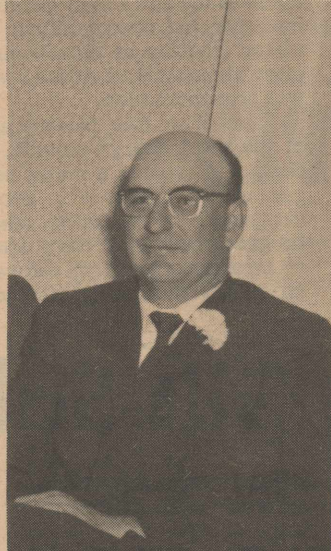

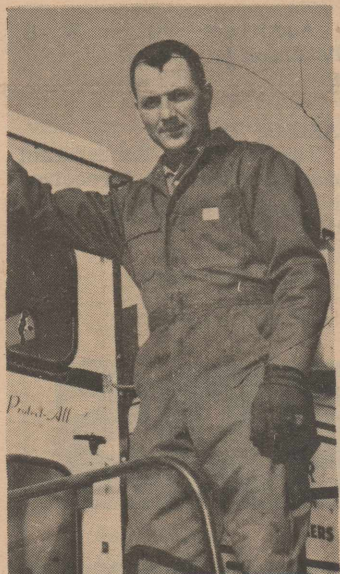

EDITORIALS

Gas Industry Points Up Free Enterprise System

Not so many years ago, people traveling across the wide plains of the Southwest frequently saw in the distance a flaming jet of gas shooting high into the air. Some of these flaming gushers of escaping natural gas went uncontrolled for long periods of time dissipating valuable energy into the atmosphere. Gradually, as the West settled, local markets close to the gas fields developed, but the real need for the energy lay in the densely populated section of the country hundreds and often thousands of miles away. The problem was transportation.

Gas today has become an important part of the total energy picture. And, in the process, has created a major new industry. The gas utility business a decade or two ago, comparatively speaking, was in its infancy. Its greatest growth came after the discovery of means to transport natural gas safely and efficiently over long distances—the pipeline.

With this development, gas came into its own. The industry is now the nation's sixth largest in terms of plant investment—\$31.3 billion.

In 1966, the industry established new records in revenues, customers served, gas usage and construction expenditures. It added 900,000 new customers to its business last year, and in construction expenditures for the same period set a new record of \$2.4 billion.

The history of the gas industry is significant for two reasons. It illustrates the growth that is a normal part of the free enterprise system—a system that offers opportunity and hope of reward to the innovator and developer. The gas industry has also show how, under the free enterprise system, conservation and utilization of resources go hand in hand. In short, the gas industry is a near perfect example of the reason for the phenomenal rise of this nation.

KITCHEN KORNER

Today is a beautiful spring day, and believe it or not, no wind! But, of course, by the time you read this it may not be so pretty.

This kind of weather always makes me think of spring house-cleaning and needless to say I am not a random housekeeper so would really like to tear into the typical cleaning of the house. This means that a quick meal is the best kind for me at this time.

When you have a small family and have quite a few left overs, it is a good idea to take foil pie plates and put a complete serving for one on each plate and wrap well and freeze for those days when you are really busy cleaning house. Just whisk them in the oven with a package of hot rolls and make a quick lettuce salad and your family will think you have spent several hours preparing the meal.

SWEDISH MEATBALLS

Blend 1 can Campbell's cream of celery soup with 1/2 can water. Measure out 1/4 c. soup mixture. Combine with:

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 2 Tbsp. minced onion
- 2/3 c. fine dry bread crumbs
- 1 Tbsp. chopped parsley, if desired

ASPARAGUS AND CHEESE

- 2 cans asparagus
- 2 Tbsp. flour (heaping)
- 1 c. grated cheese
- 1 c. juice or milk
- 1/4 cube oleo
- 3 boiled eggs, chopped

Place asparagus in baking casserole. Stir in juice or milk along with flour, salt and pepper. Add eggs, dot with oleo. Add cheese. Put in oven and bake slowly until bubbly and brown.

CHERRY CHIFFON PIE

- 1 large can evaporated milk
- 1 No. 303 can sour pitted cherries
- 1 pkg. cherry flavored gelatin
- 1 8-oz pkg. Philadelphia cream cheese
- 1 c. chopped pecans
- 1 c. sugar

Drain cherries, combine juice with enough water to make 1 cup. Mix with gelatin. Put in ice box, until sets to a soft jell.

