### Acreage Must Be Reported

Hart and area farmers participating in federal crop payment programs were reminded this week of the Aug. 15 deadline for reporting acreages under the various plans.

Filing requirements extend to cotton, feed grains, soybeans, used for feed grain price support payments, diverted acreage, and acreage of castor beans, sesame or guar planted on diverted land, according to Charley Hill, office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Soil Conservation Service in Dimmitt, who made the call.

The same deadline will hold for adjustments on non-participating farms.

Hill noted reporting data was the first step in processing a farmer's claim in order for checks to be mailed. Pay-

ment will be made automatically on a first-come, first-serve basis from ASCS offices in New Orleans, La.

He cautioned operators to measure carefully since payment will be reduced approximately three times the diversion payment rate for each acre short of compliance.

ASCS officials will measure acreage on 25 percent of the county farms after the deadline, Hill said, and noted there will be no opportunity to make adjustments on lands under the programs after that date.

"If you are participating in any of the diversion programs, you cannot exceed the allotment or base acreage on any farm in which you have an interest," he added.

### Burglars Hit Potato Shed

Police officials here are still investigating a reported burglary last Thursday night at a potato shed of the H & S. Produce Co. on the western edge of the city.

An undetermined amount of money was taken in the apparent breakin, authorities said.

County Sheriff Jack Cartwright, Deputy Granville Mar-

tin, and Highway Patrolman Butch Albers of Canyon who investigated the incident, theorize one or more persons entered the shed through a small hole cut in the ceiling. No other damage to the building or its contents was reported.

No arrests have yet been made in connection with the burglary.

## Special Fire Phones Now Installed Here

938-25001 That number could mean the difference between life and death, safe property and none, for Hart residents from now on.

It is the number for reporting fires to the local fire department, and it is part of a

new signal device used by volunteer fire fighters.

The new number will simultaneously ring telephones of several volunteers who can then sound the general siren with a mechanism built into their special phone sets.

The recently-installed sounding systems, approved by the city commissioners in June, is designed to speed answers to fire alarms.

### Tie For Third

### At Tech Meet

Hart High School cheerleaders had a little more to cheer about after returning from the six-day Summer Cheerleader School on the Texas Tech campus last week.

Local girls tied with Esteline High School for third place in yell competition on the last night of the event.

Director Edsel Buchanan of Tech's Intramural Department explained that contests were divided into five categories--large groups of six or more members, two medium groups of four or five, small groups of three and under, and junior high squads. Borger High and Farmington, N. M. High tied for first in Hart's class. Sudan High was second.

Hart's foursome, including head cheerleader Linda Popejoy, Sheila Gardenhire, Rebecca Futrell and Joan Dudley, were among 585 youngsters from 125 regional cities at the fourth annual meet.

Courses were designed to help the girls learn new routines and be better spirit boosters for the coming school year.

Action climaxed nearly four months of work on the local level to gain the improvements.

The farm road affected by the proposal runs east from SH 86 to an intersection with FM 1424.

McLain predicted paving contracts would be let in September with construction to begin in October.

## Summer Time Has Diseases

Winter is commonly the time for colds and flue and sneezes, but there are some diseases and accidents that do their worst in hot weather.

The American Medical Association points out that some of these are obvious. Sun strokes and heat strokes are more likely to occur in July and August than in January. Too much exposure and too much exercise in the hot sun may produce sun stroke. Prolonged excessive heat, either in or out of doors, can cause heat stroke. The symptoms are the same and in either case it is important to keep the victim cool and call a physician at once. Heat prostration also is caused by getting overheated, but instead of developing a high fever, the victim becomes cold and clammy. Prompt medical attention and keeping the patient as warm as possible are important.

Sunburn has hospitalized many a vacationer. Everyone should know that gradual exposure to the sun, beginning with a few minutes a day, is the recommended course. But many of us forget to watch the clock and to take precautions against sunburn in the excitement of the first day at camp or at the seashore.

The bacteria that cause diarrhea multiply much faster in lukewarm foods, and it's important to keep cold foods in refrigeration and to keep hot foods hot.

