## Six Rural Accidents Reported In Castro

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of February, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person injured, and an estimated property damage of \$2,930.00.

The rural traffic accidents for this county during the first two months of 1968 shows a total of 12 accidents resulting in no persons killed, three persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$7,640.00.

"With the April 15 deadline for obtaining inspection stickers drawing near, only 44 per cent of the registered vehicles in this county have been inspected," stated the Patrol Supervisor.

In order to avoid the in-

convenience of the last minute rush and the possible shortage of seat belts, motorists are urged to get their vehicles inspected promptly.

Any driver operating a vehicle registered in Texas, that is required to be inspected, on public roads after April 15 without a valid 1968 inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and is punishable by a fine not to exceed two hundred dollars.

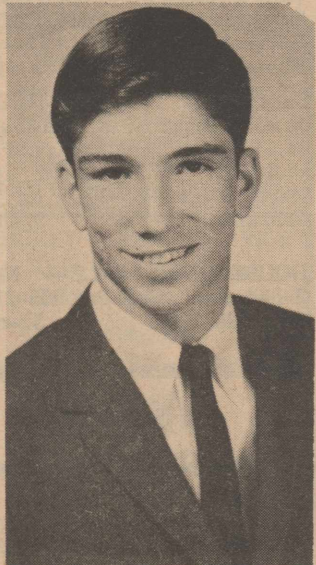

The undergraduate honor is awarded to students who have excelled academically at A&M, Dr. Hall, explained, by earning at least a 2.25 grade point ratio (out of a possible 3.0) during the most recent semester of the regular school year.

In addition to posting at least a 2.25 GPR, a student qualifying for Distinguished Student Honors must have been enrolled for a minimum of 15 semester hours and have no grade lower than a "C". Distinguished Student ranking is limited to 10 per cent of A&M's undergraduate enrollment.

The Brocks will continue to reside in Dimmitt.

Graddy Tunnell, attorney from Plainview, gave the address. Tunnell spoke on Man's Attitude. He stressed that attitudes change with time and age.

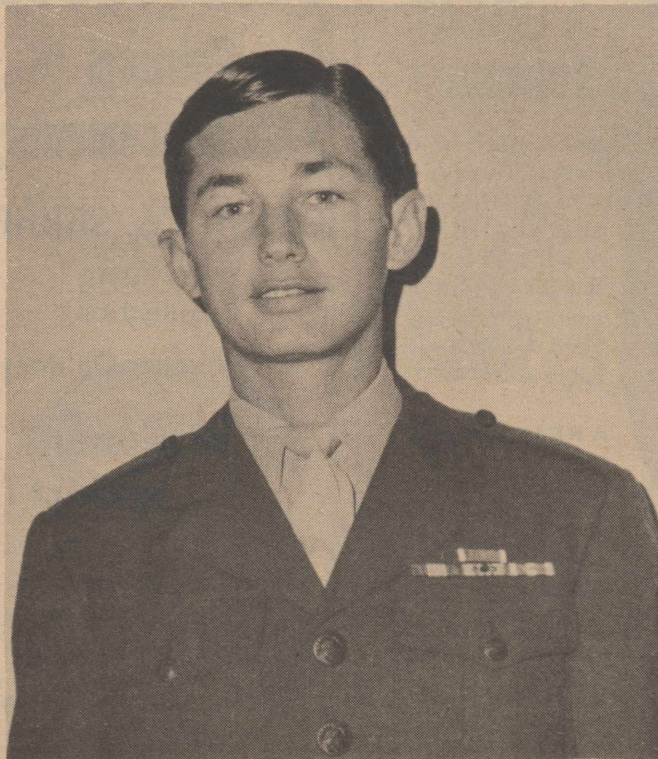
## Mike Morrison Is Discharged

## Easter Seal Society Helps Needy Families

The Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas offers a variety of services to the physically disabled citizen of Castro County, according to Mrs. Walter Maynard the Easter Seal Representative for the county.

"The Texas Easter Seal Society can provide services to people and families who cannot afford to pay all or part of the cost involved. We can assist in paying for physical, occupational and speech and hearing therapy when it is prescribed by a medical doctor," he said.

"Should a family or individual have to travel to another town for therapy we can help defray traveling expenses when the family is unable to meet them."

"We can also provide assistance to individuals and families in purchasing orthopedic equipment such as wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, braces when prescribed by a medical doctor."

"We can provide help to families in reaching the right person or agencies to receive help that the Easter Seal Society does not provide. This is very important when special testing, evaluation or hospitalization might be necessary. Also people are often eligible for services from public or private agencies but do not know the person, requirements, or place to get the help, perhaps the Easter Seal Society can help," he added.