Pour sugar over cherries. Chill milk until ice crystals form. Whip gelatin until foamy. Whip together milk and cheese to a high peak. Add gelatin, cherries and nuts. Pour into graham cracker crust. Place in ice box to chill. Makes 2 pies.

TUNA-PEA CASSEROLE

Mix together:
1 can tuna, flaked
1 tall can English peas
Add to above:
1 1/2 c. thin white sauce
Place in greased casserole dish and sprinkle generously with potato chips. Bake 15 minutes at 375 degrees F.

CHEESE NOODLE SCALLOP

- 4 c. wide noodles
- 1/4 c. butter
- 1/4 c. chopped onion
- 1/4 c. chopped green pepper
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 tsp. celery seed
- 2 c. milk
- 1 lb. cottage cheese
- 3 Tbsp. flour.

Cook noodles until tender in boiling, salted water. Drain well. Saute onion and green pepper in butter for 3 minutes.

Stir in flour, salt, pepper and celery seed. Slowly stir in milk, then cottage cheese. Toss noodles with sauce and place in a 2 quart casserole. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in 350 degree oven, 40 to 50 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

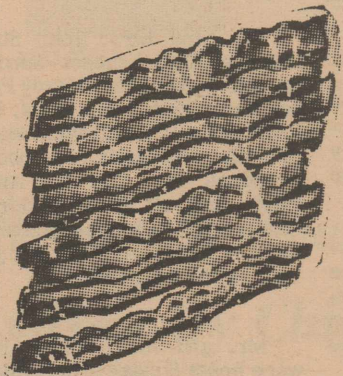

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Rheumatic Fever Causes Heart Disease

Rheumatic fever accounts for much of the heart disease found in children and young adults, says Today's Health Guide, the American Medical Association's book of health information for the American family.

Rheumatic fever usually occurs between the ages of 5 and 15, although adults can have it. It may effect any part of the body temporarily, but damage to the heart, which can be long-lasting, is the greatest danger.

Rheumatic heart disease results from the scarring of the heart muscle and valves by rheumatic fever. This may interfere with the vital work of the heart. Many patients recover without permanent injury to the heart valves, but the disease has a way of repeating itself and each attack renews the chances of heart damage.

Rheumatic fever is preceded by a streptococcal infection such as strep sore throat, scar-

let fever or a strep ear infection. It can be prevented by treating the strep infection promptly and thoroughly with antibiotics. Because persons who have had rheumatic fever are susceptible rather than immune to repeat attacks, long-term preventive treatment is often prescribed for them. Regular doses of penicillin, under the direction of a physician, can prevent further strep infections and thus ward off subsequent attacks of rheumatic fever.

You can protect your child against rheumatic fever by consulting your doctor if the child develops a sudden, severe sore throat, or if he has been exposed to someone with scarlet fever or another strep infection.

No Cure Known For Disease

The name of the ailment is psoriasis (so-RYE-ah-sis). It is a skin disorder that affects at least one out of 50 persons in the United States. It's exact cause is not known. There is no sure cure.

Most commonly psoriasis appears as itchy, silvery-scaled red patches on the elbows, knees, scalp and trunk, says a pamphlet of the American Medical Association.

The under arm and genital areas may be involved. The elbows, knees and trunk most frequently are the areas with the characteristic thick red scaling plaques. In the scalp, red plaques with sharp borders usually are visible at the hair line. These shed large quantities of silvery white scales resembling severe dandruff.

When acute psoriasis appears, many small, rain-drop-like lesions cover the body surface.

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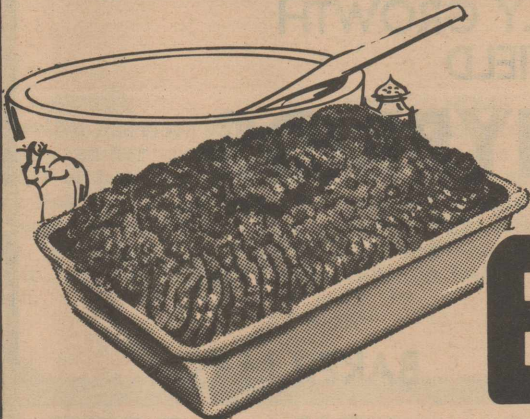
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
