Eight Accidents Investigated **During Month**

Texas Highway The Patrol investigated 8 accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of February, accord-ing to Sergeant ' Vernom Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in four persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$7,095.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first two months of 1969 shows a total of 13 accidents resulting in no persons killed, four persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$13,-425.00.