Mrs. Maynard urged anyone who might be able to benefit from the help provided by the Easter Seal Society to contact her at First State Bank, Dimmitt, Texas 79027.

Easter Seal Services are available to any adult or child with a physical handicap. The 1968 Easter Seal Appeal will provide funds for a wide variety of educational projects and treatment services for Texans. The campaign will run through Easter Sunday, April 14.

## Veterans Benefits Not Limited

The Veterans Administration today issued a reminder that benefits of the new GI Bill are not limited to Vietnam Era veterans, but apply equally to veterans who served in the armed forces at any time after January 31, 1955.

Jack Coker, Manger of the VA Regional Office in Waco, Texas, said that veterans who had at least 181 days active duty service, any part of which occurred after January 31, 1955, are eligible for these GI Bill benefits:

\* Educational Assistance: Full-time payments for college type training range from \$130 a month for a single veteran to \$175 for a veteran with two dependents, with \$10 extra for each additional dependent.

\* High School: The same payments are available to a veteran while he completes high school without losing any GI Bill Eligibility for advanced

educational benefits.

\* Apprenticeship or Other On-The-Job Training: Payments (based on six-month periods) begin at \$80 per month in the first period for a single veteran with added payments for veterans with dependents.

\* Farm Cooperative Training Includes Institutional Courses: Payments range upwards from \$105 a month.

\* Vocational Flight Training: Payments cover 90 percent of the established charge for flight training for veterans who have the equivalent of a valid private pilot license.

\* GI Loans: VA guarantees a portion of loans made through commercial lenders. On home loans the VA will guarantee up to \$7,500 of the loan; on farm real estate loans up to \$4,000; and on non-real estate farm loans up to \$2,000. VA will make direct loans for homes in certain cases.

\* Medical Care: VA provides hospital care for all vet-

erans who served in the armed forces after January 31, 1955, (whether their service is classed as wartime or peacetime) on the same basis as for veterans of earlier wars. Top priority goes to men needing treatment for service-connected or service-aggravated disabilities. If a bed is available, veterans may be admitted for any ailment requiring hospitalization if they are unable to pay for the treatment in a private hospital.

\* An allowance of \$1,600 purchase of specially-equipped automobiles for veterans with certain severe disabilities suffered while in service.

In addition to VA benefits, which will be explained in detail at any VA office, veterans who served after January 31, 1955, are also entitled to Civil Service preference in federal employment and to job counseling and placement by the Department of Labor and State Employment Service offices.

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# NEWS AND FEATURES HEMISFAIR '68

WORLD EXPOSITION APRIL 6-OCT. 6-SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS

The countdown clock is moving closer and closer to opening day and workmen are picking up the tempo in a bustle of activity to make sure HemisFair '68 is ready for its millions of visitors.

With less than a month to go, first-time visitors find it hard to believe the World's Fair will meet its April 6 deadline. Others who visit the grounds on a regular basis are amazed at the speed at which the \$156 million showplace is taking shape.

Landscaping is going in on the banks of the lagoons. The mini-monorail made its maiden voyage around the 92.6 acre grounds the first of the month, and the Swiss Skyride continued its 1,000-passenger per day average. Workmen are still busy on the exteriors of some of the multitude of structures, but more are tucked away inside preparing exhibits.

In all, HemisFair '68 is a flurry of activity, and as each day clicks off the countdown clock, the eyes of the world focus more and more on the six-month World's Fair.

The race with the clock to be prepared to meet the millions of World's Fair visitors was obvious in the words of Marshall Steves, president of HemisFair, in his recent report to the board of directors.

"It will be ready on time," he said. "We may be backing out the gate with paintbrushes, but it'll be ready on time."

The \$13 million civic center complex built by the city of San Antonio is ready for the opening. The 10,000-seat arena was the site a month ago for a performance by the Harlem Globetrotters. The San Antonio boat show was held in the huge exhibit hall, and the seats have been installed in the 2,800-seat theater awaiting the first performance of the opera "Don Carlo" to inaugurate the beautiful structure.

Many pavilions are completed and truckloads of exhibits are rolling up daily to others. The 622-foot Tower of the Americas, focal point of the downtown World's Fair, is scheduled for completion at mid-month; the \$6.75 million federal pavilion is substantially completed and carpet is being installed; and workmen are installing the 42 different movie screens in the overhead portion

of the \$10 million Institute of Texan Cultures.

The nearness of the opening is pointed up in more ways than construction and countdown clocks.

