Castor Farmers Issued Alert

Announcement has been made by John Anderson of Baker Castor Oil in Plainview that false chinch bugs are working in area fields of castor beans.

Growers are urged to be on the alert for the possibility of sufficient invasion to require spraying.

Anderson cautioned that if the population of the false chinch bugs builds up to the extent of swarming on the seed spikes, growers should check with their county agent, entomologist or with the Baker company.

The infestation is widespread, Anderson stated that Jim Standifer of Sun-Vue Fertilizer in Hart reports that some fields in the Hart area are nearing the population where spraying would be warranted.

"His headquarters stated a debate had been set between us. My opponent has not contacted me about any such debate and I doubt that much could be accomplished by debate.

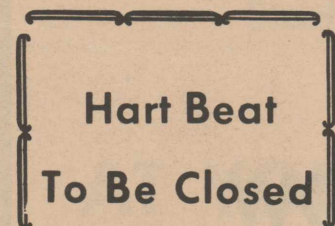
"However, I will be delighted to meet with any or-

KITCHEN KORNER

Due to the vacation coming up this next week we are having to get enough news for two papers in two days. If you think that is easy - you would be surprised! It is not.

I hope you all have a very nice and safe fourth of July. I am sure there will be a lot of picnics. So remember to get plenty of fixings, just in case you have some unexpected company drop by.

Here are a couple of recipes for desserts to have ready ahead of time. They were given to me by a very nice friend. I hope you enjoy them.

ORANGE CAKE MUFFINS

- 1 c. sugar
- 1/2 c. shortening
- 2 eggs
- 2 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 3/4 c. milk

- 2 c. flour
- grated orange rind
- 1/4 tsp. salt

Creamsugar and shortening, add egg and cream more. Add milk and flour a little at a time add baking powder and orange rind and salt. Bake in muffin pans 350 deg. until done. You can sprinkle coconut or chips or nuts on top.

CHILLED CHERRY PIE

- Crust:
- 1 1/2 c. flour sifted
 - 1 1/2 sticks oleo, melted
 - 3 T. sugar
 - 3/4 c. finely chopped pecans

Press with your hand to spread for bottom crust in a 13 x 9 inch or two pie plates, bake 350 degrees until brown or 20 minutes. Then cool.

Filling:

2 pkg. dream whip beat and set aside. Whip 1-8 oz. package cream cheese. Mix with 1 1/2 cups powdered sugar, fold in dream whip. Pour over cooled crust. And on top pour pie cherries - the thickened kind - can use strawberries, but cherries stay fresh longer - Chill, cut in squares or pie slice. Serve.

Recipe Of The Week

Our recipe of the week is submitted by Mrs. F. A. Cannon.

The Cannons have lived in Hart since April 1966 when they moved here from Lubbock. He is a retired carpenter.

TABLE TALK CAKE

- 1 1/2 c. sugar
- 1 c. pastry flour
- 8 egg yolks
- 8 egg whites
- 1/2 c. water
- 1 tsp. cream of tartar
- 1 tsp. orange flavoring
- 1/4 tsp. salt

Sift flour 6 times, pour sugar into stew pan and add water; cook until a very soft thread will form as the syrup drips from spoon. (Do not cook too much) 3 minutes actually. Pour over the egg yolks which have been beaten with rotary beater or mixer until thick and lemon colored; beat the syrup into the yolks set aside to cool. While beating egg whites use a wire whip, add salt, as soon as egg whites are foamy add cream of tartar.

Beat until egg whites are stiff enough to stack up and stand.

Then stir flour into yolk mixture. Now combine the two mixtures, fold in yolks and flour into whites, add flavoring. Pour in ungreased angel pan. Bake 60 minutes in moderate oven (340). Turn upon board until cool, slip knife around and remove from pan.

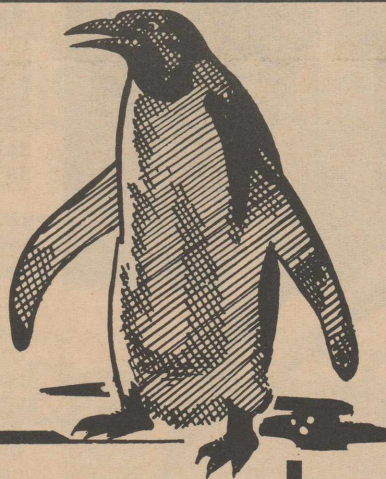

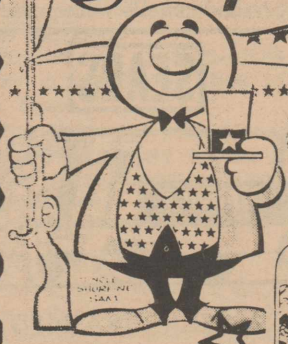