Swimming is fine exercise and also is good for cooling off on a hot day. Those with sinus or ear troubles should be careful about swimming. Swimmers should make certain that the water is safe from pollution. A clear mountain stream may look attractive. It also may be loaded with germs. And there still are cases of typhoid and dysentery from drinking untreated water. Campers can disinfect water by boiling or by commercial disinfectant tablets.

If there are horses or cows around, there is likely to be tetanus. Tetanus (lockjaw) is very serious. It can be prevented by injections of tetanus toxoid. If your family hasn't had tetanus boosters recently, get your shots before going to the country.

Flies, roaches, mosquitoes and ticks are troublesome in the hot months. Insecticides and screens usually can keep them under control. In tick country it is essential to make a close examination after disrobing to remove all ticks.

**SHORT SNORTS--** Fear of scabies infections has resulted in massive visual inspection of cattle in the Panhandle and clearance of herds by the Texas Animal Health Commission and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Armed with a \$225,000 Federal grant, the State Health Department is promoting a statewide immunization program -- primarily directed at preschoolers -- against polio, measles, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus.

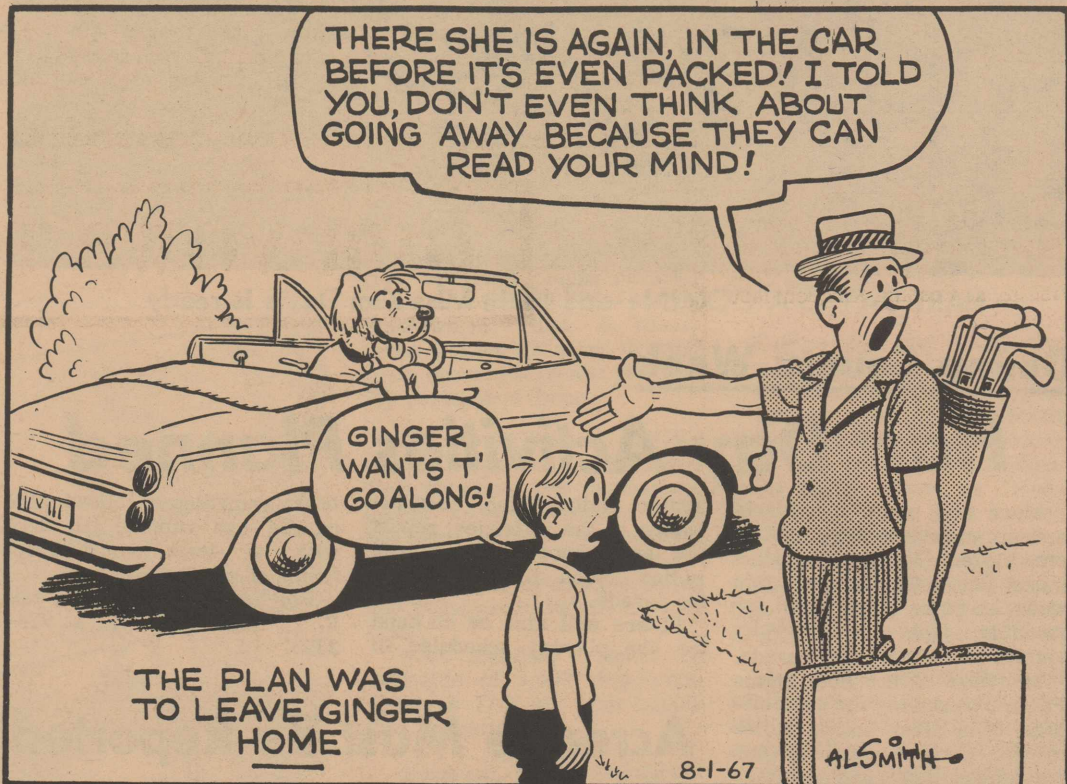
Good, clean wholesome fun for children is important in a child's life. If a parent is there to see that child enjoy this clean fun, it's all the more important.

