## Cotton Allotment Vote Slated For May

Cotton farmers in Castro County will vote the middle of May to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county, Jim Elder, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced.

The referendum on the question will be conducted during the period May 15 through May 19. Ballots may be returned by mail or delivered by hand to the ASCS county office during that time.

The only question to be decided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred during the next two years to farms which are owned or controlled by someone else and located in other counties.

Such transfers may be made by sale or by lease. In no case may transfers be made outside the State. An affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote will permit such transfers during the next two years, 1968 and 1969.

Two similar referendums were conducted in 1965 and 1966 throughout the Cotton Belt, and growers in 412 counties have already approved the allotment transfers. The vote this May will be held only in counties where such transfers have not previously been approved.

The chairman points out that voting by mail is easy and con-

venient, and the vote therefore should be large and full representative of the wishes of cotton farmers in the county.

Copies of the ballot have been sent to all cotton producers of record in the county, together with information describing the program's purpose and operation. Any cotton producer who has a question about the referendum or about who is eligible to vote is urged to get in touch with the ASCS county office.

There were a total of 1047 entries, and 12 families from Hart attended.

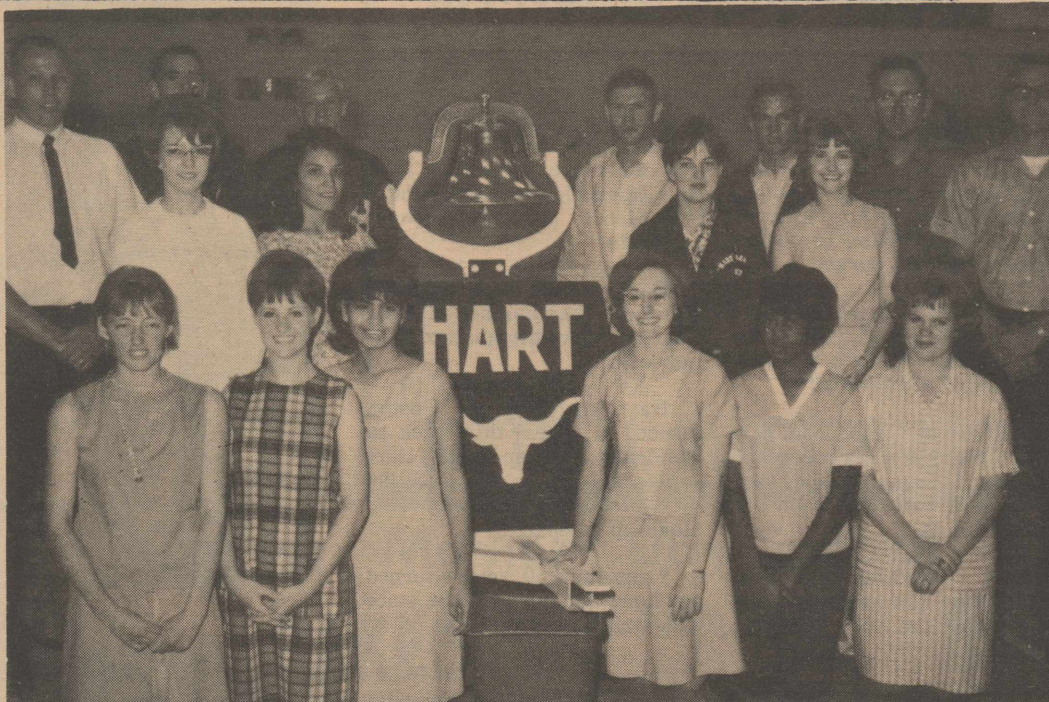

## Rene Brooks Is Elected Tech Cheerleader

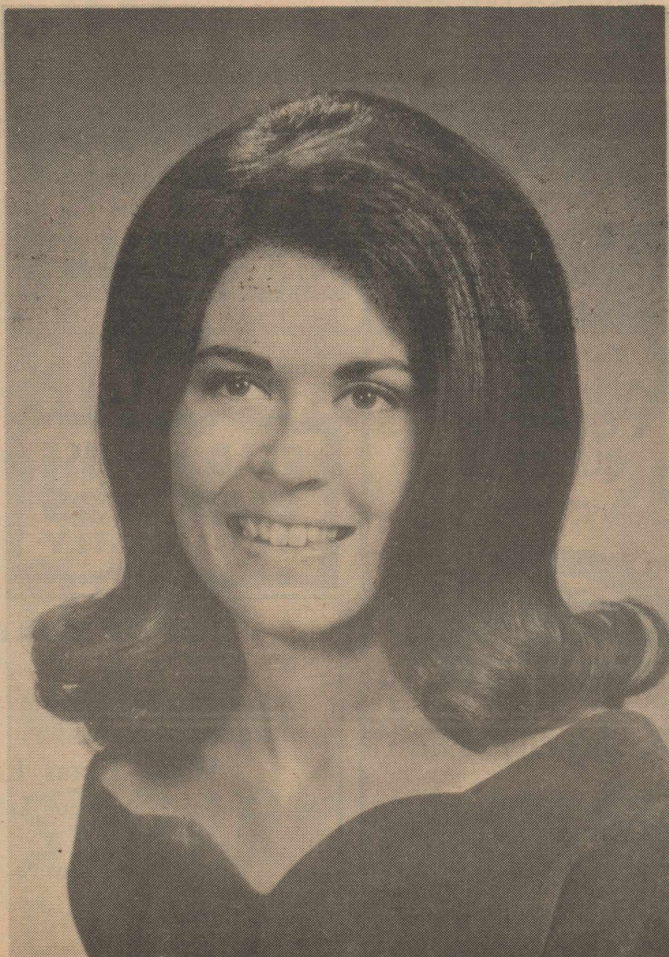
Rene Brooks of Hart was one of six new cheerleaders chosen in an all-campus election held at Texas Technological College April 28.

## Water Association To Be Formed In Lubbock

Formation of a water association made up of individuals and organizations on the High Plains of Texas and adjacent areas will be completed at a meeting to be held at the KoKo Palace in Lubbock, beginning at 2 p. m., May 24. Everyone in the area who is interested is invited to attend.

K. B. Watson of Amarillo, chairman of the water committee of the West Texas Cham-

ber of Commerce and the West Texas Advisory Committee of the Texas Water Development Board, will call the meeting to order.

Watson has been serving as temporary chairman of the organizing committee for the formation of a water association.

The water association formation has been recommended by the Texas Water Develop-

ment Board and other agencies seeking to provide new water resources for this area as the first step in a water importation program.

