Lazbuddie Hit By Hart

Hart Shorthorns took their thirteenth consecutive win and eighth win of the season here last Thursday evening as they downed the Lazbuddie Junior High 36 to 14.

Jimmy Robinson opened the scoring for the Shorthorns as he sped 15 yards for the Shorthorns' first TD early in the game.

Ruben Aguanio's try for the extras failed and the Shorthorns kept their 6-0 lead.

Shortly afterward Robert Garcia boosted the Hart lead as he scampered 30 yards for the second Hart score. Jimmy Robinson made good on the extras and the score went up to 14 to 0.

Again the Shorthorns got the ball and scored with Robert Garcia doing the job, this time from three yards out.

Ruben Aguanio picked up the extras and the Shorthorn lead increased to 22 to 0.

Stan Dyer got the honors for the next TD as he scooped a Lazbuddie fumble out of the air and outran everyone to the goal line 35 yards away. The try for the extras by Barham failed and the Shorthorns had to stay with their 28 to 0 lead.

Late in the game the Lazbuddie Shorthorns struck for two TDs and one set of extras but that was all they could muster.

Just before the end Hart struck for another TD as Jimmy Robinson picked it up from 12 yards out. Oscar Longoria picked up this set of extras the score read 36 to 14 in favor of the Hart Shorthorns.

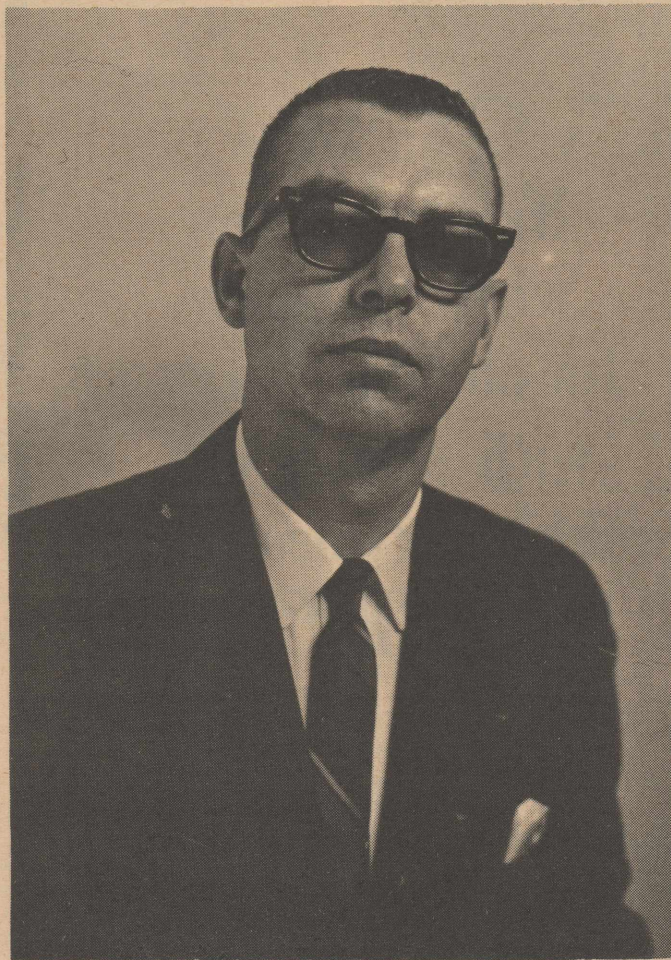
Jimmy Robinson, Ricky Black, Oscar Longoria, and Stan Dyer turned in excellent defensive performances for the Horns.

Shorthorns scored 226 points this season while holding their opponents to only 58 for a game average of 28.3 points on offense and only 7.2 for their foes.

Entertainment was by Caprock High School.

