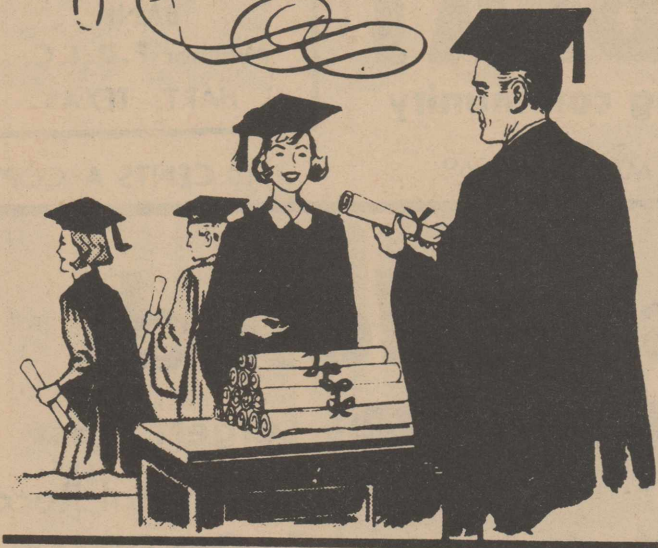

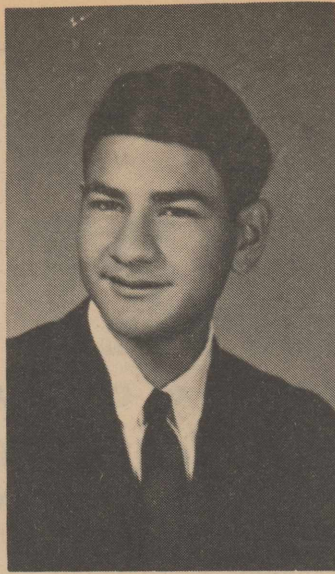

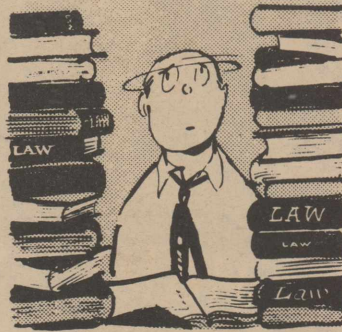
THE FAMILY LAWYER

Is Ignorance an Excuse?

It takes more than 100 volumes, each one huge, to describe what the American law is today. Viewing this mass of material, you may well quaver at the thought that every person is presumed to know the law—that ignorance of the law is no excuse.

Is that true? Are you really supposed to know everything in those books?

No—not in any absolute sense. For one thing, you cannot fairly be expected to know about laws that are totally unrelated to your own activities. A New York pedestrian, crossing Broadway, need not



be aware of the jaywalking rules in Pasadena.

Furthermore, your ignorance of the law may be an excuse if you are accused of a crime that requires a specific guilty intent. Consider this case:

A landlady, noticing ink stains on the rug in a boarder's room, took possession of his radio. She planned to hold it until he paid for the damage to the rug. But he promptly retaliated by having her arrested on a charge of theft.

In court, the landlady pleaded ignorance of the law, saying she had honestly thought she had a right to take the radio. And the court decided she could not be convicted of theft, because she lacked the specific guilty intent called for in that crime.

Still, the rule that ignorance is no excuse does apply in the vast majority of cases. Our whole system of criminal justice would fall apart if the excuse of ignorance—so easy to claim, so hard to disprove—were to be generally accepted.

For example, imagine the chaos if every motorist who had been caught speeding could escape punishment by saying:

"I did go fast. Your Honor, but I didn't realize that speeding was against the law."

True, the ignorance rule may be hard on the occasional individual who really did not know he was breaking the law. There is some harshness in punishing a person who, as one judge put it, "stumbles over an edict in the dark."

But for the sake of practical law enforcement, some unfairness cannot be avoided. Said Oliver Wendell Holmes:

"Justice to the individual is outweighed by larger interests on the other side of the scales."