Water importation will need the study of the organization or organizations required for developing and distributing water in the area. The purpose of the water association will be to serve as a means of provid-

ing the information and education necessary to assure the success of this new approach to the water problem.

"The Texas Water Development Board has taken a new look at the problem of water for West Texas. One of the reasons for this is the fact that the business, agriculture, education and political leaders of this area presented a strong case for additional study dur-

ing the hearings that the TWDB held in the region.

"Now, we must follow our words with actions and begin the efforts that have been recommended to us by the water development board. The first of these, in my opinion, is the formation of a water association which includes in its membership every phase of economic and political activity in this region," Watson said.

## Tips For Gardeners

### Insects and Insecticides

Are the bugs eating up your garden?

Most insects can be knocked out with sprays, powders and other poisons, but the unwary gardener sometimes can suffer from the effects of bug sprays too.

Some tips on use of insecticides are offered in Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

\* Read the directions on the container carefully and follow them. The manufacturer spells out the proper usage and safety precautions.

\* If the directions call for rubber gloves, protective clothing or goggles, leave this alone, unless you are an expert.

\* Store the insecticide in its original container, with original label, in a safe, locked compartment, away from children and pets.

\* Destroy empty containers immediately.

\* Apply downwind, to avoid inhaling sprays and dusts. Stay out of freshly sprayed areas.

\* Do not smoke while spraying or dusting. Some of the chemicals are flammable.

\* If chemicals are spilled on skin, wash immediately and thoroughly.

\* Cover bird baths, dog dishes and fish pools before spraying. Pour left over spray down a drain or into the soil. Don't leave it around in pans or pails.

In case of accident, follow the directions on the container. If in doubt, call your physician.

# KITCHEN KORNER

By Lela Gallion

Needless to say I have been eating hamburgers these days and one day I worked late at the Burger Bar and had them for supper too since the Burger Bar

is open until 8:30.

I expect a lot of you will be doing the same. I have been neglecting to cook very much at home this past week and this changeable weather doesn't make me want to cook so it's been the quick meal plan at our house.

### CARNIVAL CANTALOUPE

1 c. diced fresh pineapple  
2 c. strawberries

1 c. honeydew melon balls  
6 pared cantaloupe rings, 1 inch thick  
Shredded lettuce

Mix pineapple, strawberries, and melon balls. Place cantaloupe rings on lettuce and fill centers with fruit mixture. Pass fruit dressing, if desired. Makes 6 servings.

