County Precinct Boundaries Shift

Castro County Commissioners last week voted 3-1 to shift other side. the west boundry of precinct l to U. S. Highway 385, thus adding a half mile strip to the eastern edge of neighboring precinct the precincts, pointing out that

Precinct 2, in turn, gave up a mile and a half along its north border to Precinct 3. E. I. "Tump" McClain,

commissioner of precinct 1, cast the dissenting vote against the changes. Commissioners Dale Winders, precinct 2, J. M. Wright, precinct 3, and Al Maurers, precinct 4, voted in favor of the move during a regular meeting July 10.

The plan was devised primarily to equalize the sizes of the four precincts and to facilitate work county maintenance within them, explained County Judge Raymond Wilson.

He pointed out that precinct l, in which Hart is located, had always been the largest of the four and precinct 3 had been the smallest.

"This will not equalize the precincts exactly," said Wilsaid Wilson, "but it will make them a little more equal."

None of the four commissioners were available for comment on the changes this week.

Wilson added that shifting the boundaries to highways eliminated the necessity for county machinery assigned to a particular precinct to stop work and turn around in the middle of a section or cross a busy roadway in order to maintain

a narrow strip of land on the

He said he could see no reason why the alteration could not be agreeable to residents of all similar changes were made between precincts 3 and 4 in 1959 without disagreement.

Wilson explained that present alterations were not made in precincts 2 and 3 eight years ago because of the presence of a bonded county road in precinct 2 at the time.

Action was delayed until the road bond was retired, according to Wilson, to avoid paperwork involved in changing the bond holder from one precinct to another.

He conceded that Precinct one would probably lose about \$1,000 a year in county property valuation, but he added that the precinct, still the largest in the county, received a third of the county funds allocated to the precincts.

He estimated the allocation would not drop below 30 percent of the county total, even with the recent change in boundary.

He figured the precinct l current budget at \$61,000; Precinct 2 at \$54,000; Precinct 3 and 4 at \$44,000 each.





RESOLUTION APPROVING AND ADOPTING ESTIMATES OF THE COST OF IMPROVEMENTS, OF AMOUNTS TO BE ASSESSED FOR IMPROVE-MENTS IN THE NATURE OF GRADING, LAYING CURB AND GUTTER AND PAVING PORTIONS OF STREETS, HIGHWAYS AND AVENUES IN AND ALONG THE BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS, FIXING THE TIME AND PLACE FOR HEARING OF THE OWNERS OF ABUTTING PROPERTY, AND OTHER PERSONS INTERESTED IN SAID PROPERTY AND DIRECTING THE CITY SECRETARY TO PUBLISH NOTICE ON BE-HALF OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Hart has heretofore ordered that portions of the streets, highways and avenues be improved by grading, installing concrete curb and gutter and paving with caliche base and triple asphalt surface together with incidentals and appurtenances and arrangements therefor have been made and entered into by the City of Hart, Texas, with High Plains Pavers, Inc., and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Hart has caused the City Engineer to prepare and file estimates of the costs of such improvements and estimates of the amounts per front foot to be assessed against abutting property and the owners thereof, and such estimates have been approved and examined:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS, by which is meant the governing body of the City, sometimes referred to as the City Commission:

TANGY LEMON-ORANGE MERINGUE PIE

SHELL: 1 1/2 c. sifted flour 1/2 c. shortening 1/2 tsp. salt 2 T. mild cheese, grated 4 T. chilled orange juice

Sift flour and salt into bowl and cut in shortening. Blend until consistency of coarse then blend in grated meal. cheese. Gradually sprinkle in the orange juice, mixing lightly with a fork. Press into a ball and roll out into a 12-inch circle of dough. Fit dough into a 9-inch pie plate, fluting the edge with thumb and two fingers. Prick with a fork and bake in moderate oven at 350 degree F. until lightly browned. Set aside to cool while making the filling.

FILLING:

l c. orange juice 1 c. water Juice of 1 lemon 1/4 tsp. salt 3/4 c. sugar 5 T. cornstarch 1 T. butter 6 large-sized marshamallows 3 egg yolks, beaten 1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind 3 drops lemon flavor

Beat egg whites and salt until foamy. Add sugar gradually, beating until meringue forms soft peaks. Add flavoring. Pile lightly on filling which has been poured into baked pie shell, being careful to have meringue cover filling completely to the edge of pie shell. Sprinkle top with 1 tablespoon sugar and bake to a delicate brown.

PEACH PARFAIT PIE

CRUST:

1/2 c. soft shortening 11/2 c. flour 1/2 tsp. salt 3 T. ice water

Combine shortening, flour and salt and work in with pastry blender or beat with electric mixer. Blend well. Add ice water and mix lightly. Bake in 400 degree F. oven until golden brown, then place in refrigerator to chill.

FILLING: l pkg. lemon jello l c. hot water l can sliced peaches, finely chopped, reserving several slices for garnish l pt. vanilla ice cream

Dissolve Jello in hot water. Add finely chopped peaches and place in refrigerator to cool. After cooling, mix in thoroughly the softened ice cream. At this point, pour mixture into cooled pie shell, and return to re-frigerator, Chill. For best results, it is sometimes wise to return mixture to refrigerator after adding ice cream and let chill for 30 minutes before placing in pie shell.

BROWNIES 1 c. butter or oleo 1 c. nuts 2 sq. chocolate pinch salt 2 c. sugar l scant c. flour 4 eggs

Cream butter and sugar, add melted chocolate, salt, flour and eggs (one at a time) beating well. Add nuts and bake in a slow oven until done.