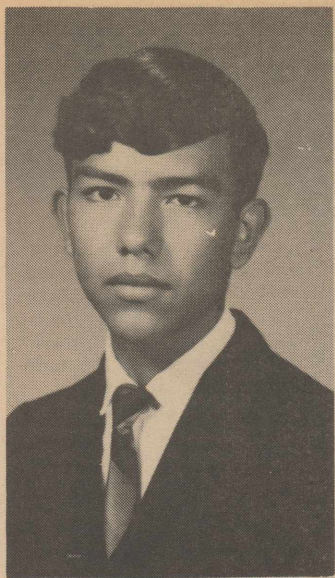

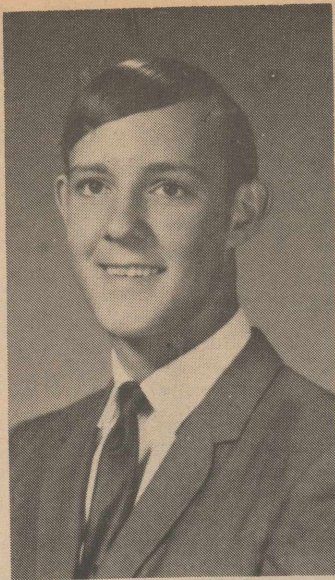

Jimmy Allensworth, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Allensworth was born June 3, 1951.

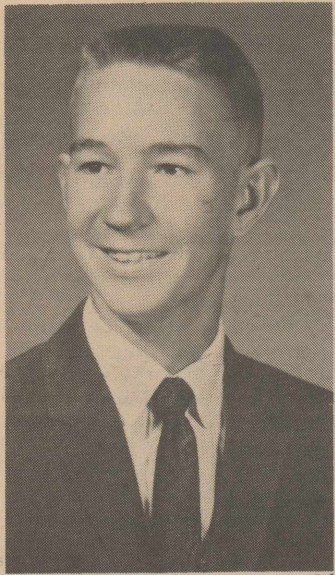

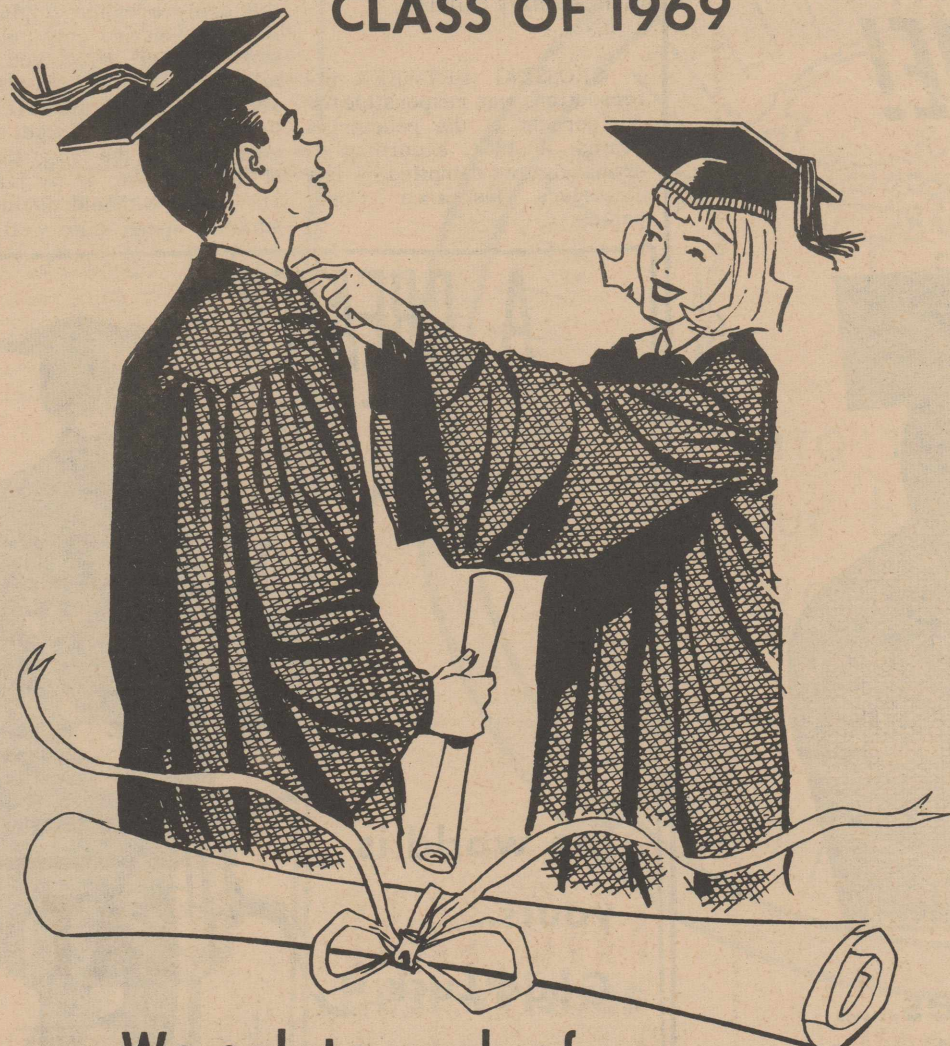

During her years at Hart High School, she has been a member of the pep squad four years, the Future Teachers of America two years and the Future Homemakers of America four years.

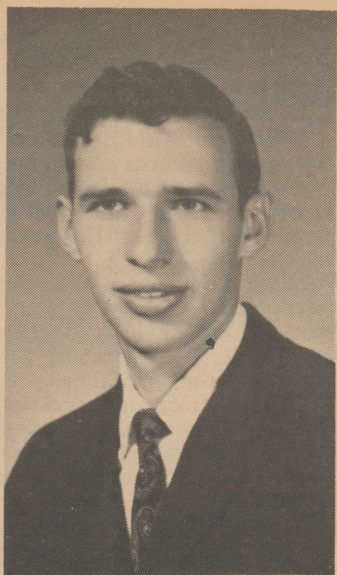

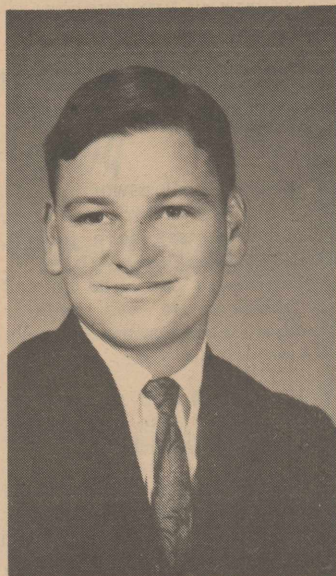

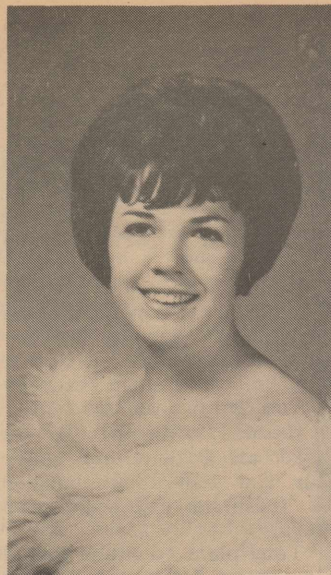

Her hobbies include swimming, reading, basketball and laughing and having a good time.

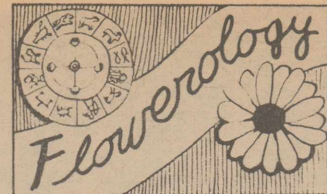

Mrs. W. A. Hawkins Sr. made the presentation.

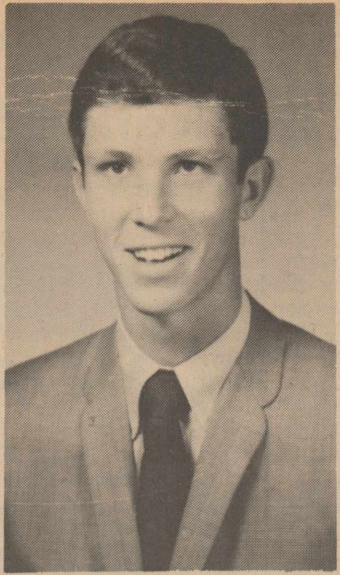
The presentation was made in recognition of a twenty-five dollar gift to Missions in Mrs. Swindle's name by the WSCS.

Mark Martin To Graduate Texas A & M

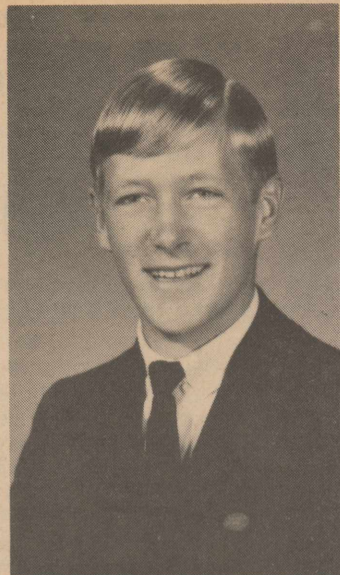

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR3)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

