#### **Damaged Or Destroyed Wheat Raises Questions**

Numerous inquiries have been made, regarding the use of land on which wheat has been seriously damaged by the recent freeze. In answering this question the following options apply:

Farms not participating in the wheat or feed grain program may replant the land to any crop he chooses. However, if it is replanted to feed grain thereby causing the farm feed thereby causing the farm feed grain base to be exceeded this would make the producers in-eligible for feed grain payments on any other farm.

If the farm is participating in both the wheat and feed grain programs: any part or all the wheat acreage may be replanted to soybeans, castor beans or vegetables and be eligible for wheat certificate payment without any approval from the ASCS County Committee.

If the farm is participating in both the wheat and feed grain programs and the operator desires to plant feed grain on the destroyed wheat acres he shall make a written request to the county committee for reclassification of the acreage he desires to replant to feed grain under the substitution provisions before he plants the feed grain. This is necessary since you have reported your wheat acreage to this office and such

reported acreage must be changed or reclassified, otherwise the total wheat and feed grain acreage would exceed the total of such permitted acreage.

In order to earn your full wheat certificate payment thirty-five percent of the wheat allotment must remain classified as wheat and not replanted to feed grain. However, this 35 percent may be replanted to soybeans or some other crop except feed grain and still earn certificate payment.

Wheat acreage may not be reclassified for the purpose of substituting feed grain if it has been cut for hay, grazed or harvested in any manner, after May 1. Neither could such acreage be used as diverted

The respect the boys had for the girls and the respect the group had for all was displayed and practiced in fine fashion.

The fun experienced from water guns to the exertion from climbing the 290 steps to the top of Seven Falls was eventful fun of which will live in the minds of these people for a long long time.

The trip being a climax of twelve years work was a joyous one and was financed by money earned by the group at various projects through past years- It could not have been spent more wisely.

We know that in growing up the situation of trial and error presents itself and the thirst for knowledge among these young people is evident and is also a necessity in becoming mature adults, but if most young people are of the caliber of this group then the world can look forward to surpassing the prosperous level we now maintain.

Our view has been broadened through an experience we will never forget- so let the sun shine tomorrow and let there be another day because our young people are most capable of making their way.

### 53 Feet Of Water Recharged At HPRF

water was recharged through two multi-purpose (artificial recharge) wells at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1966, according to Jim Valliant, soil scientist at the research

A total of 636 acre-feet of run-off water which includes both tailwater and rainfall, has been recharged into the Ogallala formation through the two multi-purpose wells since 1959. The water recharged in the experimental research well recorded during the eight-year period was 352 acre-feet. A second well, which is the type that would normally be used by a farmer, with no experimental equipment, was installed in 1961. From 1961 through 1966, a total of 285 acre-feet of water have been recharged through this

This savings of 636 acrefeet (or a little more than 207 million gallons) is enough water to completely irrigate the onehalf section farm at Halfway two years. Appro same water could have been lost to evaporation if it had not been stored underground.

five acre-feet of underground them to stay for the summer.

Fifty-three feet of valuable water has been pumped for irrigation at the Research Foundation since 1959. 26.4 per cent of this amount came from the water which was recovered by recharge.

Several grasses, hybrid sorghum grazers, and ryewere planted in the playa lake at the experimental recharge well site in 1966. Some of the advantages of these crops are: (1) cover for the lake bed, (2) partial filtering of run-off water, (3) tolerance to flooding and, (4) a source of income from grazing the lake bed.

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

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## KITCHEN

I have a few tips this week you may like to use so will pass them along, hoping some of you may get some good from them.

If a cracked dish is boiled for 45 minutes in sweet milk, the crack will be so welded together that it will hardly be visible, and will be so strong it will stand the same usage as before.

Put a layer of marshmallows in the bottom of a pumpkin pie, then add the filling. You will have a nice topping as the marshmallow will come to

Dip your bananas in lemon juice right after they are peeled. They will not turn dark and the faint flavor of lemon really adds quite a bit. The same may be

done with apples.

A leaf of lettuce dropped into the pot absorbs the grease from the top of the soup. Remove the lettuce and throw it away as soon as it has served its purpose.

To prevent splashing when frying meat, sprinkle a little salt into the pan before putting

If the juice from your apple pie runs over in the oven, shake some salt on it, which causes the juice to burn to a crisp so it can be removed.

Add a little vinegar to the water when an egg cracks during boiling. It will help seal the

Small amounts of left over corn may be added to pancake batter for variety.

Use a strawberry huller to peel potatoes which have been boiled in their 'jackets'.

To make bread crumbs, use fine cutter of the food grinder and tie a large paper bag over the spout to prevent flying

#### SALAD TIPS

For Appeal To The Appetite Chill ingredients before mixing-except for molded

Provide tartness in the body of salad or dressing.

Use salad greens other than lettuce sometimes. Have you tried chicory, escarole, endive, kale, spinach, dandelion greens, romaine, watercress, and chinese cabbage?

Sprinkle orange, lemon, lime or pineapple juice on fruits that may turn dark-apples, peaches, and bananas, for instance.

For tossed green salads, tear greens in fairly large pieces or cut with scissors. Larger pieces give more

body to the salad.

Prevent wilting and sogginess by drying the greens used in salads. draining canned foods well before adding to salad, using just enough salad dressing to moisten. For raw vegetable salads, add dressing at the last minute.
