Henry Myers Ogletree has authorized the Hart Beat to announce that he will be a candidate for sheriff of Castro County in the May 1968 Democratic Primary.

U. S. Army from 1960 to 1962. He has been employed in law enforcement for the past five years, having served as a deputy sheriff the past two.

Ogletree says that he has no other interest to keep him from applying his full attention and time to the office of sheriff. Mrs. Ogletree is employed at Dimmitt Super Market.

Castro County Residents To Aid In TB Services

Castro County citizens are asked to participate in plans to provide local tuberculosis services in this county.

The Texas Tuberculosis Association has for years operated through a series of county associations. It is now in the process of forming "area" associations in which groups of

counties band themselves together to offer a more complete tuberculosis program than is possible for one county to do.

Counties to be included in an area tuberculosis association

are Carson, Childress, Gray, Potter, Randall, Wheeler, Armstrong, Briscoe, Castro, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Roberts, Sherman, and Swisher. The first six listed of these counties have long had local tuberculosis associations.

"By pooling our resources in the entire 26-county area, we expect to do a more thorough job in each of the counties than we were ever able to do with each county operating separately," commented Lambert.

Curt Lambert of the Texas Tuberculosis Association in Auatin will visit Dimmitt in January to discuss with local citizens what can be done to provide better health opportunities locally.

New Reporting Service Will Assist Farmers

Farmers will benefit from a new reporting service which has been inaugurated by ASCS, Jim Elder, chairman of the Castro ASC county committee announced today.

A report of payments made to each farmer under ACP, cotton, feed grain, wheat, and other direct payment programs during 1967 will be mailed to the farmer during the latter part of January.

This report is expected to be helpful in preparing individual income tax returns. The same information must also be furnished to the Internal Revenue Service in accordance with a requirement of law.

It is estimated that over three million farmers will receive this report, he said. This information is being gathered

from county offices and summarized by computers located at New Orleans and Kansas City.

"The reports are being printed by the computers and mailed direct to farmers. A job of this size could not be completed without an automated system," added Elder.

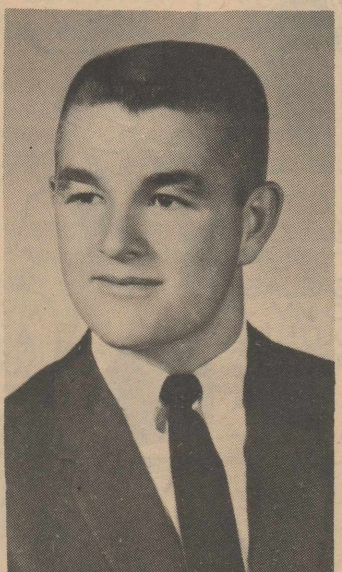

Emmett Burrows Resigns Job As Night Police

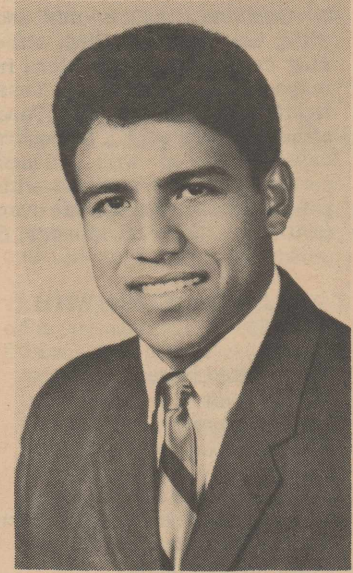
Emmett Burrows, city night policeman at Hart the past seven months, has resigned and moved back to Olton.

Jack Cartwright Announces Plans

Jack Cartwright has announced his candidacy for reelection to the office of Castro County sheriff, subject to the action of the Democratic Primary to be held on May 4.

Color Photograph To Be On License

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded Texans today that a color photograph becomes a standard part of all drivers' license issued after January 1, 1968.

"The change makes it necessary for all drivers to renew licenses in person at one of our Department offices," Garrison said, "and we have been working toward setting up a procedure that will not cause excessive delay when a person comes to us to renew a license."

Garrison explained that the change in license was incorporated into law by the last legislature.

"Renewal notices will be mailed to each driver, just as always," Garrison said. "However, under the new procedure, each driver must take the renewal notice to the nearest DPS office. There he will be given a standard vision test, sign the renewal notice and step in front of our camera. The picture will be snapped and a receipt will be issued to enable the person to drive until he receives his new license in the mail."

Garrison explained that about 250 full-time license offices would be in operation over the state to service license renewals. Issuance of new licenses will also be conducted in many of these new offices

as well as at offices already established.