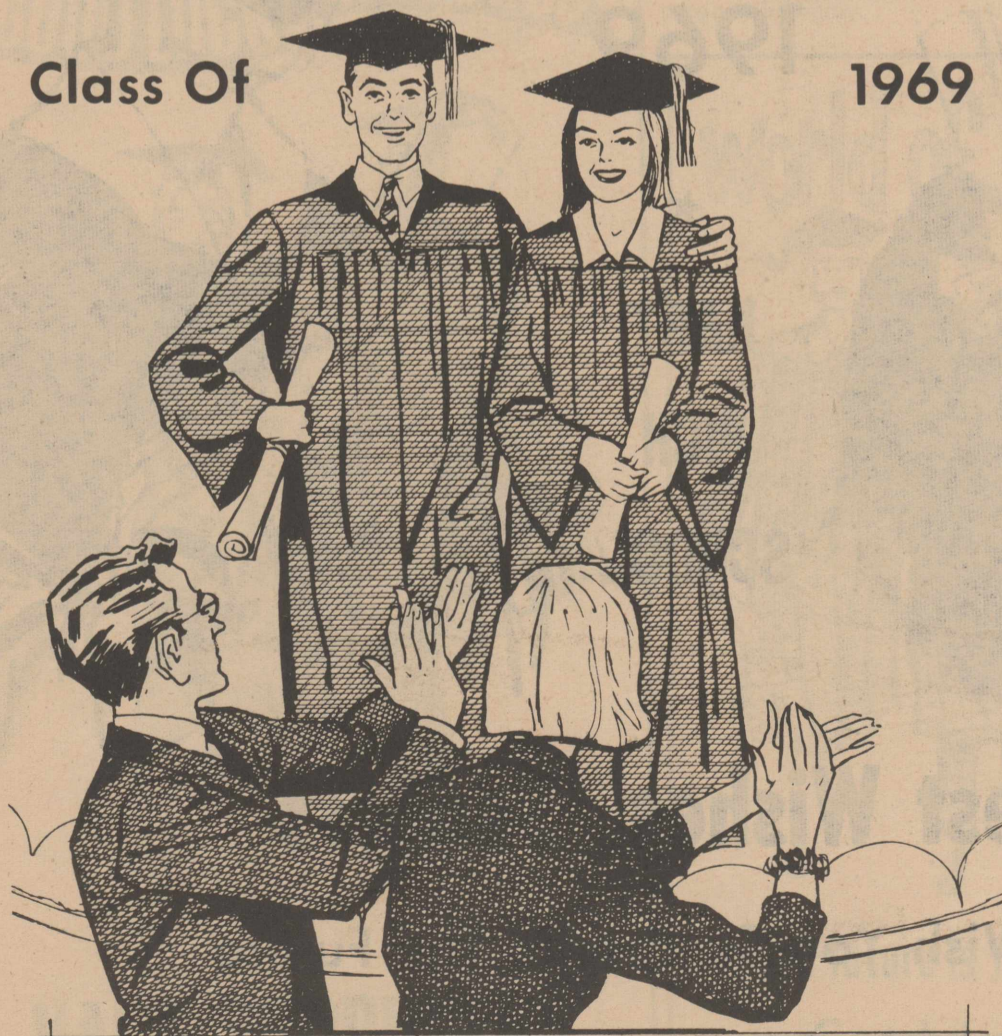
understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

