Winter Wheat **Tests Released**

irrigation, or Efficient practical utilization of irrigation water, should be a major concern of all High Plains farmers. For this reason, an irrigation-fertilizer test on winter wheat has been conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation for the past three years, under the direction of James Valliant, Soil Scientist, and Lloyd Langford, Associate Agronomist.

Research has shown that a winter irrigation on non-grazed wheat is neither practical nor profitable. If the winter wheat s to be grazed, an irrigation in January is probably neces-

sary. Tascosa variety of wheat was used in the study, and two irrigation methods were utilized, with twelve different fertilizer levels. The irrigation method which proved most economical on non-grazed wheat included an application at germination, jointing, early boot, and head.

It was interested to note in the same test that the fertilizer levels of 120-60-0, 120-90-0, and 120-0-0 plus 30 pounds of sulfur produced yields with no significant differences. (Figures, refer to pounds of Nitrogen, Phosphate, and Potash per acre). However, the level of 120-0-0 plus 30 pounds of sulfur produced the greatest return because of the lower cost of