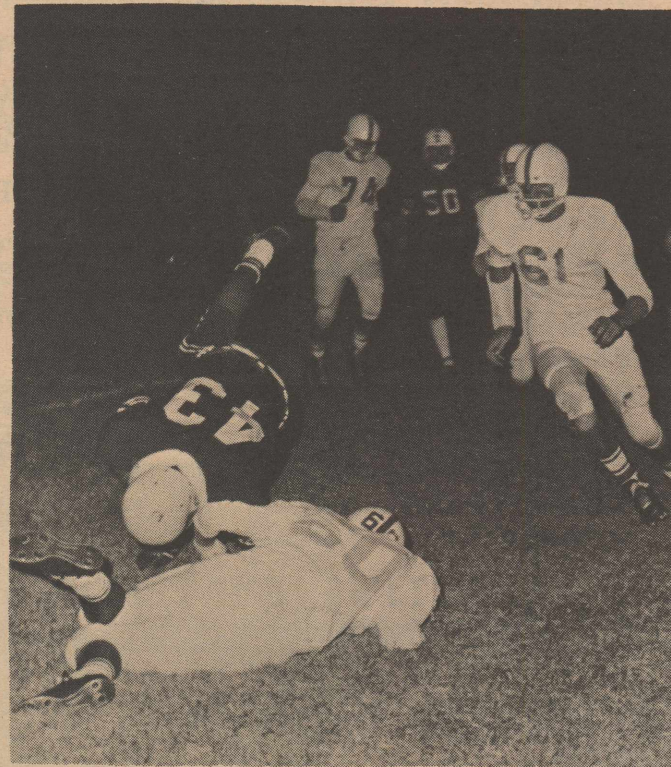
Hart Starts FTA Chapter

HONEY SALAD DRESSING

1 c. whipping cream
3 T. Honey
3 T. lemon juice

Whip cream stiff. Fold in honey and lemon juice. Good with fruit salads.

YUM YUM ORANGE SALAD

1 No. 2 can crushed pineapple
1/2 c. sugar
1 large box orange jello
2 c. cold water
1 c. grated longhorn cheese
1 c. whipping cream
1/2 c. nuts

Bring pineapple and sugar to a boil, dissolve jello in hot mixture, add 2 cups cold water. Let stand until mixture starts to thicken. Fold in remaining ingredients all but nuts. Sprinkle nuts in bottom of mold and pour jello mixture on top, let set. Unmold and serve.

2 c. plain flour
2 tsp. baking soda
2 tsp. Cinnamon
1 tsp. salt
1 c. chopped Walnuts(English)

Combine apples and sugar let stand. Beat eggs slightly, then beat in oil and vanilla. Mix and sift flour, baking soda, cinnamon and salt; stir in alternately with apple-sugar mixture.

APPLE WALNUT CAKE

4 c. coarsely chopped apples
2 c. granulated sugar
2 whole eggs
1/2 c. vegetable oil
2 tsp. vanilla

Stir in walnuts. Pour into oblong pan 13 x 9 x 2 inches. Bake at 350 degrees about one hour, or until cake tests done.

Let stand in pan until quite cool, turn out on rack to complete cooling.

Longhorns Nudge

The Hart Longhorns put together their best game of the season here last Friday night as they dropped the Nazareth Swifts 19 to 0. The win kept the Longhorns in second place in the district race and kept alive their hopes for the district crown.

The Longhorn offense worked the way it should have all season as Danny Smith and Tommy Gonzales pounded the interior of the line while Joe Quiroz and W. A. Hawkins combined on sweeps to keep the Nazareth defense under pressure all night.

The Longhorn defense wasn't about to be outdone either as the Horns, led by Tommy Gonzales, Donnie Black, Harold Bob Bennett and W. A. Hawkins, almost completely throttled Nazareth's potent passing game, allowing only eight out of 24 to be completed and intercepting three of the aeriels.

Clyde Venhause took the opening kickoff on his ten and got back to the 26 before going down. The Longhorn defense decided that was far enough, however, and in the next three plays the Swifts lost four yards to bring up fourth and 14 needed. Mark Gerber handled the punting chore as he sent the ball out to W. A. Hawkins at the Hart 40. Hawkins got nine yards back before going down.

