

First Bale Of Cotton Brought In By Murray

Hart area's first bale of cotton was ginned by Hart Producers Co-Op Gin Friday, Oct. 4.

J. D. Murray, who farms four miles north and one mile east of Hart, brought in 2200 pounds of seed cotton, from which the 550 pound bale was ginned.

The cotton weighed in at the Co-Op Gin about 5 p. m. Friday, produced 1000 pounds of seed.

Ike Bennett, manager of the gin, said the cotton was Gregg variety, planted about May 10 and was from four acres of land. It had received slight hail once. Seven hired hands pulled the bale.

For a bonus, Murray re-ceived \$60 a ton for the seed, received the ginning and wrapping free and the gin manager said the hired hands were paid by the gin.
