The regular meeting will not be held next week, so the ladies could attend the sub-district meeting in Muleshoe.

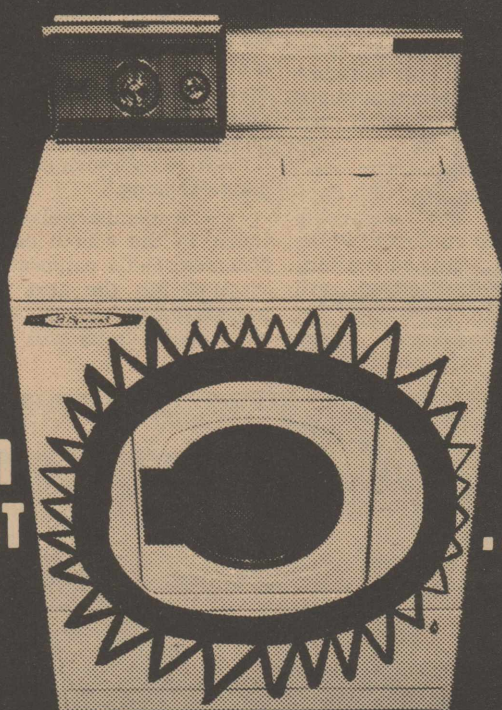

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KITCHEN KORNER

This is a cookie baking time of the year. Not only for the family at home but why not bake extra and send them to some boy in service even if none in your family are in the service. Some boy will be so very glad to receive your thoughtful gesture as it is a touch of home to them.

PINEAPPLE COOKIES

Cream:

1 c. white sugar
1 c. brown sugar
1 c. lard or shortening

Add and mix well:
2 eggs

Then add:

1 can (#2) crushed pineapple, partly drained
1 tsp. vanilla

Stir together before adding to above mixture:

1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 1/2 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. salt
4 c. flour.

Drop by spoonfuls onto cookie sheet. Bake at 400 deg. 10 to 12 minutes. When cool put in a covered container. They will get soft.

GOLDEN PUMPKIN COOKIES

Sift together:

2 1/2 c. flour
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. allspice
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
1/4 tsp. ginger
4 tsp. baking powder

Add:

3 eggs, well beaten to
1/3 c. shortening, creamed with
1 1/2 c. sugar

Add and blend well:

1 c. canned pumpkin
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. lemon extract

Gradually add dry ingredients and:

1 c. raisins, chopped
1/2 c. nuts, chopped
Mix well. Drop by teaspoonful onto well greased cookie sheet. Flatten with fork dipped in water. Mix together:

1/4 c. sugar
1/4 tsp. cinnamon
Sprinkle on top of each cookie. Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes.

Note: Home prepared pumpkin may be used.

ANNE'S BARS

Combine in a large bowl:
2 c. graham cracker crumbs
1/2 c. chopped nuts
1/2 c. flaked coconut
2 1/2 c. miniature marshmallows

Combine in a medium-size saucepan:
2 eggs, beaten
1 c. sugar
3/4 c. butter
1/8 tsp. salt

Cook until mixture thickens a little, stirring constantly to avoid scorching. Cool to lukewarm in a pan of cold water.

Add:

1 tsp. vanilla

Then combine thoroughly with crumb mixture. Press into a buttered 9" x 9" pan. Cut into squares and serve.

MINCEMEAT OATMEAL COOKIES

1 1/2 c. all-purpose flour
3/4 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt

Cream:

1/2 c. shortening

Gradually add:

1 c. brown sugar, firmly packed
Beat until fluffy, then add:
1 egg

Stir in:

1 1/3 c. mincemeat

Gradually add flour mixture, blending well. Stir in:

1 1/2 c. oatmeal, uncooked
Drop by teaspoons full onto greased cookie sheet, about 2 inches apart. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) until lightly browned, about 15 minutes. Makes 48 two-inch cookies.

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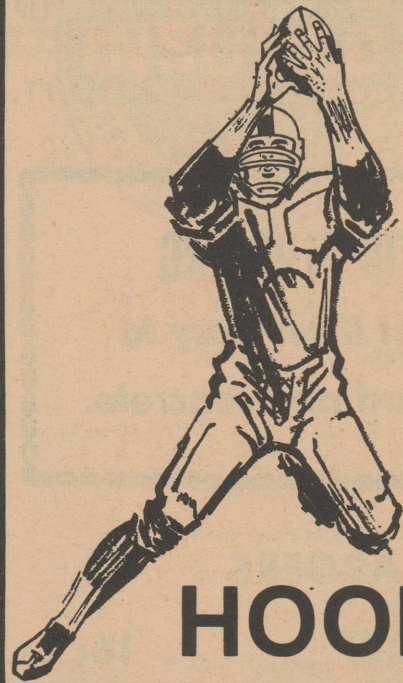

Longhorns Lose

Springlake Wolverines took advantage of the fine running of Terry Bridge to nose out Hart Longhorns at Wolverine Stadium last Friday night.

The smaller Longhorns, led by the fine running of WA Hawkins, carried the fight to their larger foes for the entire game and narrowly missed the game winning TD in the closing seconds of the first half.

Longhorns won the toss and Joe Quiroz took the opening kickoff on the Hart 20 and managed to pick up nine yards on the return.

They were unable to find a key to the Wolverine defense and three plays later found themselves still on the 29.

