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Tax Increase Is Foreseen

Tucker, Sharp

Win Tourney

Lanny Tucker of Hart teamed with Shirley Sharp of Olton Tuesday to win first place in the Scotch Foursome Golf Tournament at Olton Country Club with an 18-hole score of 62.

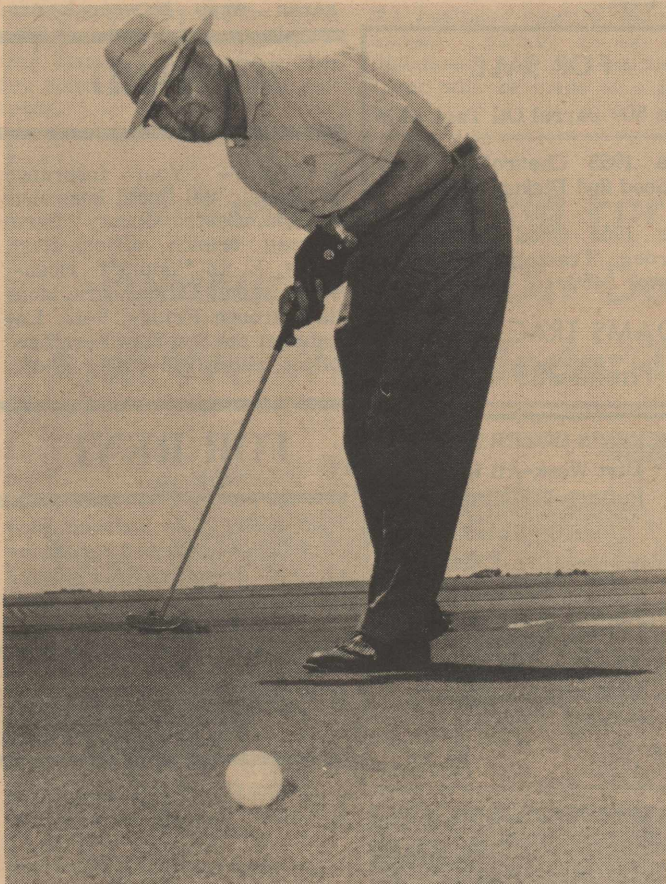
Mrs. Sharp is virtually a beginner at the game. She is currently taking lessons, but had played about half a dozen rounds before helping Tucker chalk up the best course score of the day.

Louis Hair and Francine Andrew, both of Olton took second with a 68 score for the course.

T. J. Roberson of Olton and Laura Dudley of Hart followed close behind posting a 69 stroke total to capture third.

Mrs. Dudley said she had never played a game of golf in her life prior to Tuesday's win.

First place winners got \$51 in golf equipment for their day's outing. Second place team received \$33.60 in equipment and third place winners took home golf merchandise valued at \$22.40.

Enough Is Enough Say Rainsoaked Farmers

A spot check of local farmers and businessmen this week indicated Hart crops have apparently reached their saturation point and are only slightly harmed by the mounting moisture.

Monday night's showers filled rain gauges in town to the 2-inch mark. The following night brought an additional .30-inch reading.

The combined moisture total boosted Hart's rainfall since June 1 to 6 inches at the official gauge here, according to official recorder H. E. Loman. Area farmers have collected from 12 to 16 inches of rain for the same period.

Weather conditions in the Nazareth region, about 11 miles north of Hart, continue to differ sharply with those here. That area reported only light showers Monday and Tuesday.

No crop damage was reported here from heavy rains that dumped up to 2.5 inches of moisture on already water-logged fields.

Unlike last month's numerous storms, however, the first rains of July contained no hail.

Willis A. Hawkins Jr., vice president of Farmers State Bank of Hart, said he believed the most recent rains have actu-

ally made farmers money--if the moisture ceases for a while.

He conceded that most of this season's cotton crop has been beaten to death by June storms that often carried golf-ball size hail. But he concluded milo and soybean crops were now growing better than usual. Hart farmers are speaking of Monday and Tuesday's showers as "delaying" rather than "damaging."

"We have just had too much rain," said Mrs. Paul Brooks on her farm a mile south of Hart. She said her crops were "fair" but were in need of sunshine.

Ralph Futrell, a potato farmer on the east edge of town, said simply, "It should have stopped raining about 10 days ago."

None of the growers, regardless of their crop, differed with Futrell's diagnosis.

Buster Aven who farms southeast of Hart said it would have helped the condition of his crops if the last two rains had not fallen.

