## Bus Practices Told For Year

Hart school officials reminded area drivers of state regulations pertaining to school buses as youngsters again flooded the long-dormant vehicles to come and go from school this week.

School Supt. W. A. Gardenhire noted that motor vehicles are to stop completely at school, in town, on state highways, or county roads, whenever school buses stop.

Under state law, approaching vehicles from both directions are to stop completely when they come upon a bus letting off passengers.

The Supt. said bus drivers have been instructed to report any vehicles failing to comply with the law to either the sheriff's office or the Highway Patrol.

"The life you save may be your own...or YOUR CHILD'S," he added in making the plea for safety.

Buses will leave the school on morning runs at 7:55 a. m. and return to the school by 8:20 a. m. Children may catch the bus either as it goes out or returns to school, Gardenhire said.

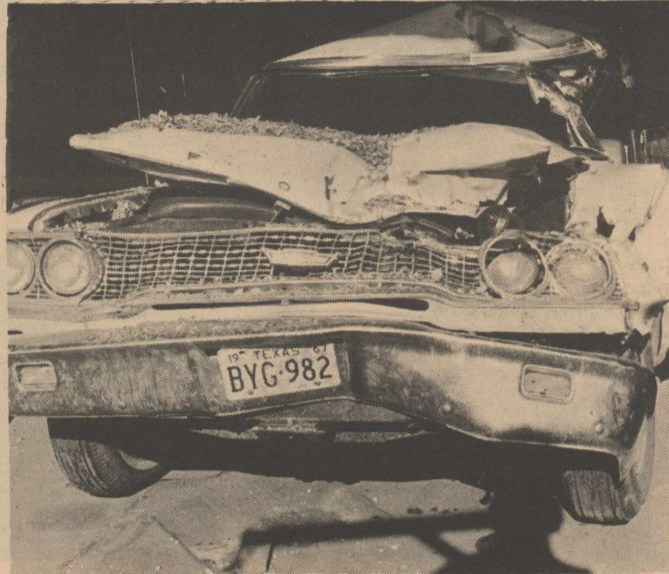
Gardenhire also asked property owners to keep driveways bridges and turning areas free of obstacles which might prevent bus drivers from delivering children as close as possible to their homes.

"During bad weather," he added, "we respectfully request your greatest efforts to see that your child arrives at school on time. A child's regular attendance in school is most important for district financial reasons, but most of all for the best interest of the child."

Ricky Ray Bennett, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Bennett, Box 454, Hart and Kathy Norfleet, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Norfleet, Route 1, Hart, were taken to Community Hospital & Clinic in Olton following the 4 p.m. mishap.

Bennett, driver of the auto, was treated for minor cuts and bruises. Kathy Norfleet, his sole passenger, was treated for a fractured left arm and multiple lacerations.

Driver of the truck, Doel Cordero, 19, escaped injury.

Investigating Highway Patrolman Weldon Parson said the Bennett auto apparently ran under the back of the truck

as Cordero attempted to turn left off the highway onto the dirt road.

Parson said witnesses told him the accident occurred after the car passed another vehicle which had been between it and the truck.

## School Board Okays New Insurance Plan

Members of the Hart School Board have approved student insurance coverage by the Southwestern States General Agency for the 1967-68 term, according to an announcement this week by Supt. W. A. Gardenhire.

Yearly premium for the in-school insurance plan will be \$7, and is to include any accidents at school and on school-sponsored activities.

A 12-month policy, effective Friday, is available to students and school personnel for \$18. The all-day plan is to cover all accidents covered in personal premiums--at school and elsewhere.

Students in grades seven through 12 participating in athletics will be required to have either the \$7 or \$18 policy, the same as last year, according to Gardenhire.

He urged participating parents to read their child's policy carefully and consult any of the principals' offices for further details if necessary.

Gardenhire pointed out that the insurance company will no longer decline responsibility for accident payments which other existing policies pay in full. He said this so-called "excess clause" which allowed this practice would apply this year only to the practice or play

of inter-school athletics, motor vehicles or conveyances, horses or rodeos, or claim of more than \$50.

He estimated 95 percent of all claims filled during the coming year would not be affected by the "excess clause."

"Under this system," he explained, "all of your regular student accident claims will be paid regardless of other insurance, and most of your athletic claims will be paid also."

