## Highway Construction To Begin



CONSTRUCTION CREWS moved into Hart this past week to start a street improving project which will include raising and grading roadways and installing curbs. gutters, sewers, and drains where necessary. The project, approved by the city in July, will cost a total of \$65,514 and will cost as much as \$5 a foot for property owners along the 10 streets involved. Of the \$5 tax, \$1.70 will be paid for each foot of curb and gutter and the remaining \$3.30 per foot is assessed for all other improvements, according to the original city resolution. All existing streets now in need of repair are eligible for patching under the newly-voted plan.

### Correct Address A Must On All Overseas Mail

Postmistress Jewel Brooks today urged the citizens of Hart to be sure to use the correct address on their letters and packages going to servicemen overseas to avoid serious delays in delivery.

Postmistress Brooks reported that millions of letters plete and packages going overseas have been delayed because they were insufficiently addressed. She said that one of the biggest problems has been the failure of persons to include the very important 5 digit APO or FPO number in the military address, Mail not containing this number is incorrectly addressed.

addresses. "As the Christmas mail volume going overseas is expected to increase up to 30 per cent or over 4 million pounds above last year, every precaution should be taken by friends and relatives of servicemen to address their letters and packages properly to assure rapid delivery to its destination,"

There are four essential elements to an overseas military address. They are:

1. The serviceman's ident-- grade, full name, and service number.

2. His military unit - com-


And then, too, the zip numbers make it a lot easier for me to find my way around and get the proper presents to the proper children when I make my trip through Hart on Christmas Eve.

MEAT PIE

1 lb. beef shoulder 1/4 lb. pork shoulder 3 T. shortening l onion, minced onion seasoning 1/2 c. celery 2 potatoes, diced 2/3 c. carrots, diced salt to taste, about 1 1/2 tsp. celery salt

CRUST

11/2 c. flour 4 T. shortening 3/4 c. milk 4 tsp. baking powder 3/4 tsp. salt

Cut meat in small pieces, dip lightly in flour, brown in hot frying pan with hot melted shortening. Add little hot water, cover, simmer until tender. Place meat and vegetables in buttered baking dish, cover with gravy made of meat drippings with 2 tablespoons flour. Add salt to taste. Cover with pie crust as follows:

Sift flour, salt and baking powder together. To flour mixture work in shortening. Slowly add milk, roll to 1/2 inch thickness, place over meat, but moisten rim with water to hold pastry. Prick dough with fork for steam to escape. Bake in oven until brown. Serve with lettuce and tomato salad or cloe slaw.

VEAL POT ROAST AND VEGETABLES

3 to 7 lbs. veal chuck, shoulder, rump or round steak salt pepper celery salt sifted flour

onion seasoning

little beef suet 1/2 c. hot water onions carrots potatoes

Sprinkle meat with salt, pepper, dredge with flour. Tie meat in round loaf, brown in heavy iron pot using beef suet, use low rack under meat to keep from burning. Add water, cover, cook over slow fire until tender, about 3 hours. About I hour before meat is done, add vegetables which have been washed, peeled and quartered. For gravy: Skim off fat from pot. Add 3 tablespoons flour, mix with rest of drippings, stir over fire until smooth, add seasoning. Serve hot.

### Christmas Seals KITCHEN KORNER Being Sold For 61st Year

It's Christmas Seal time

Seals mean a great deal to people who deal with tuberculosis and other chest-respira-tory diseases. The first one was mailed in 1907. Emily Bis-sel designed it to read like "Put this seal with mesthis. sage bright, on every Christmas letter; Help the tuberculosis fight, and Make the New Year better."

People like it, and thus began the first Christmas Seal campaignt This is the 61st.

Sheets of the Seals are in the mail to literally thousands of residents in the 23-county area covered by the West Texas tuberculosis Association, as well as across the nation.

And even though they're attractive additions to Christmas cards and gifts, there is

another picture.

The other side of the Christmas Seal begins when the dollars begin to pour into TBA offices across the country. In the case of WTTA, 93 cents of this dollar remains in the state of Texas to work for the loacl area. Seven cents goes to the national association, only to return home in the form of educational materials and medical research in emphysema, bronchitis and asthma, as well as the common cold. All this is done in addition to the research done in tuberculosis.

Many people do not know that TB is still a major killer among infectious diseases. Because of the magnificent work done in TB research and care, many are not even aware of its existence today, nor the extent to which it is a problem for everyone.

The TB Associations are acutely aware of this, however, and take giant strides to fight tuberculosis and other respira-

tory diseases.

All this work is dependent on the voluntary response of the individual. In the case of the West Texas area, the sole income is from Christmas Seal Sales, monies from the Mobile X-Ray Unit and from personal

contributions.

And here are just a few of the ways in which the TB Associations work for you:

Tuberculin testing schools is done completely without charge and provides a comprehensive evaluation of the number of infected children. Tests are given when children are in the first, seventh and ninth grades in public school.

Chest X-Rays, made in the Mobile Unit or at the local public health department, are followups in many cases, to the skin testing. A doubtful or positive reaction indicates the need for further testing. This usually includes an X-Ray.

Professional help is given in the form of Doctor's Symposiums and Nurses Clinics. All these are staffed and planned by TB Association workers.

Another everyday occurence is the volunteer work which goes largely unsung that is done

by doctors. There is no expense to the public. The work is financed by the WTTA through the con-

tributions made in the sale of Christmas Seals.

Few people realize that constant research has come up with a new use for an antituberculosis drug called Isoniazid (INH). Extensive trials conducted by the United States Public Health Service in cooperation with the National Tuberculosis Association over the past 15 years, show a consistent reduction of morbidity in groups taking isonizaid(INH) as chemoprophylaxis.