The Longhorns couldn't do much better on their first series of downs as they could pick up only seven yards in three tries and had to go into punt formation at the Nazareth 44. Quincy Hawkins' punt rolled out of the end zone and the Swifts took over at the 20.

This time the Swifts managed to get one of their serious threats started as Clyde Venhause, Mark Gerber, and Gregory Anderle combined talents and with the help of a couple of long penalties against the Horns, moved the ball down to the Hart 24 before a fourth down play went bad and the Horns took over on downs.

The Longhorn offense still hadn't found the key and after only one first down the drive stalled out on the Hart 36. Quincy Hawkins again handled the punting and got off a good one to the Swifts 25.

Once again the Swifts found the going rough against the fired up Longhorn defense and Mark Gerber's punt carried out to the Hart 25. W. A. Hawkins moved to the 31 on the return to set the Horns up with a first and 10 at that point.

Hawkins was stopped for no gain on first but a second down pass from Tommy Gonzales to Donnie Black carried to the Nazareth 33 to put the Horns in a good position for a score. W. A. Hawkins added another first as he moved to the Nazareth 19. Danny Smith was thrown for a 2 yard loss, but on second down Hawkins again kept and romped for the final 21 yards and six points. W. A. booted the extra point and the Horns led 7-0.

After taking the kickoff the Swifts again found themselves in trouble as the rugged Longhorn defense wouldn't allow them to get moving. In fact,

both defenses got in some pretty good licks as the two teams exchanged punts in a hard fought defensive battle for much of the first half. Then just before the half the Swifts got their chance as they recovered a Hart fumble at the Nazareth 33.

Harold Schacher picked up one before Clyde Venhause moved to the 45 for a first down. Mark Gerber then hit John Pohlmeier on two passes that carried to the Hart 20 for the Swift's deepest penetration of the night. That was as far as the Swifts could move, however, as the Longhorn defense batted down four passes and took over on downs just before the first half came to a close.

The second half got under way with a bang as Quincy Hawkins took the opening kickoff at his 25, got some fine blocking and returned the ball back almost to midfield. A first down pass from W. A. Hawkins to Tommy Gonzales moved the Horns to the Swift's 35 for another first down. Danny Smith got five yards on first and Tommy Gonzales moved to the 25 only to have a penalty move the ball back to the 46. This didn't stop the Horns as Tommy Gonzales threw to Donnie Black on the 18 for another first.

Danny Smith kept things moving as he blasted to the 14; Hawkins got the ball to the 10 and Gonzales moved to the 8 to bring up fourth and about a foot. Danny Smith got more than enough as he boomed to the 6. Landra Bruington added one more before Hawkins was dropped for a loss at the 10. Two passes from Hawkins to Black went incomplete and the Swifts took over.

Nazareth wasn't able to keep the ball long as W. A. Hawkins picked off a second down pass at the 35 and brought it back to the 20. Things didn't go too well for the Horns this time as they were forced to give up the ball on down way back on the 39.

The Swifts were able to pick up one first down via the penalty route but that was all and the Horns took over on downs at the Longhorn 35.

Once again the Horns started their march toward the Nazareth goal line with Tommy Gonzales and Danny Smith picking up most of the yardage on the ground while a pass from Hawkins to Hawkins, W. A. to Quincy, provided the aerial fireworks on the drive. But, like the two previous drives, the Horns lost steam as they neared the goal line and the Swifts took over on down at the 20. Once again the Swifts didn't get to keep the ball long as W. A. Hawkins intercepted a second down pass at the 29.

Looking like a rerun on TV the Horns drove forward again and once again found the stubborn Nazareth defense too much and gave up the ball again, this time on the Swift's 14.

Once again W. A. Hawkins took a second down pass interception, this time at the 35 and got back to the 18 before he went down. This time there was no stopping Danny Smith as he blasted over in two tries. The extra point try went wide
