Hart Girls Qualify For Regional Track Contest

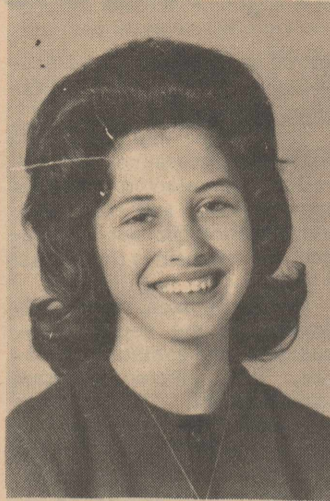
Girls Track Meet was held at Kress, April 24 with Kress, Hart Farwell and Happy entered in Class B.

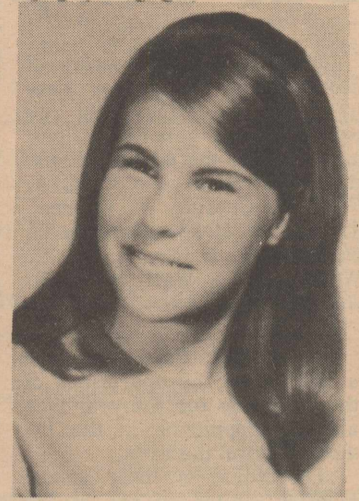

"Public Notice" Law Should Be Changed

Gas Company Meets

IN PLAINVIEW

Several of the Girl Scouts and leaders were in Plainview Saturday to attend the District Wide Practice Day.

Did you know that some real estate in Texas has been taken from owners by unscrupulous lenders because of an antiquated law that requires notice of a deed of trust sale be placed in three "public places"?

The "public places" can be a utility pole, a tree in the park and the courthouse bulletin board. This is all the notice that is required by our present state laws, and the chances are good that the only "bidder" for the distress property will be the mortgagee. He and the sheriff will be the only ones likely to know of it.

Steps are being taken right now in our state legislature to correct this sad situation. A law has been proposed by State Representatives Jack Hawkins and Bill Ragg, House Bill 343, that will require effective public notices be presented to the public and that such notices will appear in a local newspaper of general circulation.

Now before readers jump to the conclusion we're interested in this law to acquire additional revenue for this newspaper, we assure you there isn't enough of this type of business to make any great deal of difference to us financially. Besides, as we're not the county seat newspaper, such notices would most likely go to the Littlefield newspaper anyway.

House Bill 343 has merit from several

standpoints. It would provide adequate notice to the owner, giving him three weeks to round up the necessary funds to take up delinquent payments. It would also increase the sale price of the property because proper notice would attract more buyers, this increase competition for the property and the bids would be more in keeping with the property's true value.

The old practice of putting such notices on the bulletin board and on a utility pole or sapling wasn't too bad back in the horse and buggy days when the courthouse was the center of things. But this isn't the case today. Most people, unless they're suing somebody . . . or being sued, never set foot in the county courthouse. Or even if they do, will anyone search through all the copies of items on the courthouse bulletin board, or conduct a search (as if they were hunting Easter eggs) and look on every telephone pole and tree around? Certainly they won't.

This shoddy practice by unscrupulous lenders is a sordid racket that has been permitted to exist far too long in Texas. It should be stopped and the opportunity is at hand.

If you agree with us, please let our State Representative know your feelings by letter or a phone call.

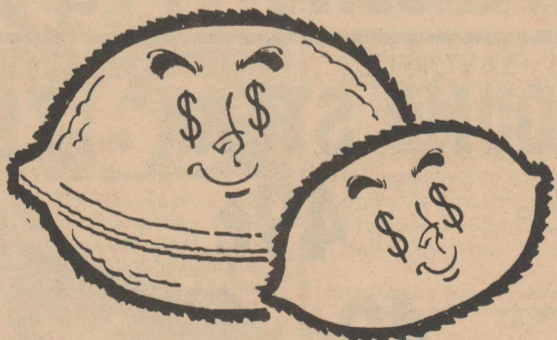

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KITCHEN KORNER

As I said the weather is just bound to get my peaches yet and I had my fingers crossed since our trees are just loaded with peaches.

They (several people) told me that it wasn't cold enough long enough so we will just wait a few days and see how we come out.

Oh yes, after seeing my picture in the paper last week I have now lost 9 lbs. from shock of seeing how I did look. It is now taped to my cupboard door as a reminder every time I open it to snack.

Maybe, just maybe, this would help us all to lose a few pounds, suppose?