Visitors Services, Inc. reports its daily telephone and mail load tripling as vacation planners from throughout the western hemisphere write for reservations. Although meeting 100 per cent success in filling those requests, VSI now asks those inquiring to offer a choice of several dates, if possible, if they desire rooms close to the Fair.

More than \$2 million in tickets to the Fair have been sold and the peak is not expected until this month. The response in both departments has led officials to believe the estimate of 7.5 million persons attending the Fair is conservative.

The entertainment menu for HemisFair '68 covers all areas of show business, from the top comedians to serious opera.

The list of entertainers lined up for the April 6-Oct. 6 World's Fair ranges from Bob Hope to the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and the Grand Old Opry to the Verdi opera "Don Carlo".

The star-studded list will appear in the new \$13 million civic center complex built on the grounds of HemisFair by the city of San Antonio. The complex includes a 10,000-seat arena, 2,800-seat theater and exhibit hall.

The San Antonio symphony and opera "Don Carlo" will be the opening attraction in the theater April 6, while the Pan American Variety Show featuring spectacular acts from Mexico, Argentina, Spain and other Latin American countries will be featured in the arena from April 6 through 28.

Among the big name television and night club entertainers booked for the World's Fair are Jack Benny, Phyllis Diller, Jimmy Dean, Bob Newhart, Don Adams, John Gary, Wayne Newton and Hope.

The dazzling variety is pointed up with appearances by the Ballet Folklorico de Mexico, Grand Ole Opry, Ice Capades and Don Fleenor's Hell Drivers.

Booked for the 2,800-seat theater are "Don Carlo" on April 6th, 8th and 11th; San Antonio Symphony concert with

pianist Hilde Comer on April 7; San Antonio Symphony with guest conductor Arthur Fiedler on April 13; and Los Ninos Cantores de Monterrey, the 20-voice choir from Father Alvarez' "Ciudad de los Ninos" in Monterrey, appearing April 14.

Ballet Folklorico de Mexico will be April 5-18, Texas Boys Choir April 19 and Isaac Stern Trio April 20. The John Gary Show will be seen April 29-May 4, and the great musical play "Man from La Mancha" May 22-June 1.

Jack Benny and the Baja Marimba Band team up on the same program June 3-8. Ferrante and Teicher are scheduled June 10-13 followed by Don Adams Comedy Hour June 24-29.

The Bayanihan Philippine Dancers will appear in the theater July 2-8, Phyllis Diller and the Osmond Brothers July 15-20, Jimmy Dean July 29-Aug. 3 and Wayne Newton Aug. 7-12. Bob Newhart is booked Aug. 19-24.

In the 10,000-seat arena, the Lutheran Hour is booked for April 21 in addition to the Pan American Variety Show, set April 6-28.

The Grand Ole Opry, featuring such stars as Roy Acuff, Sue Thompson and Homer and Jethro, will originate from the arena April 30-May 13 with three shows daily.

Bob Hope will have his show in the arena May 2-4 and the Water Follies of 1968 will be featured May 15-June 4. The Hell Drivers are booked June 5-15 and the Texas Youth Rodeo is set for June 24-30.

Miss Country Music U.S.A. contest will be held July 2 and the Mormon Tabernacle Choir will appear July 23-24. Tony Aguilar's Mexican Rodeo is set July 30-Aug. 5 to start a Western month schedule in the huge building.

Roy Rogers and Dale Evans will appear Aug. 12-25, Dale Robertson will bring his Western Show to HemisFair Aug. 27-Sept. 2 and the Ice Capades will take over Sept. 12-29.

Plans to form 150 local safety councils throughout the state to combat accident tolls will be outlined by the Texas Safety Association at its 29th annual conference meeting set for March 17-20 in Dallas.

### ASTROWORLD NOTES

ASTROWORLD's fascinating 65-foot mountain which will feature the Alpine Sleigh ride, is well under way in the southwest corner of the 57-acre multimillion dollar family amusement and entertainment center. Most of the steel framework is up and hundreds of joints are being welded. When completed, passengers will be whisked past a waterfall, through cool areas of the mountain into sub-freezing areas where actual snowflakes will blow--while the Abominable Snowman looks on.

\*\*\*\*\*

The mountain alone--to be known as Hofheinzberg-- will have refrigeration of more than 65,000 cubic feet per minute while the entire ASTROWORLD project will have about 400,000 cubic feet of cool air per minute in circulation. This latter figure is about equal to the air-cooling volume at the nearby Prudential building.

## Research Fund To Aid In Automobile Problems

The National Association of Independent Insurers, affiliated companies who write more than half the private passenger automobile insurance in the United States, today announced establishment of a Research Fund at the University of Texas in Austin to support research in the area of automobile insurance and related problems.