Quincy Hawkins punt carried out to the Wolverines' 39 and Springlake got their first offensive chance of the night.

Wolverines could do little better than the Horns on their first possession as they could pick up only five yards in three tries and were also forced to go into punt formation at the Springlake 44.

Terry Bridge's punt carried to the Hart 29 to give the visitors another chance.

This time Hart offense worked only slightly better as Danny Smith and Quiroz could pick up only seven yards in the first three downs.

Quincy Hawkins again came on to take care of the punting chores for the Longhorns. Hawkins' punt carried to the Springlake 24 and Bridge could add only one yard before going down under a host of Longhorn defenders.

Bridge added another yard on first but on second down Steve Sanderson caught the Longhorn defense asleep and raced to the Longhorn 45.

Bridge lost little time in putting the Wolverines in front as he sped down the right side to pick up the Springlake TD.

Sanderson's pass for the extra points went wide of its mark and the score remained at six for the Wolverines and nothing for the Longhorns.

After this initial nap the Hart defense began to show its

old form as the Longhorn defenders began to force the Wolverines back into home territory.

Just as the first quarter was coming to a close the Hart defense, led by Tommy Gonzales, Donnie Black and Andy Rodgers, stopped a fourth down try for a first by the Wolverines at the Springlake 31 to give Hart a fine scoring chance.

The Longhorn offense wasn't up to the task as four tries netted only six yards and the Wolverines took over on the 25.

Longhorn defense again proved their worth as they forced the Wolverines to punt from the 20 after losing five yards in three tries.

Bridge's punt carried out to the Hart 45 and into the waiting arms of WA Hawkins, who sped back to the Wolverine 37 to put the Longhorns back in business.

Again the Longhorns were unable to move the ball and Quincy Hawkins again booted the ball, this time down to the Wolverine 25.

Wolverine safetyman bobbed the ball however Clifford Ray recovered for the Horns at the 25. WA Hawkins moved to the 23 on first but Danny Smith lost two on second to bring up third and still ten.

Hawkins used the last two downs as he moved to the 15 to give the Horns a first and ten.

Quiroz got to the six on first but Danny Smith was again thrown for a two yard loss.

Hawkins got the Horns out of trouble as he picked up another first at the Springlake five. Quiroz lost three yards in two tries before Hawkins bailed the Longhorns out of trouble as he sped to the one-half yard line. Hawkins rammed on in for the TD on the next play to even the score.

WA Hawkins kick was good and the Horns were out in front 7 to 6.

Wolverines lost little time getting back in the lead after taking the kickoff at their 30. Longhorn defense held the Wolverines to only seven yards in

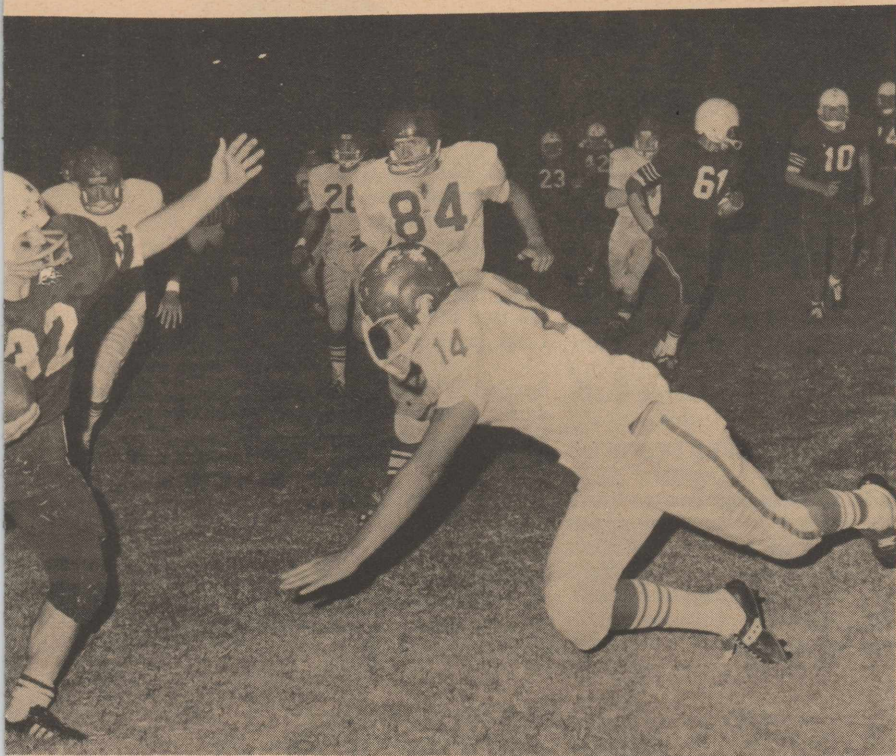

the defense for the Shorthorns.

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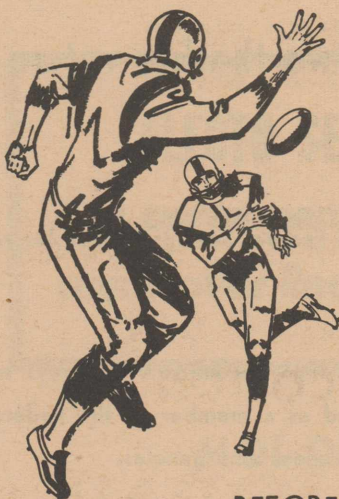
