Mrs. Williams' first grade won the room count in grade school and the eighth grade won in Junior High.

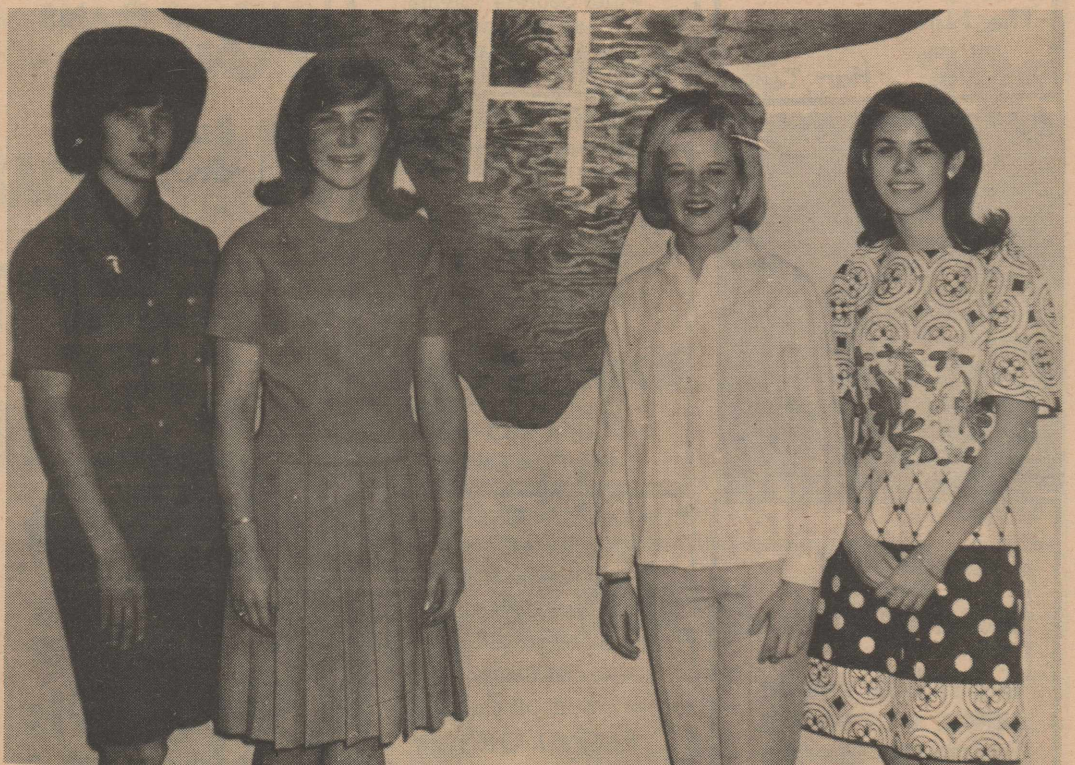

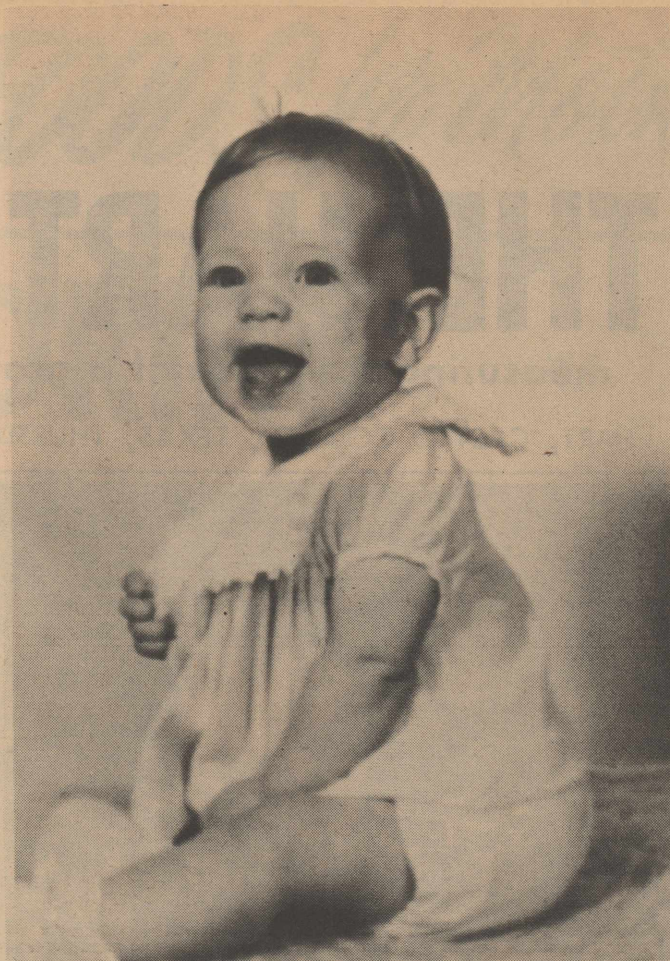

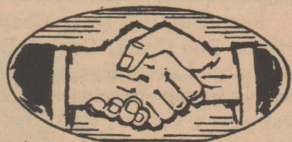

KITCHEN KORNER

Well it did freeze those peaches after all and flowers and all so it can quit freezing and warm up. There isn't anything left to freeze.