There are currently over 5,800,000 licensed drivers in Texas and about 2,500,000 licenses are renewed annually. To facilitate the process all licenses after January 1 will be renewed to expire on the birth-

Citizens Reminded To Register

Citizens were reminded that the deadline for registering to vote is January 31.

All citizens, 20 to 100, must register in order to be eligible to vote in this year's elections. Registration is free.

Persons may register at the city hall, Monday through Fridays.

Persons over 60 who formerly did not have to pay poll tax are now required to register before they are eligible to vote.

Those who are 20 may register in the event that some will reach 21 before this year's elections.

Remember, this is an important election year and to vote EVERYONE must have registered - - - Before Jan. 31.



KITCHEN KORNER

The holidays being over we can settle back into our regular routine of things.

I don't really feel like I could eat anything rich or sweet for another year as I'm sure most of you feel the same way, so it's back to the very simple foods for at least a few weeks.

I also like the easily prepared meals after all the rush and work of the holiday meals.

Here are a few different, good and also easy.

SPICY SWISS STEAK

1 1/2 lbs. round steak
2 T. shortening
1 c. spaghetti sauce mix
1 can (6 oz.) tomato paste
1 1/2 c. water

Cut meat into 6 pieces. Pound with meat hammer or edge of heavy saucer. Brown meat in shortening; add sauce mix, tomato paste, and water. Stir until blended. Cover and cook slowly 1 1/2 hours or until meat is tender. If desired, may be baked, covered, in moderate oven (350 deg.) about 1 1/2 hours, 6 servings.

BAKED CHICKEN SALAD

1 c. white sauce mix
1 c. milk
1/2 c. mayonnaise

1 T. prepared mustard
3 c. diced, cooked canned chicken
1 c. diced celery
1/3 c. slivered blanched almonds
1 c. crushed potato chips
paprika

Combine sauce mix and milk; heat just to boiling, stirring constantly. Cool; blend in mayonnaise and mustard. Toss lightly with chicken, celery, and almonds. Place in 1 1/2 quart casserole. Top with crushed potato chips and sprinkle with paprika. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg.) 20 to 25 minutes. 6 Servings.

SCALLOPED CORN WITH OLIVES

3 T. melted butter
1/2 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
1 T. sugar
1 c. milk
2 eggs
1 can (1lb.) cream style corn
1/2 c. bread crumbs
1 tsp. minced onion
1/3 c. stuffed green olives, sliced.

Mix the first six ingredients together until blended. Add the corn, bread crumbs, onion and olives and stir until mixed. Pour into a 1 1/2 quart Teflon baking pan and bake for 25 to 30 minutes at 350 deg. Serves 6.

