Medicare A Good Buy, **Enrollment Time Extended**

John G. Hutton, district manager of social security in Lubbock, Texas, reports, "Many older people are asking these days: 'Now that I've been given another chance to sign up for the doctor bill insurance part of medicare will somepart of medicare, will some-body tell me whether this is a good buy?" "

Hutton explained that those persons who were 65 or older in 1965 could enroll for the voluntary medical insurance part of the program in any of the last three months of 1965 or the first five months of 1966, Those who reached 65 after 1965 had the three months before the month they were 65, the month they became 65, and the three months thereafter to get this protection for themselves.

Now, as provided by law, those who originally turned it down have an opportunity to reconsider their earlier decision. Then, if they decide to sign up, they may do so at any time in the last three months of 1967 and the first three months of