Gardenhire said parents should pick up two claim copies--available in principals' offices--in the event of accidents. These are to be taken to the examining physician who, in turn should fill in his required information and return them to the school officials to be forwarded to the insurance company.

Treatment, under either plan, must start within 30 days of the accident, and the resulting claim must be filed within 90 days.

"If a claim is not finished in 90 days, file a claim anyway," Gardenhire advised, "and then send it and itemized statement on additional expense."

## Student Registration Reaches 630 Mark For 1967-68

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife De-

partment, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

## Hart Leatherneck Now in Vietnam

Marine S/Sgt. Alfredo Gonzales Jr., of Hart is in Vietnam serving with Headquarters and Service Company, First Battalion, Fourth Marine Regiment of the Third Marine Division.

His company directs and coordinates the operations of the infantry battalion, and provides the facilities with which the battalion commander controls his unit. The company also provides supporting weapons fire, including anti-tank defense for the battalion.

The unit is also engaged in a civic action program designed to assist the Vietnamese people in completing self-help projects, such as the building of wells, culverts, small bridges and schools. Equipment and materials for the projects are made available through the Marine Corps Reserve Civic Action Fund. Marines in Vietnam provide the know-how and guide the Vietnamese people in carrying out these projects.

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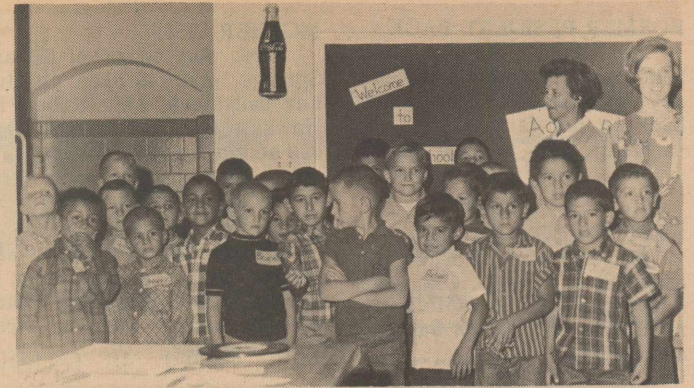
### Mrs. McRee To Be Honored

# Hart Squad Meets Amherst On Grid

Hart Longhorns got their first competitive taste of what it will take for this year's hopes of the District 1-B title to materialize as they scrimmaged Amherst there Friday night.

Amherst scored twice during the 15 plays staged by each team, once with the help of a pass interception and then by a long run.

"The kids otherwise looked real good," contended head coach Don Ewing who has built up the Longhorn heard from 16

two years ago to the 43 that turned out this season.

He and his boys obviously have high hopes of bettering the 4-5-1 record posted in 1966, Ewing's first season as the Hart mentor.

Only one of the losses during last year's play was lost by more than six points and the Hart defense gave up only 76 yards in 10 games.

But that was last year. The picture has changed since then, and, as the coach laments, it has changed again in the past three weeks.

Injuries before or during practice have already idled three starters.

They include 175-pound Tony Gonzales, suffering from an injured knee who was just breaking into his new wingback position from last season's fullback duties.

Others on the injury list are end Donnie Black, 160-pound sophomore, and guard Andy Rogers, sophomore who are both suffering from shoulder injuries.

Ewing predicted Rogers would see action in the season opener against Silverton here Sept. 8. (For complete schedule listing, see page 4.)

He was unable to say, how lasting the other injuries would be, but he doubted if any players so far would be out for the season.

"We've had a lot of injuries of key players and that will hurt us," the coach conceded.

"Barring injuries," he added, "I think we can compete with most anybody. If we could get healthy, we could have a real good season."

The returning 22-man varsity squad shows considerable justification for the coaches prediction.

Original lineup--before injuries--included eight offensive and seven defensive starters back from last year.

Offense will be led by senior quarterback W. A. Hawkins, a 136-pounder.

Backfield veterans include offensive and defensive fullback Danny Smith who tips the scales at 170.

Another backfielder and two letterman is Joe Quiroz, who weighs in light at 135.

Also back is David Harris, 165-pound senior tackle, and senior guard Benny Martinez, 141-pounder.

Several promising team regulars are sophomores this season and are already foreshadowing bigger and better things for the Longhorns in seasons to come.

Among them are Harold Bennett, 150-pound center, running back Quincy Adams, also 150 pounds, alone with Smith and Black.
