New Teacher Hired During Regular Meet

Members of the Hart School Board hired one teacher for the coming year and accepted the resignation of another during a regular meeting here Monday night.

The faculty addition is Raul Vera, 37, of Plainview. He will teach special education and Spanish in Hart High School. Vera is a May graduate of Wayland Baptist College and is scheduled to receive degrees in Spanish and business administration from there next month.

Vera will move to Hart later this summer with his wife Carmen and their five children, Christine, 9; Johnny Ray, 7; Susan, 5; Cheryl, 18 months; and Hank, 6 months.

Outgoing teacher is Mrs. Vir-

ginia Williams who is retiring after three years as a high school commercial art and English teacher.

The board also voted to increase substitute teachers' pay from \$10 to \$12.50 a day.

here in Mexico. He had sold everything and made preparations to come when he became ill. He went to Temple, Texas to have some tests made and the doctors there discovered a brain tumor. They operated on Bro. Bill but he never regained consciousness.

The first thing everyone is prone to ask is "Why?" "How could this thing be?". But his wife and children have accepted this as of the Lord. We too, have accepted God's will and know that some day we will see clearly. We know that just as the Lord tells us in Rom. 8:28, all things work together for good to those who love Him. We need someone so badly and yet we want His will to be done.

EDITORIALS What Morale Is Made Of

Among the greatest weapons a soldier can take into battle is one, in particular, which cannot be seen. It is never issued to him with the rest of his equipment, and it is not to be found in his post exchange or on the black market.

Servicemen call it Morale--that set of mind that makes a man "feel" a desire to do his very best, even at times when he fails to see the means or meaning of doing

so. Where does this morale come from? For the American fighting men in Viet Nam, it is mostly an import from the United States. The best grades originate in a place called Hometown U.S.A.

This issue of the Hart Beat carries in its editorial columns two signed letters from American servicemen for recent local shipments of this invaluable commodity.

These letters, like the one published last week, demonstrate the large part a small town can play in winning a war. Probably few persons will note Hart's contribution in cookery, but those to whom it was directed will obviously never forget. Local citizens cannot literally march into

battle with their young men, of course, but they can and do stand behind the military

effort in their own way. Hart's "home front" is as real and crit-ical to the cause as any, and this front is vital to the creation of morale.

As these letters indicate, even an insignificant-looking cookie can be a truly sig-nificant sign of thoughtfulness and support to a soldier. It is evidence at least, that people back home are giving time for a serviceman who is giving his time--and perhaps his life-for them.