OLD FASHION CHOCOLATE CAKE

- 1/4 c. cocoa
- 2 tsp. soda
- 1 c. boiling water

Mix soda and cocoa with boiling water and let stand 30 minutes. Cream together:

- 2/3 c. crisco
- 2 c. sugar
- 2 1/2 c. flour before sifting
- 3 whole eggs
- 1 c. buttermilk

Add cocoa mixture last. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 25-30 minutes. Frost with favorite chocolate frosting.

COCOANUT CRUNCH TORTE

"Makes its own frosting-- even more delectable when topped with ice cream"

- 1 c. graham cracker crumbs
- 1/2 c. chopped moist shredded cocoanut
- 1/2 c. chopped walnuts
- 4 egg whites
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 c. sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 pt. butter brickle ice cream

Combine graham cracker crumbs, cocoanut and nuts. Beat egg whites with salt and vanilla until foamy. Gradually add sugar and continue beating until egg whites form stiff peaks. Fold graham cracker mixture into egg white mixture. Spread in well greased 9 inch pie plate or 10 x 6 x 1 1/2 inch baking pan. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees F., about 30 minutes. Cool. Cut in wedges or squares and top with scoops of ice cream. Makes 6 - 8 servings.

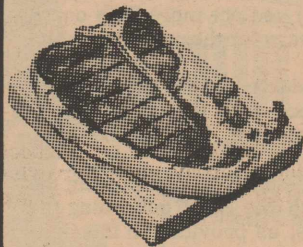

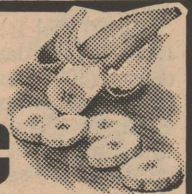

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Hart, Texas, on the 20 day of May, 1967, in obedience to a resolution and order being made a part of this Notice for all intents and purposes.

THIS NOTICE OF ELECTION is issued and given by the undersigned, pursuant to authority conferred by virtue of the attached resolution and order of the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, and under authority of law.

RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR CITY BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS
CITY OF HART
COUNTY OF CASTRO

ON THIS, the 2 day of May, 1967, the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, convened in special session at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

E. E. FOSTER MAYOR
JOHN HOLLOWAY COMMISSIONER
M. L. AVEN COMMISSIONER

and with the following absent: none, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had were the following:

The Mayor introduced a resolution and order. Commissioner Holloway moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Aven. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Mayor Foster and Commissioners Holloway and Aven.
NOES: None.

The RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 20 day of May, 1967, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"SHALL the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, be authorized to issue TWELVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$12,000) general obligation bonds of said City, for the purpose of constructing street improvements in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"SHALL the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, be authorized to issue FOUR THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$4,500) general obligation bonds of said City, for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Sanitary Sewer System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not

to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL in the CITY OF HART, TEXAS, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit:

O. D. Dinwiddie, Presiding Judge
Joe Newman, Alternate Presiding Judge

If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least two (2) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than one (1) additional Clerk, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the City Clerk's Office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S., Election Code, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$12,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$12,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$4,500 GENERAL OBLIGATION SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$4,500 GENERAL OBLIGATION SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

AS TO EACH of the foregoing two propositions, each voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the two propositions respectively.

SECTION 6: That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Clerk, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS", shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Hart, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

Payment of income tax on the interest may be deferred to redemption or maturity, and the interest is not subject to state or local income taxes," Chairman Wilson pointed out.

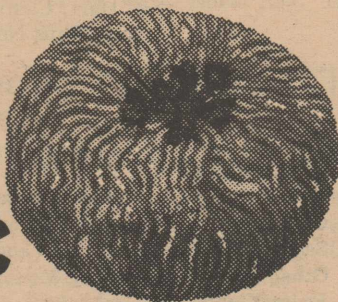

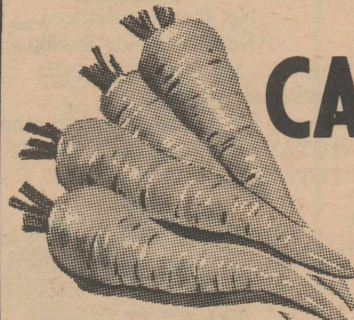