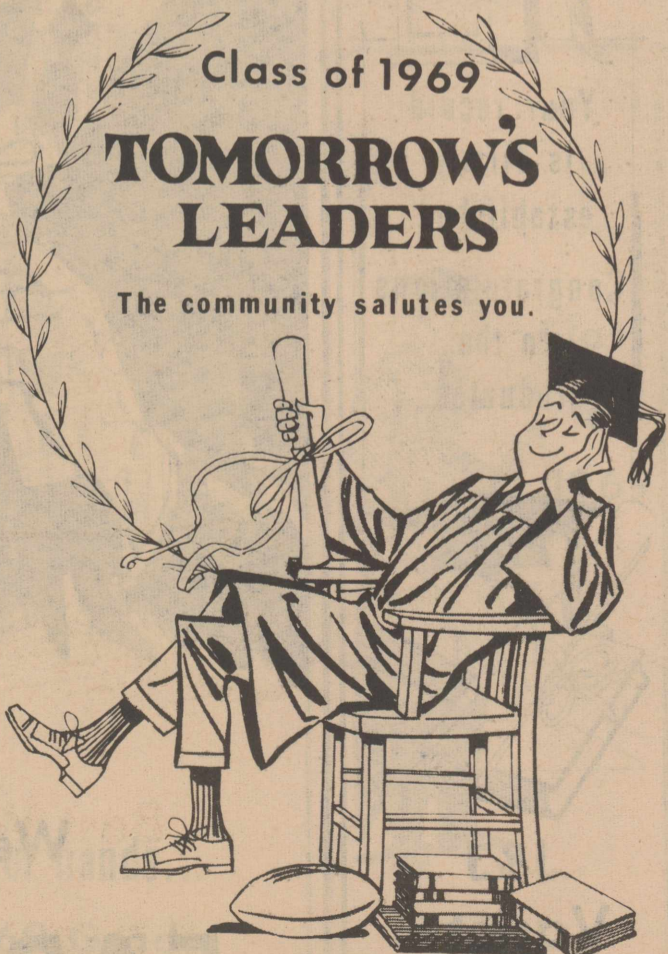

According To IRS

One of the popular questions at Internal Revenue Service this year has been "Who must file an estimate?" The tax instructions spell out the rules quite clearly. If you don't have tax withheld from your salary you are usually liable for filing an estimate, since this is the way Congress set up the pay-as-you-go system for you. If your withholding is not enough to pay all the tax you owe then you may need to file an estimate. If you are not going to owe more than \$40, you don't have to file an estimate in any case. Since a large part of our Nation's taxpayers do have a salary or wages and do pay withholding, they simply drop exemptions by changing their Form W-4, or request their employer to withhold additional amounts to assure that they have paid enough through withholding to cover their tax bill for the year.

Within a few weeks thousands of young Texans will trade their classroom chores for a three month turn in the world of work. Perhaps in our affluent society the students are earning money for those extras or for money to buy that car. Contrary to the practice followed by quite a few employers, students or any employees who work for a short period are subject to the same withholding, social security and other employment taxes for both the employee and the employer, that apply to regular employees. Even if you are only going to work a short time, you must take your employer your social security number and fill out a Form W-4. Don't forget to get your W-2 on the job at the end of the summer, or by January 31. Taxes withheld during the summer spend quite well during the spring term of school. However there is one little chore -- you must file a tax return for the government to know that you are due a refund of part or all of your tax withheld during the summer.

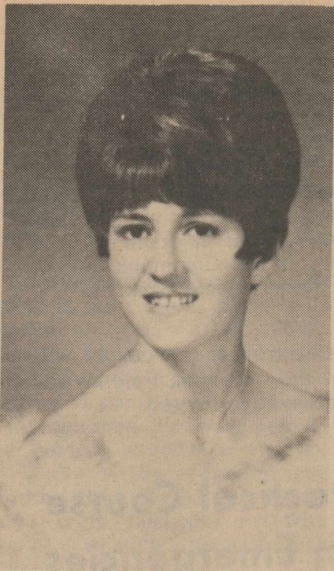

Insurance Statistics Booklet Lists Causes Of Accidents

Perhaps the oldest joke in 20th-century America is the woman driver put-on, according to The Travelers Insurance Companies annual booklet on highway accident statistics.

Of the 68,000 drivers involved in fatal accidents in 1968, only 10,000 were women.

However, a Travelers spokesman notes that "the big gun in this battle of the sexes is the canard that women are emotionally incapable of handling a car in an emergency. Or that an ignorance of anything mechanical makes it impossible for them to understand how to drive safely.

"Some women DO get rattled easily," the spokesman concedes. "Some women ARE bewildered by nuts and bolts, And precisely the same can be

Lightning Can Strike Twice

If you've heard the old wives tale that lightning doesn't strike in the same place twice, the Texas State Department of Health urges you to forget it.

Not only can lightning strike in the same place twice, it can strike the same place many times. To believe otherwise could cost you your life.

A case in point is the Empire State Building. One summer it was struck 15 times in 15 minutes.

Thunderstorms are common in Texas now, associated with spring's changing weather. Every clap of thunder is a lightning bolt.

A single bolt from one thunderstorm is sufficient to cause injury, death or property damage.

Most vulnerable are persons who live, work and play in rural or open areas. Campers, golfers and swimmers are particularly vulnerable since lightning will usually strike the highest object in an open area. Just recently two fishermen were killed in North Texas when caught on a lake by a sudden storm and struck by lightning.

Many people will run under a tree when caught in a storm, exposing themselves to a great danger, since lightning often strikes lone trees. The bolt travels down the moist interior of the tree, building up extreme heat and pressure which causes the tree to literally explode. As the electrical charge travels downward, small streamers may depart from the main bolt, jumping to nearby persons or objects. Many golfers and others are killed in this manner.