President Vestal Lemmon of the NAI said the fund will enable independent researchers at the university to expedite a project on which they are already embarked pertaining to the problems surrounding the compensation of auto accident claimants.

"We want to encourage independent, objective research and thinking in this whole area which is of such vital concern to the American consumer

and to our business," Lemmon said. "There are divergent views on the problems we face. We think the findings and observations of such researchers will be of benefit to the Federal government, to the state governments, to educators, to the insurance industry and to others considering the problems of compensating the auto accident claimants. Our companies feel that this is a most worthwhile project that the university has undertaken."

The NAI grant will enable the university to move forward immediately on final preparation and publication of a book to be entitled, "Man, Automobiles and Insurance." It is expected the research work will take another six or seven months.

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# KITCHEN KORNER

I believe my age is creeping up on me.

I helped a couple move over the weekend, and believe me, today I feel like I've been run over by a truck.

I feel like the next time anyone moves I'll see how many I can get to help and it will be much faster and not so hard on anyone.

It's funny how no one comes to visit when it's moving time isn't it?

And I vow that when I see any friend moving I will take them a good hot casserole or something— as not being able to cook has its disadvantages too.

It is getting to be the time of year when fresh strawberries will appear on the market and the frozen ones are less expensive when you buy them.

Here is a good recipe for an easy dessert, using one loaf of pound cake cut thin works well with this.

## STRAWBERRY ICE-BOX CAKE

- 1 qt. strawberries
- 1/2 c. butter
- 3 cups sifted powdered sugar
- 1 whole egg, beaten
- 3 eggs, separated
- 1 sponge cake
- 3 to 4 T. lemon juice
- Pinch salt

Wash and hull berries; select 12 to 18 perfect whole berries for garnishing, and mash rest to use in filling. Cream butter, add 1 cup of the sugar and blend well. Add whole beaten egg and about 1/2 cup sugar, and beat; then add yolk, some of the crushed berries, lemon juice and more sugar; repeat until all are used, beating thoroughly after each addition until mixture is smooth and fluffy. Add salt to egg whites and beat until stiff; fold into first mixture. Line bottom and sides of spring-form pan with slices of cake and pour in half of the filling; add another layer of cake slices and rest of filling. Top with more cake slices. Place in refrigerator overnight, or for at least 3 or 4 hours. To serve, remove sides of pan. Garnish with whole strawberries or strawberry halves and whipped cream, if desired. 10 servings.

Since pork is a good buy right now these pork chops are real good for a change.

## SPANISH PORK CHOPS

- 5 thick pork chops, 2 lbs.
- 1 T. fat
- 1 onion, sliced
- 2 c. canned tomatoes
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 T. flour
- 3 to 4 c. boiled rice

Brown chops slowly on both sides in the fat, then remove chops from pan. Now brown onions in same skillet, then add chops, tomatoes and seasonings. Cover and simmer 30 to 40 minutes. Remove meat and thicken the tomato mixture with the flour mixed to a smooth paste with 1/4 cup cold water; boil 2 to 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Place rice in center of platter, arrange chops around rice, and pour tomato sauce over all. 5 servings.

## CORN LORRAINE

Make 9-in. unbaked pie shell with high fluted edge. Rub the inside with 1 tsp. soft butter. Chill 1 hour.

- 1 lb. sliced bacon, fried crisp and thoroughly drained
- 1 T. bacon drippings
- 1 C. chopped onions
- 1 C. finely shredded Swiss cheese
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 No. 303 can (17 oz. size) cream style corn
- Fresh-ground whole pepper
- 2/3 C. (6 oz.) evaporated milk
- In 1 T. bacon drippings, gently fry onions till tender. Reserve 6 slices bacon for garnish; crumble rest and mix with onions. Spread in chilled crust. Top with 1/2 cup cheese. Blend beaten eggs with cream style corn, pepper to taste. Scald milk. Blend remaining 1/2 cup cheese into corn mixture; stir in scalded milk. Pour into shell. Bake 10 min. at 450 F. Reduce heat quickly to 325 F. bake 25 minutes more. Arrange reserved bacon on top during last 5 minutes of baking. Cool slightly; cut. Serves 6.

## BAKED EGG RAMEKINS

Bake at 325 deg. for 20 min. Makes 4 servings, 91 calories each

- 1/2 c. skim milk
- 4 eggs

Salt and pepper

1. Butter 4 small custard cups very lightly; spoon 2 T. of the skim milk into each.
2. Break each egg into a cup, then slide into custard cup; sprinkle with salt and pepper.
3. Bake in slow oven (325) 20 minutes, or until eggs are cooked as you like them. Serve in cups.