RESOLUTION APPROVING AND ADOPTING ESTIMATES OF THE COST OF IMPROVEMENTS, OF AMOUNTS TO BE ASSESSED FOR IMPROVEMENTS IN THE NATURE OF GRADING, LAYING CURB AND GUTTER AND PAVING PORTIONS OF STREETS, HIGHWAYS AND AVENUES IN AND ALONG THE BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS, FIXING THE TIME AND PLACE FOR HEARING OF THE OWNERS OF ABUTTING PROPERTY, AND OTHER PERSONS INTERESTED IN SAID PROPERTY AND DIRECTING THE CITY SECRETARY TO PUBLISH NOTICE ON BEHALF OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Hart has heretofore ordered that portions of the streets, highways and avenues be improved by grading, installing concrete curb and gutter and paving with caliche base and triple asphalt surface together with incidentals and appurtenances and arrangements therefor have been made and entered into by the City of Hart, Texas, with High Plains Pavers, Inc., and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Hart has caused the City Engineer to prepare and file estimates of the costs of such improvements and estimates of the amounts per front foot to be assessed against abutting property and the owners thereof, and such estimates have been approved and examined:

Section 1. That estimates prepared by the City Engineer, Ralph Douglas, be and they are hereby adopted and approved.

TO THE OWNERS OF PROPERTY ABUTTING UPON THE HEREIN-BELOW MENTIONED PORTIONS OF STREETS, HIGHWAYS, AVENUES and/or ALLEYS AND TO ALL OTHERS AFFECTED:

The governing body of the City of Hart, Texas, has heretofore ordered that the following portions of streets, highways and avenues in and along the boundaries of the City of Hart, Texas, be improved by raising, grading and filling and installing concrete curbs and gutters and installation of sewers and drains where necessary on streets, highways and avenues hereinafter designated, and it is hereby found and determined that the costs of improvements on such portions of said streets, avenues and highways are the amounts set out in the respective following paragraphs covering the units therein described, and the amount per front foot in each unit proposed to be assessed for such improvements against the abutting property and the owners thereof on the portions of said streets, avenues and highways for curb and gutter is \$1.70 per front foot, and for improvements exclusive of curb and gutter is \$3.30 per front foot; the aggregate assessment for properties improved with curb, gutter and paving, is \$5.00 per front foot; the portion of streets and highways to be improved being described, identified by paving unit number, the estimated total cost of improvements shown, the alleged property owners, description of properties owned, number of front feet, amount of total assessment against property and owners, all being as hereinafter set forth:

Trustees of Cotton Producers Institute, operating this year for the first time under the producer-approved dollar-a-bale Cotton Research and Promotion Act, met in Memphis, Tenn. July 11 and 12 and approved two possible budgets for 1968.

A budget for both research and promotion activities was set at \$7,998,333. This takes into account the smallest anticipated collections under the new program from the 1967 crop.

Should collections exceed these minimum expectations, the group laid plans for expanding activities up to \$10,834,463.

Following the formula used in the past by CPI, about one-third of the funds were applied to research and two-thirds to promotion.

At the lower budget level, research would take up \$2,665,000, and \$5,333,333 would go into promotion. If collections permit the more liberal budget, the two figures for research and promotion would be split \$4,300,000 and \$6,534,463, respectively.

J. D. Smith of Littlefield, president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. and one of six CPI trustees from the Plains area, said the larger budget was adopted, but that the smaller budget was designated as the priority program.

"Preparation for the program at the lower level is to be started immediately, and additional authorizations can be made by the CPI trustee officers or executive committee if and when it is seen that funds will be available," Smith explained.

Other trustees from the High Plains include Howard Alford, who is vice chairman of the group, Roy Forkner and Joe B. Pate, Jr., all of Lubbock; L. C. Unfred of New Home and Aubrey Lockett of Ropesville and Vernon.

The Budget adopted by the

trustees will be submitted to the Cotton Board at its meeting in Dallas on July 25 and 26, after which it will go to the Secretary of Agriculture for final approval.

The \$8 million level will virtually double the industry's 1967 program of research and promotion on a national scale, Smith reported, and is expected to attract funds from other sources that will bring the total effort up to several times that amount.

Recommendations of the trustees under the \$2.66 million budget for research were broken down into 10 major problem categories, including insects, weeds, diseases, yield-quality, mechanization, processing - handling - marketing, mill processing-finishing, consumer quality improvement, product development and cottonseed.