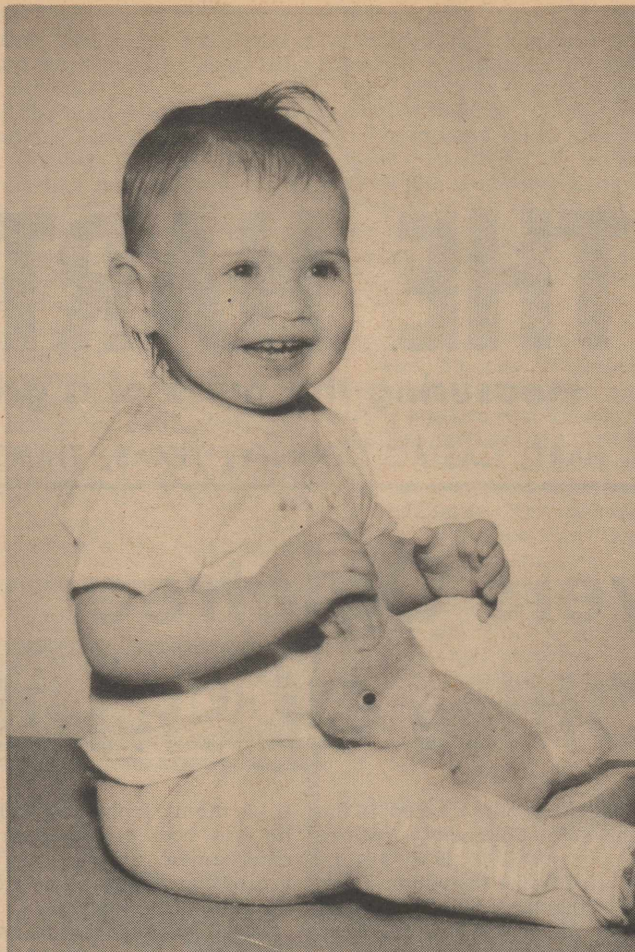

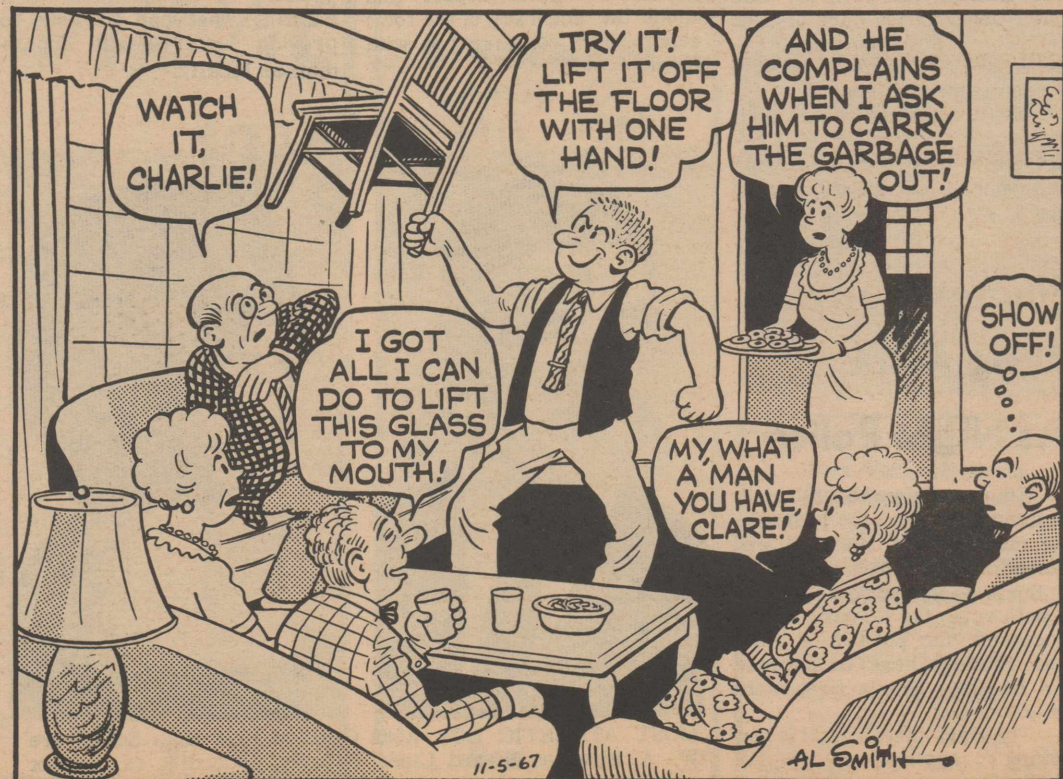

STATE Capital NEWS

Any way you look at it, 1968 shapes up as the most action-packed political year for Texas in more than a decade.

It will start with a wide-open governor's race in the Democratic primary perhaps the roughest since 1956. Also, there may be some other close races for less exciting offices. And of course, the presidential battle will hold the November general election spotlight. If Texas Republicans make good their threat the field a strong candidate for governor, and it seems they will, there will be plenty of action on that front almost the year around.

There is no sure way of predicting at this point whether U. S. Sen Ralph Yarborough, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, Secretary of State John Hill, former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, Dallas radio man Gordon McLendon, Houston attorney Don Yarborough or an unheralded dark horse will emerge the Democratic nominee for governor. Neither is it clear who the Republicans will put up to oppose him, Congressman George Bush of Houston? Sen. John Tower? An unknown?

While Texas national Democratic convention delegates obviously will be pledged to support President Johnson, state Republican leaders have not tipped their hands as to their favorite candidate for nomination.

Although the winners can't be picked in advance, red letter dates can be marked on the dates can be marked on the 1968 political calendar. Here are the main ones:

- * February 5 -- Last day for filing as candidates in primaries.
- * May 4 -- First primary election and party precinct conventions.
- * May 11 -- County party conventions.
- * June 1 -- Second primary election.
- * June 8 -- State conventions to pick national convention delegates.
- * September 17 -- State conventions to pick Texas party leadership (executive committees) and write the state party platforms.
- * November 5 -- General election.

Remember that, to participate in any of the action, you must register (it's free) with

the county tax assessor-collector or authorized deputy by January 31. Registration is simple and can be accomplished through the mail on forms provided by most newspapers.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES--State Welfare Department can pay medical aid directly to recipients of services or to physicians, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

* An anhydrous ammonia pipeline is subject to jurisdiction of the Railroad Commission.

* A qualified agricultural engineering major can be licensed as a professional engineer.

* Cochran County Memorial Hospital District can pay expenses of sending needy persons to outside hospital facility where it cannot discharge its full responsibility to provide adequate medical care.