## CALORIE-TRIMMER'S FRENCH TOAST

Makes 4 servings, 296 calories each

- 4 eggs
- 1/2 c. skim milk
- Dash of salt
- 6 slices slightly dry white bread

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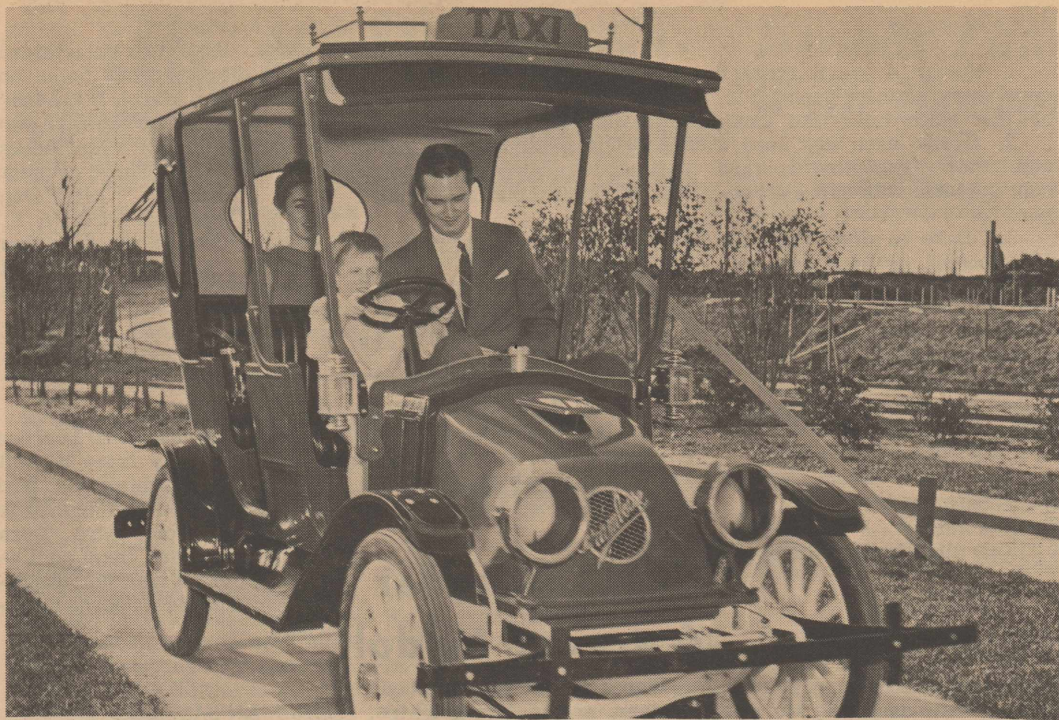

Mrs. Helen Richardson, president reports that the committee needs the support of interested persons.

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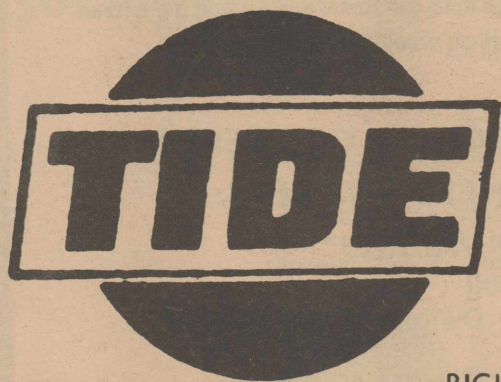
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## Veteran Book Now Available

The 1968 edition of "Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents" is now available from the Government Printing Office in Washington, D. C., Jack Coker Manager of the VA Regional Office, Waco, announced today.

Published by the Veterans Administration, the new booklet reflects new legislative changes including the Veteran's Pension and Readjustment Assistance Act of 1967. This Act:

- \* Gives Vietnam era veterans the same benefits available to other wartime veterans.

- \* Expands and increases a variety of benefits, including various types of educational assistance, for all qualified veterans who served after Jan. 31, 1955.

- \* Expands and increases certain benefits to older veterans and dependents.

In addition to explaining these new benefits, the 1968 edition of this annual VA publication reviews all existing benefits available to America's more than 26 million living veterans -- from the Spanish-American War to the Vietnam era--and to their dependents and survivors.

Today, these veterans and their families make up almost half of the population of the United States.

Also, the booklet gives the address and phone number of more than 170 VA installations scattered throughout the 50 states, Washington, D. C., Puerto Rico, the Canal Zone and the Philippine Islands.