Out of the \$5.33 million allocated to promotion activities, will come funds for advertising, fashion shows, movies, fabric libraries, market-press week projects, retail sales training and fabric development.

Much of the advertising that will be done is planned on a cooperative basis with either manufacturers or retailers, considerably enhancing the opportunity for benefit to cotton from its advertising dollars.

EDUCATION- About 400 experts, Texans and otherwise, are at work on 80 studies that will help piece together a master plan for education beyond high school in Texas.

Plan will be laid out in preliminary form next summer for a series of public hearings before finally adopted by the 18-member Coordinating Board of the Texas College and University system. Plan will chart the road ahead to 1985 for the public system of higher education.

This hot weather is certainly salad and sandwich time for sure as it keeps us from that last minute hot cooking before a meal and too, it is the time of year when our appetites are lagging, especially away from hot foods. Here is a recipe for ice cream that is unusual and for those like me that will eat most anything new.

### CANTALOUPE ICE CREAM

2 c. pared and diced cantaloupe  
 1/4 c. granulated sugar  
 1 1/2 c. Marshmallow Whip  
 1 2/3 c. undiluted evaporated milk  
 1/4 c. lemon juice  
 Put cantaloupe through food grinder or coarse strainer into a bowl. Add sugar and Marshmallow Whip and allow mixture to stand for 25 minutes at room temperature, stirring occasionally until smoothly blended together. Chill evaporated milk in ice cube tray until soft crystals form around edges of tray, about 25 minutes. Then whip milk until stiff; add lemon juice and whip until very stiff. Fold cantaloupe mixture into whipped milk and spoon into ice cube tray. Freeze at lowest temperature until firm, about 3 hours.

### STUFFED LETTUCE

1 small head lettuce  
 1 pkg. cream or chive cheese  
 2 T. milk  
 1 whole pimiento or 4 or 5 stuffed olives  
 French dressing

Hollow out lettuce head. Mix cheese and milk together until smooth, adding pimiento, olives, chives, etc. Mix well and fill lettuce head. Chill. Cut head crosswise and serve plain or with French dressing.

### HAM DREAMS

2 c. cooked leftover ham  
 1/2 green pepper  
 1 medium onion  
 1 clove garlic  
 2 hard-cooked eggs  
 2 sprigs parsley  
 1 pinch tarragon  
 1/4 tsp. sage  
 Juice of 1/2 lemon  
 Mayonnaise  
 4 slices bread  
 Grated Parmesan cheese

Put ham through food grinder, then grind a second time with green pepper, onion, garlic, eggs, parsley and herbs. Mix in the lemon juice and enough mayonnaise to hold the mixture together.

Just before mealtime, toast bread on one side and spread the ham mixture on the untoasted side. Dribble a tablespoon of mayonnaise over the top and sprinkle lavishly with Parmesan cheese. Broil until surface is golden and serve piping hot. You may also place this mixture in deep freeze and slice as needed.

### OLD-FASHIONED SOUR CREAM DRESSING

1/2 c. sour cream  
 2 T. vinegar  
 2 T. sugar  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 Dash of pepper

Beat all ingredients with rotary beater 2 minutes and pour over slaw.

### BAKED CHILI CORN-WICH

1 c. corn meal  
 1 c. flour  
 2 T. sugar  
 1 tsp. salt  
 3 tsp. baking powder  
 1 egg  
 1 c. milk  
 2 T. bacon drippings

Sift dry ingredients into bowl. Add egg, milk and bacon fat, beating until smooth. Pour half of the mixture in greased 10 inch pan. Pour chili mixture, for which recipe is listed below, over the mixture, saving the broth. Pour remainder of the corn meal mixture over the chili to form a top crust for the sandwich. Cook in 425 degree F. oven for 20 to 25 minutes, cut in squares and use chili broth as a sauce.

### CHILI FILLING

1 lb. ground meat  
 2 T. minced onion  
 1 clove garlic  
 3 T. chili powder  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 1/4 tsp. oregano  
 1/4 T. camino  
 1 1/2 c. water

Brown meat, add onion, garlic, chili powder, salt, oregano, camino and water. Cook over low heat for one hour.

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# STATE Capital NEWS

State Supreme Court has ruled that the constitutional amendment requiring annual voter registration in Texas is valid.

AFL-CIO challenged the amendment. They contended voters did not get "fair notice" that the amendment provided for annual registration.

State labor officials pledged to take the issue to the highest federal court.

State Supreme Court agreed with ruling of the Third Court of Civil Appeals that the amendment -- approved by Texans last year -- to abolish the poll tax as a requirement for voting and substitute annual sign-up should stand. There was no opinion. Appellate judges had reversed the trial court finding.

Meanwhile, Texas election machinery and voter registra-

tion for the big 1968 election year will proceed under annual sign-up law as amended this year.

All voters, including those who live in cities under 10,000 population, must register between October and January.

In other cases, the State Supreme Court:

\* Left standing lower court decisions refusing cash judgments to two parties to the collapse of Billie Sol Estes' fortunes. Case originated in Pecos District Court.

\* Reversed Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals and sustaining district court in holding that 49 strikers against the Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation in 1964 could draw unemployment benefits due to circumstances of their joblessness. (Strikers had offered to

return to work.)

\* Upheld Third Court of Civil Appeals' ruling that State Savings and Loan Commissioner was justified in denying a branch office application for downtown Houston of the Gibraltar Savings Association.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES--Oil and gas produced on federal land at Corpus Christi Naval Air Station are subject to state production and pipeline taxes (except for 16-2/3 per cent payable as royalty to the U. S.), Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other opinions, Martin has concluded that:

\* A \$1,500,000 appropriation to construct protective devices at railroad grade crossings is constitutional.

\* If a county commissioner is a director and stockholder

in a bank desiring to receive bond issue funds, the county commissioners court does not have authority to designate that bank as a county depository.

HIGHWAYS--As July began, the State Highway Department had \$618,899,810 worth of highway construction under contract. During June, contractors were paid \$35,802,146 for work completed.

In 1919, only \$273,000 was spent for road construction.

WELFARE--An audit of the State Department of Public Welfare reveals that \$461,000,000 in federal and state money was used in Texas during the two years ending last August 31 on welfare programs.

Rate was \$120,000,000 last year, of which \$168,620,302 was in direct grants to the needy aged, blind, children and disabled, plus \$41,431,797 for medical care for the needy aged. While aid to dependent children and those who are permanently disabled continues to rise, training programs are reducing the amount of aid needed by blind persons.

Distribution of surplus commodities also is handled by this department. In two years, 45,000,000 pounds of flour, 19,000,000 pounds of corn meal and 17,000,000 pounds of dry milk were distributed to needy families from federal surpluses. However, the amount distributed is declining as the government stockpiles are used up and high employment is reducing the number of needy families.

Payroll and other administrative costs for giving away \$215,000,000 came to \$12,708,278.

SCREWORM REPORT--Between May 28 and July 1, some 19 cases of screwworms were confirmed in Texas.

To prevent spread of the disease, Screwworm Eradication Program planes recently released 757,780,000 sterile screwworm flies in Texas. Some 106,144,000 were dropped over Trans-Pecos and the Valley portions of Texas.

HIGHER RATES AUTHORIZED--Texas Railroad Commission has authorized higher rates for shipments of household goods by specified carriers. No increase was allowed in packing charges, which had been requested by the van lines.

Rate changes, based on averages of 7,600 shipments, come to 17.3 per cent higher than present rates.

However, larger shipments are actually less and smaller shipments are more.

New rates will take effect on August 5.

## Don Follis May Return To Class

Don Follis, son of Mrs. Juanita Follis of Hart, was told he could return to school this year after a checkup recently in Dallas.

Don, who missed all last year because of a bedfast condition, will be able to continue his education if he can make necessary arrangements with his teachers, his mother reported.

He is unable to sit, but is able to stand and lie down.

## IN-SERVICE MEETING SET

An In-Service training session for new teachers in the Hart School System will be conducted at the school at 9 a. m. Aug. 22--six days before the first day of regular classes of the 1967-68 school year.
