Annual Stockholders Meeting Held For Tulia Savings, Loan

The Meeting of the Tulia Savings and Loan Association was held in its office at 4 p. m., Wed-nesday Feb. 14, 1968.

President R. T. O'Daniel presided at the meeting.

Olan Alexander, vice president and managing officer gave a report on the activities of the Association for the year ending Dec. 31, 1967.

The report showed total assets of the Association as of Dec. 31, 1967 of \$6,050,-815.56, up over 16 per cent from the \$5,202,473.12 reported a year ago. Record dividends totaling \$259,283.60 were paid during 1967. Mortgage loans put on the books during the year amounted to \$734,698.00, to bring the total loans to \$5,-065,185.00.

However, this year the auto safety inspection could be more than just an inconvenience to the motorist who waits until the last day to get his vehicle inspected. It is possible many cars may not get inspected due to a shortage of seat belts. The 1967 state legislature passed a law requiring that front seat belts must be installed in all vehicles in which seat belt anchorages were a part of the manufacturer's original equipment. Seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on all American passenger cars beginning with 1962 models. Seat belts also will be required on foreign-made cars in which seat belt anchorages were original equipment. Captain Johnson points out that seat belt anchorages are threaded holes in the vehicle structure suitable for receiv-

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

Laborers Housing **To Open In Dimmitt**

A bellwether project for decent, modern housing of migratory farm workers in the United States will open March 1 at Dimmitt, Texas, a vegetable - growing capital of the West Texas Plains.

Opening of the 192-family project will coincide with the start of the great annual northward trek of Mexican-American families from the Rio Grande Valley of Texas. Their first work in the Dimmitt area will be to hand plant hundreds of acres of onions beginning the first of March.

The year's first migrants arriving in Dimmitt will find ready for use a new complex of 192 modern family apartments completed over the winter as a replacement for crude shacks and barracks that migratory families previously have had to use for living quarters, Dimmitt's project "Castro County Agricultural Housing," is a \$966,820 development organized and built by an association of 37 farmers in the coun-ty surrounding Dimmitt and 25 business firms in the town. It is the biggest new migratory farm labor housing center completed in the country by a private community association assisted by federal loan-andgrant financing through the Far-mers Home Administration, a credit agency of the U. S. De-partment of Agriculture. The agency insured a private loan of \$570,000 which the Castro County Association will repay at 5% interest in 33 years. The USDA-FHA added a \$387,380 grant to cover additional cost of establishing the complex. The farmers and other association members contributed \$9,440 in organizing the project.

The 9-acre area of attractive, garden-style apartments includes nine two-story and 23 one-story buildings, containing 144 one-bedroom and 48 twobedroom units. All contain modern kitchens and baths, hot water and central heating. Buildings are of fireproof, cinder-block construction, The project has a central laundry facility and a well equipped children's playground. It houses a permanent year-round office of the Texas State Employment Service that will serve as a clearing-house for employment opportunities in the area, and a full-time clinic of the State Migrant Labor Health Service. Its peak occupancy in mid-year is expected to total about 1,000 adults and children. Nearly 50 families who work in the Dimmitt area will become year-round residents of the project.

The new units will rent at rates of \$13.00 to \$15.00 a week, compared to the scale of \$10.00 huts and bunkhouses devoid of indoor plumbing and kitchens. The Dimmitt housing is expected to set a pattern for similar developments throughout the U.S. in areas that need thousands of migratory farm workers every year and have no

fit housing to accomodate them.

In Dimmitt, the project also is regarded as a vital element in the town's economic growth. Its organization was hastened beginning in 1966 when area farmers and the local Chamber of Commerce determined that vegetable acreage in the county must be drastically held down for lack of adequate housing for the necessary seasonal farm workers. With the new housing, cucumber acreage that supplies a pickle factory in the town can be materially increased; production of onions, carrots, cabbage and other vegetables will remain up to capacity; and new vegetable packing industries in prospect for the town can be assured of adequate supporting farm production,

For the workers, the formal opening of Castro County Agricultural Housing on March 1 will usher in a new era of decent living conditions,



Crime In Texas Jumps 11.8 Percent

Crime in Texas during 1967 cleared by arrest during 1966 jumped 11.8 per cent over the was 24.3 per cent. previous year to set a new all-time high for criminal offenses, according to the Texas Depart-ment of Public Safety.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the DPS, said today that an estimated 332,986 major crimes were committed during 1967, compared to the 297,810 offenses estimated in 1966.

