Fire Destroys School Bus Barn

Baptist Meet Held Monday

Mrs. Elkins Hurt In Fire

Mrs. Gerald Elkins was seriously burned in an explosion at her home Monday about 2:30 p. m.

She was taken to the Olton Community Hospital and Clinic where she was given first aid and rushed to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, where she is reported to be in serious condition.

She suffered second and third degree burns on more than half of her body. Neither Elkins nor the two children at home were injured when the accident occurred.

The explosion, caused by butane, occurred in the kitchen, blowing out the back door and damaging the kitchen cabinets.

Damage Set At \$5,000

A noon-hour blaze caused approximately \$5,000 damage on the Hart School grounds Wednesday.

Destroyed in the fire was the school's bus repair barn, along with a school bus parked inside and repair equipment.

Loss on the building is expected to be about \$2,500, and the bus, a 1962 model, \$1,000.

Equipment destroyed included an air compressor, two welders, five new truck tires, several cases of oil, grease, oil filters, a hoist, hand tools, an electric grinder and miscellaneous parts.

Also destroyed were two engines out of other school buses and a hood from another bus.

The fire was noticed by H. L. Cheatham, who was outside changing the water on his lawn.

Cheatham said he saw smoke at the building, but thought it was coming from behind the building.

He sent Sue Bates to check on it. She called back that the smoke was coming from inside the building and Cheatham went to call the fire department.

Since it was during the noon hour, it took the fire department approximately 15 minutes to get enough members together to get to the fire.

Several tanks of compressed gas used in welding inside the building exploded during the fire, but no one was injured.

Farmers Reminded Of Allotment Filing Date

Final date to file an application for a new farm wheat allotment is June 30.

To be eligible a producer can not own or operate a farm with a wheat allotment and must derive 50 per cent of his income from the farm on which the application is made.

Producers who wish to receive planted acreage credit for abandoned cotton acreage which is to be replanted to another crop must file a written request for such credit and receive approval of the county committee before the acreage is replanted.

In order to be eligible for payments and history credit, producers must have planted and farmed the cotton in a workmanlike manner with the expectation of producing a normal crop.

Acreage which the county committee determines was abandoned without cause or was planted in an unworkmanlike manner solely for price support payments or history purposes will not be counted as planted acreage.

Wheat destroyed by natural causes to the extent that no grain or forage crop remains may be

reclassified if requested in writing by the farm operator.

Check with the ASCS office on the feed grain substitution provision and diverted acreage uses that may be allowed on the wheat acreage for which reclassification is requested.

Wheat acreage harvested in any manner or grazed after May 1, 1967 will not be eligible for reclassification.

REMEMBER - JULY 31, 1967 is maturity date for cotton loans, also final date for payment of loans.

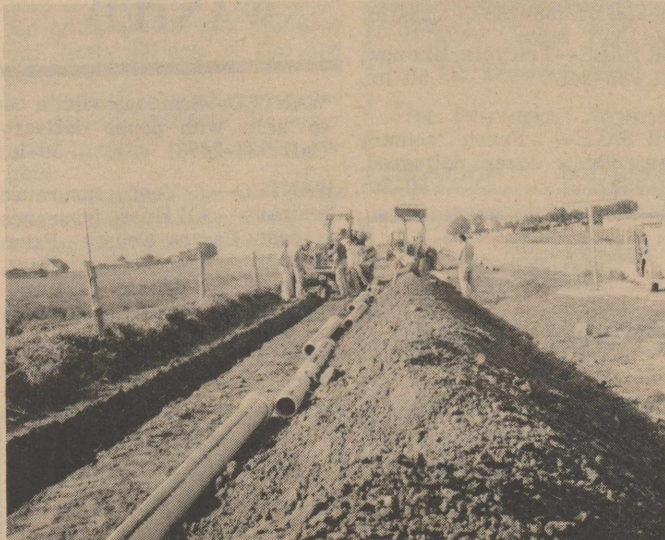
L.M. Carter Injured In Fall At Home

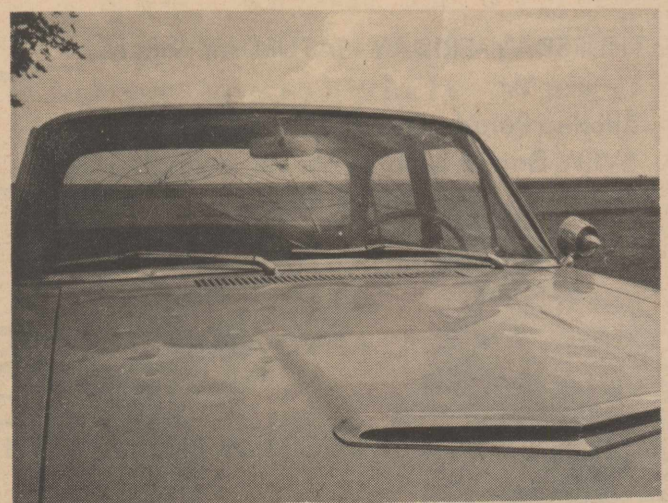
He suffered a broken arm, broken collar bone, broken ribs and cuts and bruises in the fall.

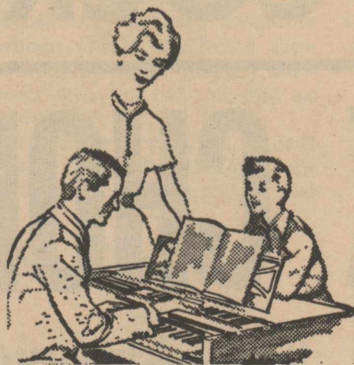
