and the second You Have To Care!

The following is the valedictory speech given by David D. Harris at commencement exercises Friday evening:

Members of the Board of Education, Administration, Faculty, Parents and Friends:

With all the developments and demands of this age it is only natural to suppose that the greatest challenge of today is the need for more and better education. One score and two years ago I was underestimating this importance. Certainly this need cannot be underestimated. Our very existence as a nation may very well depend on our ability to equal or surpass the educational advancements of the other nations of the world. But as great as this is, it is not the greatest challenge of our day.

The late Dr. Thomas Dooley, who gained world acclaim because of his unselfish sacrifices to relieve suffering and pain in the outer reaches of the world wrote as follows to a young doctor, challenging him to spend his life in service. I quote, "Dedicate some of your life to others. Your dedication will not be a sacrifice. It will be a rewarding experience, because it is intense effort applied toward a meaningful end,"

In these words of Dr. Dooley is cradled the great challenge of our generation - a call to unselfish service to others. You often hear, "If I don't look after my own interests no one else will." The sad fact is that this statement is probably true. But self preservation should never exclude the neighborly act of extending a helping hand to anyone in need.

Today's greatest challenge calls for personal involvement in helping other people. To be of upmost value this assistance must be given without reservation and without thought of receiving compensation. The best form of help is that which does not rob the individual of his self respect but makes it possible for him to help himself. Under no circumstance should good turn carry with it a suggestion, implied or otherwise, that the receiver is indebted or obligated to the donor.

Wealthy people often give large sums of money to charitable causes but fail to realize any satisfaction or enjoyment from having given. This is because they have experienced no personal involvement with those whom the contribution was intended to help.

The greatest satisfaction that can come in life comes from dedicated service to others on a person to person basis. There are many avenues in our society through which the individual can channel his services. The main thing is the matter of personal dedication and unselfish and useful service. If the dedication is there the method or means of expressing it will take care of itself.

Now I would like to include a little patriotism from a poem I read the other day. This is a poem describing the feelings of our men in Vietnam. Spec. 4 Danny S. Young who was caught in Viet Cong crossfire and killed while on patrol sums up the message as follows, and I quote,

"He had the guts to fight and die.

He paid the price, what did he buy? He bought his life by giving his, Who gives a damn, what a soldier gives? You "'peace boys'' bent from your easy chair, But you don't know what its like over here You burn your draft card and march at dawn, Plant your flag on the White House lawn. Use your drugs and have your fun, And then you refuse to use a gun. There's nothing else for you to do, Yet I'm supposed to die for you. I'll hate you till the day I die You made me hear my buddy cry, I saw his arm a bloody shred,

I heard them say, "This one's Dead," " This is an angry poem wrote by a young man who had never expressed his feelings to anyone. His parents said that he never acted like he was bitter but he sent the poem to them approximately five months before his death.

He describes how most of the men in Vietnam feel. It is very touching and gets the idea across. Maybe somebody ought to wake up and start caring just a little bit more. Of the twenty-two seniors of this '68 graduating class,

all of us will go our separate ways in the world. What we make out of our lives depends greatly on what America means to us. We take America for granted. None of us will ever be able to pay our debt to America.

I would like to close with these few words of Dr. Roe Bartle, mayor of Kansas City, Missouri, who in my opinion is the most patriotic person in America today and I quote, "There will always be an America and America will always be free if America means as much to you as America means

LCC Slates **Summer Sessions**

Lubbock Christian College has announced that its first summer session will begin June 3 and continue through July 12. The second session will be from July 15 to August 22. Students can get as many as 16 semester hours in the two sessions.

An important addition to Lubbock Christian's program is the "Directed Studies Program" for those students who may expect difficulty in moving directly into the regular academic program.

It is the experience of colleges that most of those who graduate in the lower 1/4 of their high school classes do not succeed in college academic work without additional instruction. Because of this experience and through the desire to offer every high school graduate an opportunity to attend college as a part of its "open door" pol-icy, LCC has started the "Directed Studies Program,"

Those selected for this program are students who have scored in the lower 1/4 on the ACT entrance exam or are in the lower 1/4 of their high school graduating class. Direc-ted studies in English, math, and general science along with reading improvement and study skills, Bible and PE activity make up the program which each student assigned to it must complete in part or in whole as designated by the college.

The student who qualifies for the program is strongly urged to enter LCC in the summer session. He will take English, reading and PE in the first session and math and general science will fill the second session.

After completing this program, the student's record will be carefully evaluated and record will be made that he has completed this and it will be recommended as to whether he consider other types of edu-cational pursuits. Each student's program will be specifically planned for him and his needs.

Special events for the summer will include the 8th An-nual Youth Lectureship, June 2-6, and the 9th Annual Music Camp, August 4-16.


