## Practical Socialism

The Socialist land theory is now being preaticed on the school lands of Oklahoma. The school board leases these lands under contract of a three years term the annual price paid per year will not exceed the an unt of taxes as paid by land owners adjoining. Troparties leasing these lands have the right to make an improvments they wish, these improvments become personal property and the owner thereof holds possesion until he is paid for them. These lands, once leased and improved, then farmers buy and sell the right of possession and convey their lease, improvements going with these. The parties who lease these lands have all the right of for these privileges than his neighbor farmer pays taxes on lands which he owns. This method is a clear saving of the investments in lands.—Farm and Stockman.

A better heading to the above would be pratical single taxism. It is encouraging to know that the Farmer and Stockmen can see that it is a "clear saving of the investment in land." The prevailing investment in land is the foudation of all monopoly, as everything of a matearial nature that men ever had, has or expects to get, comes of the application of labor to land, and the monopoly of land deprives the landless of the posibilty to employ himself, and hence to own himself. It is a natural opportunity as much as air and sunshine, and as such, of natural right belong to all, and to which all should have free equal access tax-more properly rent-is the only method to equaize the right of all, for the simple reason that all cannot get the best portions, to which one is entitled to as much as another, and by each paying the rental value each contributes equally for the benefits he derives. Now when Oklahoma abolishes all other taxes, and increases rent up to the an nual value of each tract she will have the sin gle tax, which will at once abolish all specu lation in land, and turn that capital to productive industries. Moreover it will give every body a home, give all an opportunity to employ themselves, without having to hunt up some body to hire them. When this is done monopolies will die of inanition, as well as being a clear saving, as the stockman put it, of the investment in lands.

## Railroad News.

Hou, D.B. Hill, of Clarudon, in the city vesterday, feels pretty sure that the railroad comming to Mangum, and the one coming from Weatherford O T, are both making for Amarillo. As to the former the Mangum Sum remarks;

Last Friday and Saturday engineer Worrell and his corps of surveyors set the grade stakes on their last survey for about three miles west from the North Fork to a point about three quartes of a mile south of Granite, Mountian Home, and about ten miles north-east of Mangun, and Monday, moved their camp to Elk creek, to complete the cross sectioning between

the river and Mountian View.

Ex-Congressman Jerry Simpson of the Anti-trust confeance said:






