A fast U. S. cargo ship will be designated the "1968 SANTA CLAUS SPECIAL," sailing from Oakland, Calif. next month with Christmas parcels.

The frog squirmed, only in vain. Again the Aggie shouted, "Jump", without results. So the Aggie turned, and wrote in his lab book:



Dyer climaxed the drive as he crossed the goal line to equalize the score and then ran the extras to put Hart in the lead 8-6.


The half-time ended with both teams battling for the ball hoping to score before time ran out.

Hart Shorthorns will battle Friona Thursday afternoon, Oct. 31 at 4:30 p. m. in Longhorn Stadium.