He admitted the unwelcomed water saved the trouble and expense of at least one watering on his irrigated land, but he added that some of his weed

spraying was not effective since much of it was washed away by closely spaced downpours.

Bud Steiret said weeds were rapidly growing in his field five miles north of Hart. He said his land, like that of his neighbors, was too wet to work.

Steiret looked on the brighter side of the persistent black storm clouds, however, as he observed: "This has happened in the years before and it will happen again. History merely repeats itself."

Wheat farmers, still faced with harvesting at least a fourth of this year's crop, are not so optimistic about the water.

Some wheat growers in Hart report recent rains have also moved across Kansas and Nebraska, delaying custom combining.

Weeds are reported to be as high as the wheat in many unharvested fields here.

Reports of damage from the first storm this month concerned lightning rather than traditional hail and wind foes.

Severe thunderstorms blanketing the region for the past two weeks have brought lightning bolts which struck several television sets in the area, in addition to numerous light bulbs and wall sockets.

Says Texas House Speaker During Meeting Wednesday

Liquor by the drink, taxes and West Texas wetness all came in for comment by Texas House Speaker Ben Barnes Wednesday.

The comments came at a meeting of Lamb County and area government leaders and press members with Barnes at State Rep. Billy Clayton's home just west of Springlake.

Barnes was in Muleshoe the day before to speak at a July 4 celebration in that town.

In commenting on the liquor by the drink proposal by Gov. John Connally in the past legislature, Barnes had several remarks.

"The state legislature will definitely reapportion in 1970. That will give the four large urban areas in Texas--Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth and San Antonio--more than half the seats in the Texas legislature.

"These areas definitely want liquor by the drink and if they can get together, we will have liquor by the drink in Texas, probably by 1971."

Barnes, who said he voted against previous liquor by the drink bills, said he felt the private club set-up in Texas now amounts to little more than liquor by the drink, and if the state allows such clubs to operate as they do now, he felt they should pay state taxes and come under closer state supervision.

In discussing taxes, Barnes said he thought Texas was in good shape financially, but increased taxes will become necessary.

He said if the Middle East oil crisis continues, the oil allowable in Texas will remain higher than it has been and the increased production will provide some state revenue.

He said the upcoming HemisFair in San Antonio, along with the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City, would bring an estimated 10 million extra tourists to Texas next year, thus providing another source of state income.

Other sources of possible tax money included by the Speaker were a broader base for the current sales tax, a tax on amusements and an increased tax on alcohol and cigarettes.

In commenting on the weather, Barnes said he had heard from Texas Tech's president, Dr. Grover Murray, several times on the center for the study of arid lands at Tech, but that since he had been to West Texas, all it had done was rain.

Barnes also commented on his future political plans.

"If Gov. Connally does not run next year, I might possibly

be a candidate for governor."

Barnes said if Connally runs, he definitely will not be a candidate for the top state position. He said he thought Preston Smith, Don Yarborough and Franklin Spears were all likely candidates for the next governor's race.

Barnes also commented on the problems currently going on in the South Texas Valley region.

Barnes said he felt the charges of brutality against Texas Rangers in the labor-management disputes were largely unjustified.

He said he felt one of the main solutions to the problem was to get the migrant worker's children into school so that they could learn skills necessary to improve their situation.

Barnes also said he felt Texas should spend more on marketing and developing new agricultural products.

Comparing states, Barnes said Texas spent \$40,000 last year on marketing problems, while California spent \$6.5 million in the same period.

Ledger, state president of Texas PTA; Dr. Bernice Moore, assistant director, Hogg Foundation for Mental Health; Judge Joe Greenhill, associate justice, Texas Supreme Court; and L. P. Sturgeon, executive director of governmental and public relations, Texas State Teachers Association.

Evaluation panels, group discussions, reports of successful action projects, and a general assemble discussion also familiarized delegates with techniques of leadership performance in local PTA's, PTA councils, and districts.

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KITCHEN KORNER

I must say it really doesn't know when to stop raining, does it? Our weeds seem to be growing faster than any thing else.

If your youngsters like something cool - try making a package of their favorite jello, then add two extra cups water pour into icecube trays and freeze when the mixture is half frozen stick a toothpick into each cube and you have miniature popsicles also you have the extra protein that jello has in it.

To the lady in Olton who asked about freezing Cantaloupe my freezing book says to peel, cut in thick slices or make balls, pack in layers, sprinkled with confectioners sugar. Place saran wrap between layers.

