p. m. All departments of the college will conduct conferences with the aim of thoroughly informing high school students on the nature and objectives of each department.

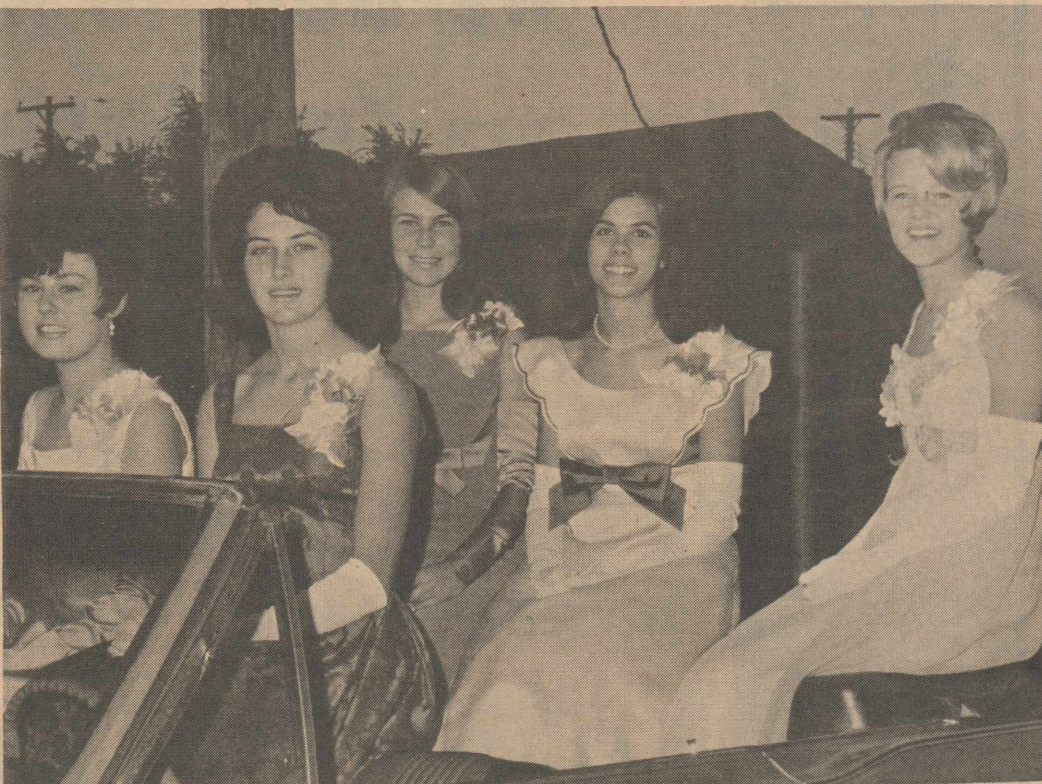

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## KITCHEN KORNER

With the chill in the air we know for sure that it will not be long until winter is really with us and then is when the hot and the spicy foods really taste good.

Here is a Cheeseburger pie that is good to have ready to warm up for those friends you have in after attending a football game.

### TOMATO CHEESEBURGER PIE

#### Crust:

1 c. sifted regular all-purpose flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 T. lard  
3 T. butter  
3 T. milk

#### Filling:

1 pound lean ground beef  
3/4 c. chopped onion  
4 eggs, slightly beaten  
1/2 c. milk  
1 c. (4 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese

1 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. oregano  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
1 can (8 oz.) pizza sauce  
6 triangles Cheddar cheese

To prepare crust: Into a mixing bowl sift together flour and salt; cut in lard until it resembles coarse meal. Then cut in butter until it resembles small peas. Add milk and stir with fork until dough holds together. On lightly floured surface, roll dough to circle 1 1/2 inches larger than inverted pie plate. Fit loosely into pie plate; fold edge of pastry to make high standing rim; flute edge. Prick with fork. Bake 8-10 minutes or until lightly brown. Meanwhile, prepare filling: In skillet break up beef with fork and brown with onion; drain if necessary. In a mixing bowl combine eggs, milk, cheese, salt, oregano and pepper; stir in meat mixture. Turn into shell. Reduce oven temperature to 325 deg. F. Bake 40-45 minutes or until a knife inserted near center comes out clean. Spread top with pizza sauce; bake 10 additional minutes. Arrange triangles of Cheddar cheese on top in spoke fashion. Cut into wedges to serve.

