Seaman Roger R. Jacks of Irving, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Jacks of Hart, was a crewman aboard the Coast Guard buoy tender White Alder which sank on the Mississippi River Dec. 7.

Jacks' body was recovered Saturday from the boat's pilothouse and the first to be recovered. The body of the ship's skipper was brought up Sunday.

The White Alder sank in 83 feet of water after colliding with the 455-foot freighter Helena on a bend of the Mississippi near White Castle, La.

Fifteen other bodies were believed still aboard the hulk. It lies in an area of strong and tricky currents that have made diving operations diffi-


