

Extra Income Is Taxable

Income from all sources, unless specifically exempt by law, is subject to tax and should be reported on your 1967 Federal income tax return, according to Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas.

Such items as interest on savings accounts and U.S. Savings Bonds, tips, prizes and profits from hobbies and from the sale of property, are considered taxable income and must be reported.

The gross amount of dividends and other distributions must be listed on the return but the first \$100 of dividends received is not generally subject to tax.

All-risk insurance does not cover loss due to negligence or poor farming practices. But when nature causes low yields or poor quality that drops crop values below guaranteed levels, crop insurance makes up the difference in cash.

Early attempts by private companies to insure against crop disaster generally were unsuccessful because of complexities and extreme risk in guaranteeing crop production. As a result, there was increasing demand that the Government

Ruling was on a case brought by Midland Mayor Hank Avery to force Midland County Commissioners Court to reapportion. Dissenting opinion warned of "avalanche of reapportion-ment cases."

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has predicted the ruling will not disturb local elections already in progress this year, and indicated he feels the problems of unequal representation will be worked out by Texas subdivisions without multiple court suits.

Prior studies have demonstrated, however, that the vast bulk of county commissioners' precincts would be affected by the new ruling. To assume that all will voluntarily correct de-ficiencies pointed up by the high court appears to be expecting too much of local officials, many of whom will have jobs at stake.

Spanish Class For Children Offered At SPC

A Children's Workshop in Spanish will be offered at South Plains College this summer for children 6 to 15 years of age.

This is a three-weeks course and classes will be held one and one-half hours a day, five days a week.

The group will be divided into two classes, one class for the 6 to 10 years of age, and another class will be for children ages 11 to 15 years of age.

The classes are scheduled for June 17 through July 5 from 9 to 10:30 a. m. and 10:30 to 12 a. m. with Frank Gonzales, South Plains College Spanish instructor, conducting the course.

The student will learn to speak Spanish through the audio-lingual method. Basic sentences and dialogue conversations will be taught through repetition, imitation and roll playing.

The course will include instruction in rhymes, jingles, songs, games and dances. Subjects covered will include greetings, courtesy expressions, and dramatizations involving animals, members of the family, beverages, numbers, foods, clothing, weather, a date for the movies, etc.

Without conscious effort the student learns the language just as he learned to speak English, by hearing, repeating and speaking.

Audio-viual aids, recording, tapes and other instructional aids will be used in the presentation of the material.