### MOLASSES PECAN COOKIES

1 1/2 c. flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
3/4 tsp. baking soda  
1/2 c. butter or margarine  
3/4 c. sugar  
1 egg  
1/3 c. molasses  
3/4 c. pecans, chopped

Combine and sift dry ingredients. Cream shortening, sugar and egg; stir in molasses. Thoroughly blend the two mixtures. Mix in chopped nuts. Drop rounded teaspoonfuls on Teflon cookie pan or greased cookie sheet. Use the tip of a teaspoon to press a hollow in center of each cookie. Fill with orange-date mixture and top with pecan quarters. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 350 deg. about 15 minutes. Makes about 3 dozen cookies.

#### FILLING:

In a saucepan mix 1 1/2 c. cut-up dates, 1/2 cup orange marmalade and 1/4 cup water. Cook and stir over low heat until thick. Mix 1/4 cup orange juice, or water, with 1 tablespoon cornstarch. Stir into cooked mixture and continue to stir over low heat until very thick. Cool before using as filling.

#### PARTY PEACH POUF

This creamy spectacular stands so handsomely high! And it's a joy of a make-ahead

2 pkg. (12 oz. each) frozen sliced peaches, thawed  
2 T. lemon juice  
1/2 tsp. vanilla  
1/8 tsp. almond extract  
1 env. unflavored gelatin  
4 eggs, separated  
1/2 c. sugar  
1 1/4 c. cream for whipping

1. Prepare a 4-cup souffle dish this way: Fold a piece of foil, 12 inches wide and long enough to go around dish and overlap slightly, in thirds lengthwise. Wrap around dish to make a 2-inch stand-up collar; hold in place with a rubber band and a paper clip.

2. Drain syrup from peaches into a 2-cup measure. Place 8 of the prettiest peach slices in a pie plate; brush with 1 tablespoon of the lemon juice; chill for Step 6. Press remaining peaches through a sieve into a bowl or swirl in blender; stir in remaining 1 tablespoon lemon juice, vanilla, and almond extract.

3. Soften gelatin in 1/2 cup of the peach syrup in the top of a double boiler. Beat egg yolks slightly in a small bowl; stir into gelatin mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, over simmering water 5 minutes, or until gelatin dissolves and mixture coats a metal spoon; strain into a large bowl; stir in peach mixture. Chill 50 minutes, or until as thick as unbeaten egg white.

4. While gelatin mixture chills, beat egg whites until foamy-white and double in volume in a large bowl; sprinkle in sugar, a tablespoon at a time, beating all the time until sugar dissolves completely and meringue stands in firm peaks. Beat 1 cup of the cream until stiff in a medium-size bowl. (Remaining 1/4 cup cream is for garnish in Step 7.)

5. Fold whipped cream, then meringue into thickened gelatin mixture until no streaks of white remain. Spoon enough into dish to fill just to rim.

6. Place saved peach slices, curved edge down, on top around edge, leaning against foil collar; spoon remaining gelatin mixture into dish. Chill several hours, or until firm.

7. When ready to serve, beat remaining 1/4 cup cream until stiff in a small bowl. Remove foil collar from dish; spoon cream in tiny puffs on top, or press through a pastry bag to make rosettes. Spoon dessert into serving dishes.

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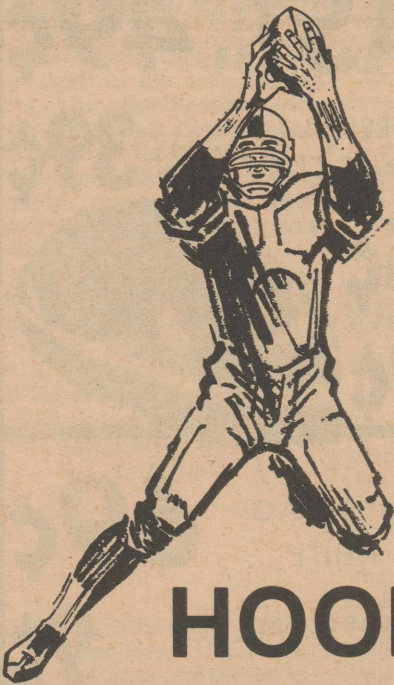

# Longhorns Do

Hart Longhorns, once again relying on a strong defense, humbled the once-proud Texline Tornadoes here last Friday night 13 to 0.

Tornadoes could do nothing right and the Longhorns could do no wrong as the visitors were held to only 130 yards total offense and the once-mighty Mike Field could account for only 14 of that.

For the Horns on offense, it was almost another one man show as WA Hawkins dominated in every department. However, Tommy Gonzales and Danny Smith showed marked improvement over last week's showing.

Joe Quiroz took the opening kickoff on the 10 to get the ball game underway and managed to pick up good yardage out to the Hart 35 before he was brought down. Longhorns found the going rough and were forced to punt from the 40 with Quincy Hawkins' punt carrying out to the Texline 33.

Tornadoes also found a tough defense waiting for them as the visitors could manage only one yard in three attempts. Mike Field's punt carried out to the Hart 33 for the Horns second possession.

Tommy Gonzales and Danny Smith each picked up a yard before WA Hawkins rolled down to the Texline 47 for the first first down of the game.

Smith needed two plays but he still picked up another first down for the Horns at the 37. Gonzales got into the act as he blasted out to the 34 for three more yards.

Quiroz really provided the thrills of the next play as he skirted left end and raced to the Texline 1. Smith got the final yard and the Horns led six to zero.

After taking the kickoff on his 25 Rusty Field managed six yards before going down on the Texline 31. Field got the call on first and managed to move to the 38 for a seven yard gain. Frank Chapman almost broke the Hart defense as he raced to the Hart 47 for a first down. Chapman got to the 44 on first before disaster

struck Texline as Mike Field and the ball, with the help of Donnie Black and Harold Bob Bennett, went in two different directions.

When the dust had settled, Bennett and Black were on Field and Clifford Ray was on the ball for the Horns at the Hart 45.

The Horns were able to move to the Texline 30 before a fourth down pass to Donnie Black into the Texline end zone went wide and the Tornadoes took over.

Matters went from bad to worse for Texline as a fourth down kick from the 35 was blocked by Harold Bob Bennett and David Harris recovered at the 25.

It seemed like a fine scoring chance for the Horns but with a fifteen yard penalty to the 30 enabled the Tornadoes to stop a fourth down try at the 17.

Tornadoes were able to work out only to the 26 before going into punt formation again. This time Quincy Hawkins and Andy Rodgers went blasting in to block the punt and Donnie Black recovered at the 18.