Serve slightly frosty.

I tried it without the sugar and we liked it best but is pretty good with the sugar. Everyone has a different taste but we like salt and pepper on our cantaloupe.

CANTALOUPE SALAD

- 1 pkg. lime jello
- 2 c. hot water
- 4 ripe peaches, diced
- 20 cantaloupe balls
- 1 c. Thompson seedless grapes

Dissolve Jello in hot water and let cool. When Jello has colled, add peaches, cantaloupe and grapes. Let set and serve.

OLD-FASHIONED POTATO SOUP

- 2 large potatoes
- 1 medium onion
- 3 c. milk
- salt
- pepper

Cube potatoes, add salt and onion cut in half. Cook until most of water is gone. Add butter, milk and pepper. Let come to the boiling point but do not boil. The onion is removed and used to season. Serve with crackers.

MEAT CASSEROLE DINNER

- 2 c. (uncooked) noodles
- 1/2 c. oil
- 1 lb. veal cubes
- 1 green pepper, coarsely chopped
- 1 large onion, coarsely chopped
- 2 c. tomato sauce
- 1 can whole-kernel corn
- 1/2 c. sliced ripe olives
- Salt and pepper to taste

In heavy skillet heat the oil. In it brown veal cubes, then green pepper and onion. Add tomato sauce, corn, ripe olives, and salt and pepper to taste. Simmer for 5 minutes. Then add 2 cups uncooked noodles. Pour into a greased 2 qt. casserole and bake in a 350 degree F. oven for 1 hour. Will serve 6.

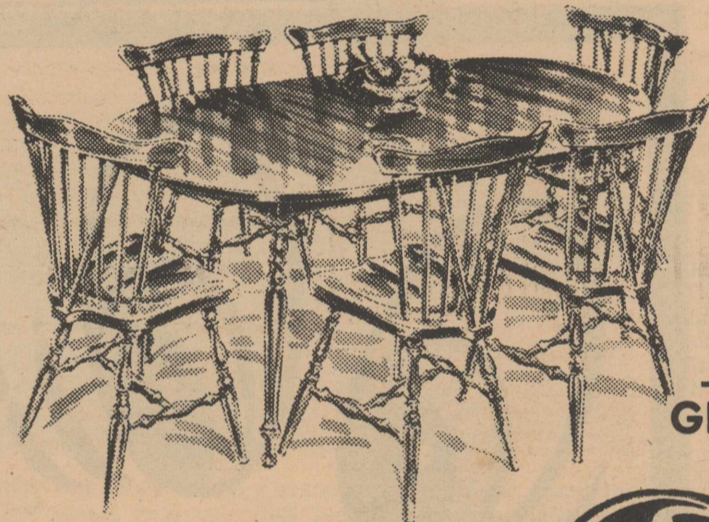

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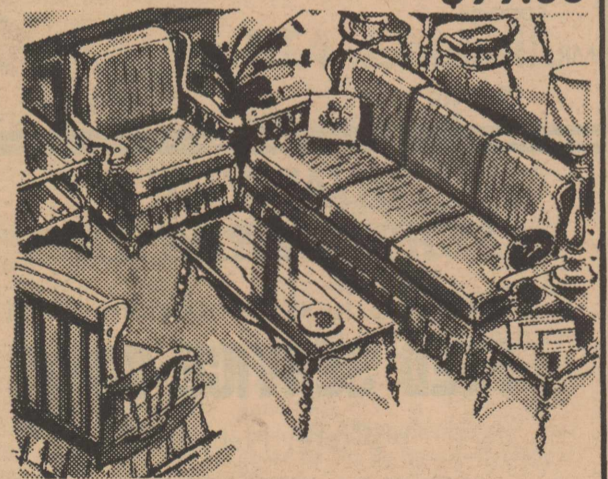


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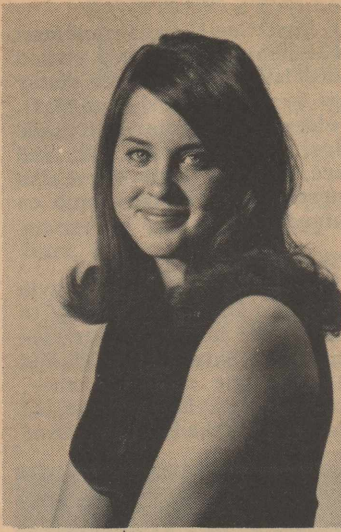