* Requirement of newspaper advertisement (or posting) to take competitive bids does not apply to county expenditures for purchase of equipment for general use by the county payable out of current funds. Where the county wants to make a contract under competitive building requirements, bids must be stated in terms of gross price without "trade-in". However, county commissioners may ask for trade-in data and consider it in awarding the contract.

COURTS SPEAK--A Negro mathematician at the spacecraft center in Houston who had a plate yanked out of his hand by a private club manager is entitled to \$900 in damages for "battery", State Supreme Court agreed. Decision reversed lower courts.

Fourth Court of Civil Appeals, in a Webb County case, agreed the state has the right to regulate picketing in labor-management dispute. Labor group unsuccessfully attacked a ban against more than two pickets at a time within 50 feet of the struck establishment or other pickets.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED--Gov. John Connally announced appointment of Lawrence Miller Jr. of Dallas and George R. Bolin of Houston to

Texas Real Estate Commission. He also appointed McLennan Co. Court at Law Judge Derwood Johnson of Waco as Judge of the 74th Judicial District Court.

Governor placed Dr. J. Robert Baier of Houston on the Texas Board for Chiropractic Examiners and reappointed Dr. Charles E. Courtion of San Angelo and Dr. C. T. Harkey Jr. of Victoria.

Miss Wathena Douglas of Midland was named to the State Board of Hairdressers and Cosmetologists.

COOPER DAM ROW RESOLVED--Controversy with federal authorities over Cooper Dam and Reservoir (Sulphur River in Northeast Texas) has been resolved to the state's interest.

New contract omitted the controversial water quality requirements, according to Joe G. Moore Jr., executive director of Texas Water Development Board.

Long-range issue of federal requirements concerning release of "flushing" water to control downstream water pollution statewide still is very much alive.

POLICY CANCELLATION GUIDELINES SET--State Board of Insurance announced these general guidelines for cancellation of certain insurance policies or company refusal to renew coverage:

* Family auto policies and auto coverage should be cancelled only for premium non-payment or for license suspension or revocation.

* Companies should not balk at renewing family auto policies strictly on account of ages of insured.

* Thirty days' notice of non-renewal should be given before declining to renew family auto policies and auto coverage, homeowners policies and standard fire policies on one-family dwellings.

* Cancellation cannot be ordered on home owner and standard fire policies for one-family dwellings solely because the company changes underwriting requirements during the policy term.

date of the licensee. If the person holds a license ending in an even number, it will be renewed for a four year term; if the license ends in an off number, it will be renewed for two years the first time then for four years each time thereafter. The cost to the driver remains the same per year.

The new license will be approximately 2 1/8 inches wide by 3 3/8 inches long, or about the same size as a standard credit card.

"We anticipate fairly large crowds at many of our offices," said Garrison, "and we hope to be able to give each person completely satisfactory service. We look forward to making many new friends among the millions of persons we have been serving by mail before now."

HemisFair Needs Young Workers

The fun and excitement of employment at a World's Fair is available to more than 1,500 young Texans.

B. F. Agee, manager of personnel for HemisFair 1968, has announced that a statewide recruiting program has started to hire at least that many young persons for employment from March 15 to October 6, 1968.

Agee is working with Texas Employment Commission Offices throughout the state to find accountants, ticket sellers, ticket takers, hostesses, security guards, maintenance personnel, secretaries general

clerical help, writers, guides, ushers and parking lot attendants.

Another 1,500 employees are being sought by restaurants, concession stands and exhibition halls on the 92.6-acre site of the international exposition.

Texas Employment Commission offices in all parts of the state will accept applications for HemisFair work, and forward them to Agee, TEC applicants also will be available for consideration by exhibitors, concessionaires and restaurateurs who are hiring their own help.

"Since the goal of HemisFair is to be the best international exhibition ever held," Agee said, "we will need people

who are young in heart and spirit, energetic, not afraid of hard work and who enjoy being of service."

The need now is for workers who can work from March 15 to October 6, 1968. The program has not yet been worked out for college students seeking employment only for the summer months, Agee said.

Applicants seeking employment from March 15 to October 6 should apply at their Texas Employment Commission now. They should be 18 years of age, bondable, have a high school education or equivalent experience, be neat, have a pleasant personality, be of good character and be physically fit.

The exception is for work as HemisFair's official hostesses

and guides. These must be between 20 and 30 years of age and be bilingual and must have had previous experience in dealing with the public.

Agee said there will be at least two shifts of workers, since the exhibition halls open from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m. and the fair grounds are open from 9 a. m. to midnight.