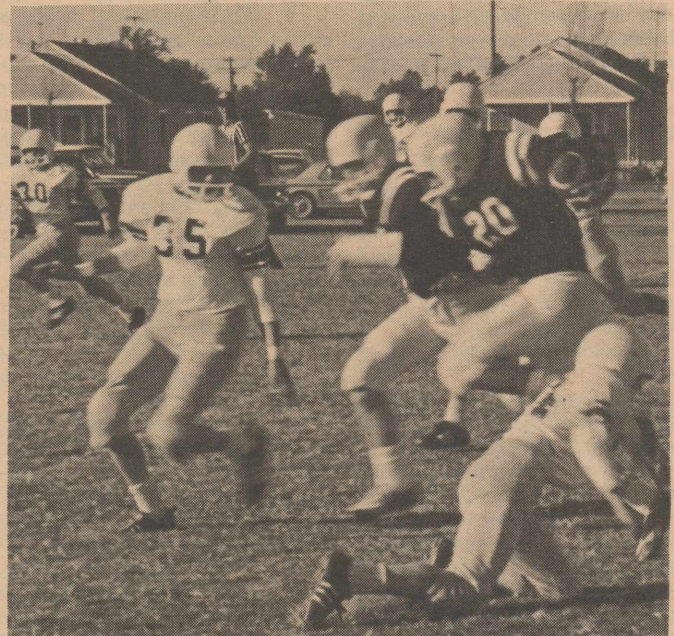

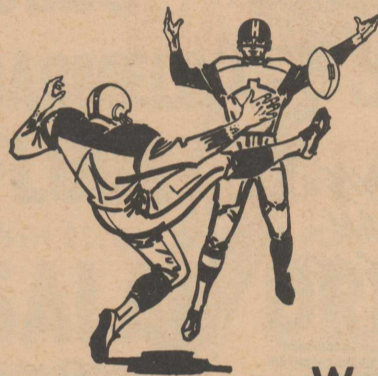

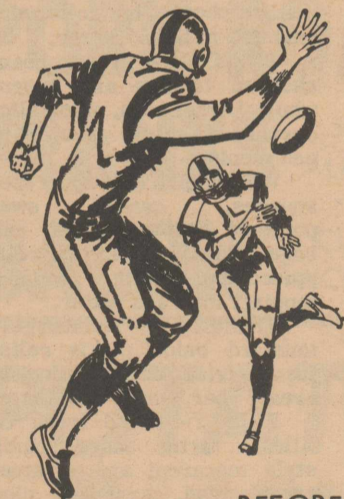

## Winter Wheat Tests Released

Efficient irrigation, or practical utilization of irrigation water, should be a major concern of all High Plains farmers. For this reason, an irrigation-fertilizer test on winter wheat has been conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation for the past three years, under the direction of James Valliant, Soil Scientist, and Lloyd Langford, Associate Agronomist.

Research has shown that a winter irrigation on non-grazed wheat is neither practical nor profitable. If the winter wheat is to be grazed, an irrigation in January is probably necessary.

The Tascosa variety of wheat was used in the study, and two irrigation methods were utilized, with twelve different fertilizer levels. The irrigation method which proved most economical on non-grazed wheat included an application at germination, jointing, early boot, and head.

It was interested to note in the same test that the fertilizer levels of 120-60-0, 120-90-0, and 120-0-0 plus 30 pounds of sulfur produced yields with no significant differences. (Figures refer to pounds of Nitrogen, Phosphate, and Potash per acre). However, the level of 120-0-0 plus 30 pounds of sulfur produced the greatest return because of the lower cost of fertilizer.

It is believed that the sulfur increased the yield by making soil phosphate more available to the plant, rather than as a plant nutrient for the wheat. On non-grazed wheat, the combination of eliminating a winter irrigation, plus the decreased fertilizer costs, should result in more net profit for the wheat farmer.

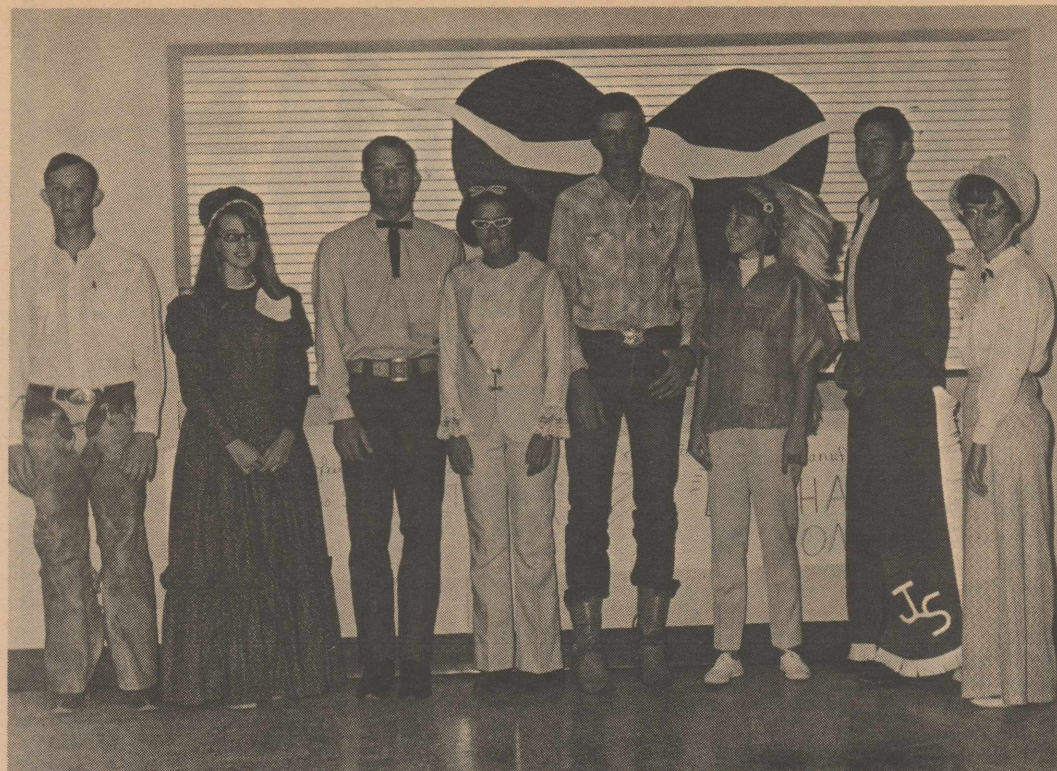
