

Hart School Board Members Approve Budget, Teachers

Members of the Hart School Board approved a \$404,395.02 budget for the school year beginning Sept. 1 during their regular meeting Monday night.

Anticipated expenditures are \$27,421.23 above last year's budget of \$376,973.79.

Supt. W. A. Gardenhire cited increased cost of materials and supplies and an expanded curriculum as main causes for the budget boost.

Trustees also approved appointments of four new teachers and one new administrative person for the coming year.

W. E. Washburn will teach high school math, Keith Huggins will teach junior high math, Glynda Gragg will be a first

Bids for the school gas contract will be opened at the Sept. 11 board meeting and must be in the superintendent's office before that date.

Trustees also approved Schaeffer & Harden, certified public accountants of Dimmitt, to draw up the school systems annual audit.

Gardenhire outlined a plan to dissolve a current agreement with Clyde Mace Oldsmobile & Buick Co. of Plainview through

which the school was to be supplied a vehicle for a School Car Program.

explained that recent changes in Texas driver education laws would restrict participation in the program to therefore, 16-year-olds-and, make the proposed program un-practical for Hart. Action will become effective Sept. 1.

Board President Ralph Futrell appointed a committee to study bus garage equipment and make recommendations to replace supplies lost in a fire that raked the garage earlier this summer.

The committee was also charged with studying refrigeration needs in the school cafeteria and making any needed recommendations.

Gardenhire also announced that a new 60-passenger bus will be delivered to the school by the middle of September.







BERRY PUDDING

1 qt. berries (raspberries or blackberries) 3/4 c. powdered sugar 3/4 c. butter 1 lb. sponge cake ,dry Vanilla or lemon extract

Cook berries, Cream butter, sugar, add to berries, then crumbled sponge cake. Mix thoroughly. Beat egg whites



PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general ob-ligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds lars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as erage annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Depart-ment, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife De-

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE partment, or its said successor, LEGISLATURE OF THE under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any govern-mental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corpora-tion, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and ficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deto State Parks shall be de-posited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife De-partment, or its said succes-

"All bonds issued hereunder "All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on