All major categories of crime showed increases of over lo per cent during 1967, Mur-der and homicide rose 12,4 per cent, rape was up 12,8 per cent, robbery climbed 19,0 per cent, burglary was up 11.4 per cent, aggravated assault rose 12.8 per cent, theft in-creased 11.4 per cent and auto Boy Scouts theft was up 14.1 per cent. per cent of known offenses were cleared by arrests during the year, compared to a 29 per cent clearance rate during 1966. The national figure for crimes

A rather important corner may have been turned by the State of Texas in providing transportation facilities for its people. This by clarifying where the line between state and federal regulatory power should be drawn. tax res

Texas Aeronautics Commission took the big step when its six members voted to certify Air Southwest Co. of San Antonio as an intrastate airline competing with the large, federally regulated interstate lines.

Air Southwest plans to offer commuter service among Dallas, San Antonio, and Houston using Lockheed Electra propjets. It says it can offer service comparable to the large airlines and at rates lower by more than 20 per cent.

Federal-state rub is that the Civil Aeronautics Board licenses the interstate carriers and has its service and subsidy balances all worked out, without considering any state-licensed airlines.

So, Air Southwest is going to upset those balances somewhat, by taking from Braniff, Trans-Texas and Continental airlines some of the revenues now received under their charters from the CAB.

CAB did not make its wishes in the matter of Air Southwest's certification known to the Texas Aeronautics Commission. But Braniff, TTA and Continental did. Result was a seven-day hearing before TAC examiners, then another hearing for oral arguments before the commission itself.

Despite TAC's favorable ruling, the fight is far from over. Opponents to Air Southwest's plans have made it known that they plan to take their case into the courts--as far as it will go.

In the state courts, they will maintain that the TAC's action was not based on "substantial evidence". If they fail there, one attorney said they might go into the federal courts, charging that the TAC certification placed an undue burden on interstate commerce in violation of the U. S. Constitution.

SPECIAL SESSION OUT-LOOK-- Gov. John Connally revealed a "new unofficial estimate" by State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert on available General Revenue Funds, indicating that available revenue for operating state government may be some \$50,000,000 higher than the comptroller's October, 1967, estimate of \$297,600,000. Governor Connally says the

"I am hopeful that if the special legislative session this year can be postponed until June," Speaker Ben Barnes said, "the figure will be even less" than the previous estimate of \$115,000,000 in new tax resources necessary to support the state government in the fiscal year which begins Sept. 1.

Barnes said recent revisions in revenue estimates mean that if the Legislature had passed a two-year bill in 1967, instead of waiting for a special session, Texas taxpayers would have been taxed about \$60,000,000 more than necessary.



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Easter Seal Letters ----**KITCHEN KORNER** To Go Out This Week

After spending two months with us my sister-in-law is planning on going back to Kansas next Sunday. And of course it's going to be awfully lonesome without her for awhile.

I know she will be glad to get home as it is always good to go visiting but good to get home. I especially enjoy her visit as we both are recipe hounds and do like to try new recipes.

She is small and the calories don't bother her as they do me so my diet went out the window these last two months and guess I better get back on it again.

Here are a couple of recipes that I hope you enjoy.

JELLIED SALMON SALAD

1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. mustard 1 T. flour 1 T. sugar 1/4 c. evaporated milk 1/4 c, water l egg, beaten 3 T. vinegar 1 T. gelatin 1/4 c. cold water 1-lb. can red or pink salmon 1/2 c. diced celery 1/2 c. diced cucumber lettuce Mayonnaise

Combine first 4 ingredients in top of double boiler; add milk, 1/4 cup water, egg and vinegar. Cook over boiling water until thickened, stirring constantly. Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup cold water; add to hot mixture and stir until dissolved, cold,

Cool until thick and syrupy. Flake salmon after removing skin and large bones; fold into cooled mixture along with celery and cucumber. Pour into a lightly oiled mold and chill until firm. Unmold on lettucelined plate and serve with mayonnaise.

LEMON CRACKER PUDDING

1 c. evaporated milk 1 c. water 2/3 c. coarse cracker crumbs 3/4 c. sugar 1/2 tsp. salt 2 T. lemon juice 1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind 2 T. melted butter 2 eggs, separated 1/4 c. sugar 1 T. lemon juice

Add milk to water and scald in top of double boiler. Combine cracker crumbs, 3/4 c. sugar, salt, 2 tablespoons lemon juice and the rind, and add slowly to scalded milk and water, stirring constantly. Stir in melted butter and beaten egg yolks. Pour into greased baking dish and bake in a moderately slow oven (325 deg. F.) 45 minutes.

Then remove from oven, cover with meringue made by beating whites of eggs until stiff, grad-ually adding 1/4 cup sugar and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Bake in a moderate oven (350 deg.F.) until meringue is brown (12 to 15 minutes), Serve warm or
