In saucepan, combine sugar, flour, and honey; bring to boiling. Cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Gradually stir lemon juice into egg, then blend in small amount of honey mixture. Return to remaining hot mixture.

Bring just to boiling, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Cool. Stir in fruits; fold in whipped cream. Pour into refrigerator tray. Freeze firm. Cut in serving-size pieces.

### MARSHMALLOW SQUARES

Omit fruit cocktail, banana, and orange. Add 1 No. 2 can of pineapple tidbits, drained, 1 cup drained canned seedless grapes, and 3 cups tiny marshmallows. Freeze in two 1-quart trays. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

### PEAR-WALDORF WITH SWISS CHEESE

1 c. dices, pared fresh pears  
 3 tart medium apples, pared and diced (about 3 cups)  
 2 T. lemon juice, fresh, frozen or canned  
 3/4 c. diced Swiss cheese  
 1/2 c. celery slices  
 1/2 c. broken California walnuts  
 2/3 c. mayonnaise or salad dressing

### Salad greens

Sprinkle pear and apple cubes with lemon juice. Add cheese, celery, and nuts. Toss lightly with mayonnaise. Chill. Serve on salad greens. Trim with pear wedges or apple rings, if desired. Makes 6 servings.

Or heap salad mixture on greens in center of large plate and trim with Pear Crown: Arrange 6 or 8 pared fresh, or canned, pear halves, pointed ends up, around salad, to form crown. Top each pear half with a maraschino cherry (with stem on).

Airman Gerber is a 1966 graduate of Nazareth High School.

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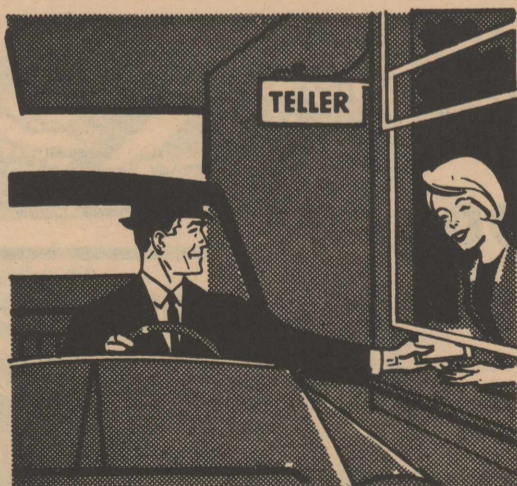
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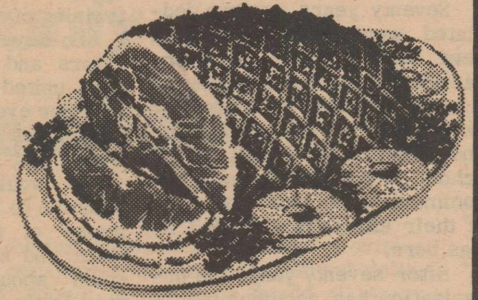
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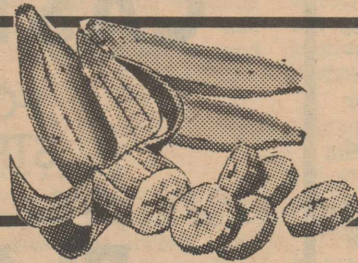
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
