## **Texas Leads Nation** In Number Of Tornadoes

"Statistics from the United States Weather Bureau's State Climatologist indicate that Texas again led the nation in total tornadoes last year, with an all time record of 232," Layne said. The 1967 figure compares with the 77 twisters confirmed in the state during 1966.

In the evenings in summer time an outdoor grilled hamburger on a bun with the usual lettuce and tomatoes plus other fixings for it and Hash Brown Potatoes cooked on the barbecue grill is really an entire meal. 1/2 c. dairy sour cream 2 tsp. prepared horseradish 1 T. catsup 1/4 tsp. salt 2 T. finely chopped onion

Spoon approximately one and a half tablespoons sour cream mixture in center of 6 patties. Top with remaining 6 patties and seal edges. Set oven regulator for boiling. Place patties on rack in broiler pan so tops of patties are about three inches from heat. Broil five minutes. Turn and broil an additional five minutes. Serve on toasted

You can't change the price has a large amount of bone at a but you can receive more for your money if you make wise choices.

With careful planning and shopping you can stretch your food dollar. Resolve to keep alert to what your market is featuring by watching food ads. Plan your menus to include as many "specials" as possible, suggests the Texas A&M University specialist.

Try to remember the regular prices so you'll know if the special is really a good value. Buy good values in quantity if you can use them and if storage space allows.

Make a shopping list, and remember to take it with you. This helps cut down on impulse buying, says Mrs. Clyatt.

Take the time to shop around in your favorite store. Every week there are new and different food items from which you can choose. Take some just window shopping time to

look around for them.

## **Velvet Finishes Aid Performance**

Finishes being applied to conventional velvets add performance characteristics such as stain and spot resistance, crush resistance and water repellency, according to Graham Hard, Extension clothing spe-

Velvets are treated to add new surface interest. Chemically quilted velvets take on an unusual textured interest, says the Texas A&M University speialist. They are bonded to polyester ninon.

Velvets may be made of silk, wool, mohair, rayon acetate or nylon, with plain, twill or satin weave background.

Basic construction dictates performance. Dr. Ha e advises consumers to examine the background fabric. A twill weave, recognized by the diagonal lines, is more serviceable than a plain weave.

Food prices are like the not just the price per unit. The item is often misleading if you do not check the number of servings, according to Mrs. Clyatt. The cost per serving is the true measure of cost.

For example, meat which

lower price per pound will often cost more per serving than boneless meat that sells for a higher price per pound.

When selecting convenience foods, consider time and cost. Some cost the same or slightly more while some cost less than those with no convenience built in, she adds.

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



Since you can't tell if a food is safe to eat, extra precautions are necessary. Foods most vulnerable to poisoning are potato salad, egg products, fish, ground beef, poultry, pork products, sauces, dairy products and pastries, especially custard and cream pies.