### AVOCADO FRUIT TOSS

1 small head lettuce  
1/2 head curly endive

2 medium, ripe avocados  
1 c. orange sections  
1 c. grapefruit sections  
Clear French dressing  
Pomegranate seeds, if desired

Tear lettuce and endive into bite-size pieces. Halve and seed avocados. Peel; slice into bowl. Add orange and grapefruit sections. Toss with enough clear French dressing to coat. Sprinkle with pomegranate seeds. Makes 8 to 9 servings.

### SPRING SALAD BOWL

1 bunch leaf lettuce, bite-size pieces  
1/2 bunch water cress  
1 1/2 c. tiny spinach leaves  
24 carrot curls  
4 green onions with tops, chopped  
12 pitted ripe olives (optional)  
12 blanched almonds, toasted (optional)

Combine greens, carrot curls, and onions. Stuff olives with almonds and add. Toss with Italian dressing. Makes 6 servings.

### BLUEBERRY MUFFINS

1 3/4 c. sifted enriched flour  
2 T. sugar  
2 1/2 t. baking powder  
3/4 t. salt  
1 well-beaten egg  
1/2 c. milk  
1/3 c. shortening, melted  
1 c. fresh or well-drained frozen blueberries  
2 T. sugar

Sift together the flour, 2 tablespoons sugar, baking powder, and salt into a mixing bowl. Make a well in the center. Combine egg, milk, and shortening; add all at once to dry ingredients. Stir quickly only till dry ingredients are moistened.

Toss berries with the remaining sugar; gently stir into batter. Drop batter into greased muffin pans, filling 2/3 full. If desired, sprinkle tops with a little sugar. Bake in hot oven (400 deg.) 20 to 25 minutes. Makes 1 dozen. Oven-hot Blueberry Muffins are good with all salads.

### BLACK-CHERRY SQUARES

2 1-lb. cans (4 cups) pitted Bing cherries  
1/3 c. lemon juice, fresh, frozen, or canned  
1 Pkg. orange-flavored gelatin  
3/4 c. broken pecans  
2/3 c. sliced stuffed green olives.

Drain cherries; add enough of cherry syrup to lemon juice to make 1 3/4 cups liquid. Heat; pour over gelatin and stir till dissolved. Chill till partially set. Add the cherries, nuts, and olives. Pour into 10 x 6 x 1 1/2 inch pan and chill till firm. Cut in squares and serve on lettuce. Or chill in individual molds and unmold on pineapple rings. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

### RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR CITY BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS

COUNTY OF CASTRO

ON THIS, the 2 day of May, 1967, the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, convened in special session at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

E. E. FOSTER MAYOR  
JOHN HOLLOWAY COMMISSIONER  
M. L. AVEN COMMISSIONER

and with the following absent: none, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had were the following:

The Mayor introduced a resolution and order. Commissioner Holloway moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Aven. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Mayor Foster and Commissioners Holloway and Aven.  
NOES: None.

The RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 20 day of May, 1967, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

#### PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"SHALL the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, be authorized to issue TWELVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$12,000) general obligation bonds of said City, for the purpose of constructing street improvements in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

#### PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"SHALL the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, be authorized to issue FOUR THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$4,500) general obligation bonds of said City, for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Sanitary Sewer System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not

to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL in the CITY OF HART, TEXAS, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit:

O. D. Dinwiddie, Presiding Judge  
Joe Newman, Alternate Presiding Judge

If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least two (2) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than one (1) additional Clerk, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the City Clerk's Office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S., Election Code, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

#### PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$12,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$12,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

#### PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$4,500 GENERAL OBLIGATION SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$4,500 GENERAL OBLIGATION SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

AS TO EACH of the foregoing two propositions, each voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the two propositions respectively.

SECTION 6: That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Clerk, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS", shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Hart, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.



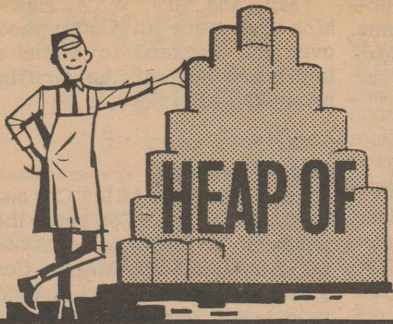

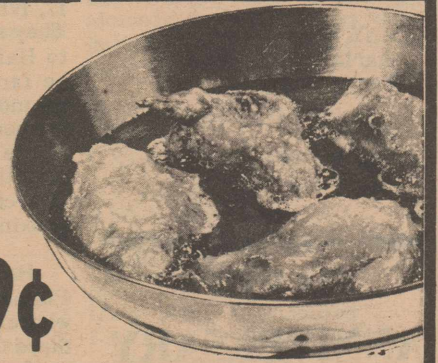
