Money Recovered From Burglary At Potato Shed

Police officials late last week recovered \$351.75 be-lieved to have been taken in a burglary of the S & H Produce Co. potato shed on the west edge of town last Thursday night.

A suspect is being held by authorities in Hereford in connection with the breakin, according to Deputy Sheriff Granville Martin.

An estimated \$178.76 is still missing, Martin said, but an investigation into the incident is being continued.

Martin said \$33.75 in small change was discovered inside some equipment by two company employees shortly after the breakin. Another \$318 was recovered from the suspect by a state parole officer from Amarillo, he said.

Queroz's wife Mary, 39, was taken to Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt suffering from a broken right foot. She was reported in good condition by hospital attendants later in the week.

Queroz, who was alone in the car, his son, and a daughter Mary T. Queroz who was riding in the pickup, all escaped injury. The children were also taken to the hospital and later released.

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

Looking at the economic progress of the community of Hart in Castro County, there seems to have been advance-ment by the decade. In the first decade of this century, settlers were brought in by the train load. They came from all areas of the States and most had farming in mind when they settled here. However, it was during the decade of World War I that wheat and grain became king of crops in

The use of horses for power sources denied our farmers from use of many acres, however. In the roaring twenties things really began to roar here with the incoming use of tractors, large plows and gasoline powered harvesters. In those days it was not uncommon to hear tractors roaring all night long. The age of agricultural industrialization had

begun.

With the coming of the railroad, all Hart was in a booming, festive mood. The skyscrapers of the plains began to appear on the horizon. These grain handling facilities loaded wheat from thousands of acres which were cultivated with very little capital investment. The decade of the dirty thirties is characterized by the introduction of irrigation from our fine underground formation. Hart is sitting over the thickest water bearing formation south of the Canadian River.

The decade of World War II is portrayed by the expansion of irrigation to include nearly all the acreage in the Hart area. The roar we heard then was of motors pumping water night and day. With the fifties came the mighty surge of cotton as a cash crop. Since cotton required the use of many dollars in its production, the need for capital sources was met by the establishment of Farmers State Bank.

This bank was founded by Hart men with the idea of complete community development in mind. Since so much capital was being used for fertilizer, seed manpower and increased production, these men knew th : capital had become a tool

for farming. On our tenth anniversary this year we at Farmers State Bank know that we have fulfilled the thinking of our founders. We have become a vital part of the agricultural development of Hart and its area.

Now we must not stop here. We feel we have made substantial growth in view of the poor crops lately as has the town of Hart. This growth for Hart, in any manner whatsoever, is the basic premise at this Bank. We want industry to recognize the advantage of the area. Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new sec-tion thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Depart-ment, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by

under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person firm or corners. any person, firm, or corpora-tion, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which inprior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor,

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

Improvement Begun In Palo Duro Canyon

Park visitors in Palo Duro Canyon State Park have been startled by the resonating booms coming from Sunday Canyon in the area of the Devils Tombstone. However, these are sounds of progress not the echoes of some long forgotten Indian battle.

Jerry Mullican, park sup-erintendent for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said the sounds come from blasting operations in the old quarry last used by the Civil Conser-

vation Corps in the mid-1930's. The old sandstone quarry was reopened recently to provide material to be used in massive improvements in facilities at the 15,000 acre state park. Some 3,000 yards of sandstone will be quarried and used

in building a new entrance to the park, a concession building, additions to the headquarters building and new restroom fa-

Park planners of the Depart-ment indicate the new construction will retain the architectural styles already established in the park. Original construction at the park was begun by the CCC in the mid 30's but was never finished due to World War II.

The echoes through the prehistoric canyon are the fore-runners of a \$542,988 massive reconstruction job. Already underway is construction of three miles of roads and two paved parking areas. Other construction in the park scheduled to begin soon.

Mumps Is A Virus Infection

Mumps is a virus infection of the parotid gland, one of the salivary glands, immediately below the ear lobe and behind the angle of the jaw, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical azine of the American Medical Association.

The best sign of mumps is a tender, smooth, firm swelling that covers the corner of the jawbone where it turns upward toward the ear, the mag-

azine reports.

Mumps in a child is usually only mildly incapacitating and moderately uncomfortable. Many cases in children are so mild as to go unnoticed by parents. A mild medication for fever and the discomfort of mild headache and muscle aches may be used as needed.

Normally the child recovers in five to seven days.

In the teen-ager or adult mumps is more serious. The virus is more likely to involve other areas such as the pancreas, and to result in nausea, abdominal pains and severe food or fluid intolerances.

Due to the hot weather lots BANANA, MARSHMALLOW of folks are eating a lot of watermelon and cantaloupe. (Also ice cream and soft drinks) Sometimes we forget to eat some nourishing foods along with these light foods and we really need them for our health. And since chickens are such a good buy lets try these.

CHICKEN PIE

Filling

1/2 c. cold chicken broth 1/3 c. flour 1 1/2 c. hot chicken broth 2 1/2 c. stewed chicken cut in large dice 3/4 c. drained canned peas 3/4 c. sliced celery 1 tsp. salt

1 c. all-purpose flour 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder 1/4 tsp. salt 3 T. butter 1/3 c. milk

Make a paste by blending cold chicken broth and flour until smooth. Add paste to the hot chicken broth and cook over direct heat, stirring constantly until sauce boils and thickens. Combine with chicken, peas, celery and I teaspoon salt, and pour into a 6-cup buttered casserole. Sift the 1 cup flour serole. Sift the 1 cup flour, measure and resift 3 times with baking powder and 1/4 tsp.

Cut in butter with a pastry blender or 2 knives, then add milk, all at once, stirring quickly with a fork until dough just stiffens. Turn dough out onto 12 to 16 medium-sized peaches floured board, knead half a dozen times, then roll out to make a circle about 81/2 inches 2 c. granulated sugar in diameter, or to fit top of 6 sticks cinnamon casserole, and about 1/4-inch