STUFFED PEPPERS

- 4 to 5 medium-size green peppers
- 1 c. brown gravy mix
- 1 can (1 lb.) tomatoes
- 1 1/2 c. diced, cooked beef
- 1 c. cooked rice

Cut tops off peppers, remove seeds and white membrane. Boil in salted water 5 minutes; drain. Add gravy mix to tomatoes and bring just to a boil. Combine diced beef, rice, and tomato mixture. Fill peppers with meat mixture. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 20 to 25 minutes or until peppers are tender. 4 to 5 servings.

PINEAPPLE IN SHELL, TROPICAL STYLE

Cut off top and bottom of a chilled, thoroughly ripe fresh pineapple. Then, with a sturdy sharp knife cut around fruit inside shell, first from top, then from the bottom, leaving a thin wall.

Remove the solid cylinder of pineapple. Cut it into fairly thin slices; then cut down through the stack to make half slices.

Pile up slices, then slide shell down over them. "Pin" bottom of pineapple back in place with toothpicks. Arrange filled shell and spiky top on tray.

Each guest helps himself to a slice or two and spoons Fluffy Fruit Dip over.

FLUFFY FRUIT DIP

- 1 c. sugar
- 2/3 c. light corn syrup
- 1/2 c. hot water
- 2 stiff-beaten egg whites
- Dash salt
- 1/4 t. vanilla
- 1/4 c. mayonnaise
- 1 T. shredded orange peel

Combine sugar, corn syrup, and hot water. Heat slowly, stirring until sugar dissolves. Then boil without stirring to firm-ball stage (248 deg.). Gradually beat hot syrup into stiff beaten egg whites. Add salt and vanilla. Cool.

Fold in mayonnaise and orange peel. Serve as dressing for sliced pineapple or fruit salad, or as dunking dip for strawberries.

SWEET APPLE RING

- 1 pkg. apple-flavored gelatin
- 1 3/4 c. hot cider
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1 1/2 c. diced unpared apple
- 1 c. green seedless grapes
- 1 9-oz. can (1 cup) pineapple tidbits
- 8 to 10 marshmallows, cut in eighths

Dissolve gelatin in hot cider and add salt. Chill till partially set. Add diced apple, grapes, pineapple tidbits, and marshmallows and pour into a

5-cup ring mold. Chill until set. Unmold on lettuce. Makes 8 servings.

PEARS A' LA CREME

- 2 T. butter or margarine
- 1/3 c. light brown sugar firmly packed
- 1/2 t. cinnamon
- 1/4 t. nutmeg
- 1/4 t. ginger
- 1 - 1lb, 14 oz. can pear halves
- 1 pt. vanilla ice cream

An hour or two before guests arrive:

1. In skillet place butter, brown sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg and ginger.
2. Drain pear halves, then arrange on top of butter and sugar mixture; set aside on work surface.
3. With spoon, scoop out 6 to 8 servings of ice cream onto a baking pan; freeze.

10 minutes before serving:

4. Simmer pear halves in butter and brown sugar mixture in skillet 10 minutes, turning occasionally.
5. Meanwhile, arrange the 6 to 8 scoops of ice cream in sherbet glasses or nappy dishes.
6. Place a hot pear, cut-side down, on top of softened ice cream in each sherbet glass. Spoon the spicy glaze in skillet over the top of each one of the pears. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

HEAVENLY RICE PUDDING WITH CARDINAL SAUCE

- 2 c. very well cooked regular white rice, chilled
- 2 c. fresh or canned pineapple chunks, drained
- 1 1/2 c. miniature marshmallows
- Cardinal Sauce

- 1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen raspberries, thawed
- 1 T. cornstarch
- 1/4 c. currant jelly
- 1 c. heavy cream
- 1/4 c. unsifted confectioner's sugar
- 1/4 tsp. almond extract
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract

1. Day before: In large bowl toss rice, pineapple, and marshmallows to combine. Refrigerate, covered, overnight.

2. Make Cardinal Sauce: Drain raspberries, reserving liquid. Add enough water to raspberry liquid to measure 1 cup.

3. In small saucepan, com-

bine reserved liquid with cornstarch; mix well.

4. Bring to boiling, stirring constantly. Boil for 1 minute. The mixture will become thickened and translucent.

5. Add currant jelly to raspberry mixture; stir until melted. Remove the saucepan from heat; stir in the raspberries.

6. Refrigerate sauce, covered, 1 hour, or until ready to use.

7. Just before serving for picnic, whip cream with sugar and the extracts until stiff.

8. Fold whipped-cream mixture gently into rice-pineapple mixture, to combine.

Serve pudding with sauce spooned over it. Makes 6 to 8 servings.