And, persons standing in a large open area where there are no tall objects are equally vulnerable to a lightning strike. Farmers working in fields or riding a tractor often are struck.

If a thunderstorm develops while you are out in the open, head for a building and stay inside until the storm is over. If you are boating or swimming, leave the water and get to a building. If there is no building available head for a grove of trees but avoid the tallest tree or lone trees. In an open area, lie down until the storm passes.

An automobile with a steel body is considered a safe place since the steel shell will lead the charge of electricity to the wheels, from where it will jump to the ground. But a convertible doesn't afford protection.

Statistics in the booklet prove many reasons why cars crash: speed too fast for conditions; driving on the wrong side of the road; did not have the right of way; cutting into a line of traffic; passing on curve or hill; passing on wrong side; failure to signal and improper signaling; reckless driving, etc. Sex of the driver is not a proven reason.

"The fact is," the spokesman said, "there are many more male drivers who drive many more miles than the average female. Until we have figures indicating the number of miles driven by male vs. female, the woman-driver joke will remain no more than a put-on."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature.

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

"(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

"(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

"(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

LCC Designated ACT Test Site

Lubbock Christian College has been designated as a test center for the American College Test on Saturday morning, July 19. Mr. Robert Hawkins, Test Center Supervisor said "high school students who want to take the test on July 19 must acquire a Test Registration Form and mail it, along with their \$6.00 fee, by Monday June 16."

The necessary registration form may be acquired from Mr. Hawkins at Lubbock Christian College or by writing to Dr. Vernon L. Odom at 1626 50th Street, Lubbock, 79412.

Nearly one million students will write the ACT test at 2,100 test centers around the world this year. Ninety-nine of the colleges and universities in Texas participate in the ACT program. Some colleges use the test results as admissions instruments; others use them primarily as counseling tools. The test battery consists of subtests in English usage, math usage, social science reading and natural science reading. A unique feature of the ACT assessment is the Students Profile Section by which students describe some of their non-academic potentials and other personal data for the use of college admissions officers and high school counselors.

Each student's assessment is sent to the three colleges of his choice. Currently over 1,500 American colleges utilize the data provided by the American College Testing Program.

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

"(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

Practical Course
On Emergencies
Set At Amarillo

The first practical course on emergency care and transportation of the sick and injured to be held in the Northwest Texas Area is scheduled May 21, 22, and 23, 1969, in the auditorium of the Psychiatric Pavilion of the Northwest Texas Hospital.

Invited to attend the three-day course of lectures and demonstrations are ambulance attendants, policemen, firemen, safety engineers, rescue squads, nurses, public health, civil defense, and other officials or private citizens dealing with the handling of persons who are sick or injured due to accidents.

This course is given free of charge and is expected to attract attendance from a seventy-five mile area around Amarillo. It is given by the Texas State Department of Health and the Potter-Randall County Medical Society.

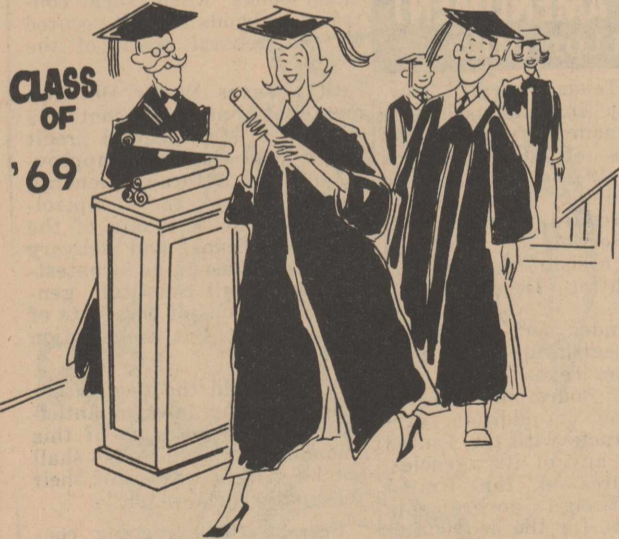
The death rate from accidental injuries can be reduced by improved training of emergency personnel according to Dr. Henry E. Martinez, a local Amarillo doctor who is acting as Program Chairman for the training school. A fast ride to the hospital by ambulance or other means has practically never saved a life. There is often only a few minutes to reestablish heart action and breathing, time too short for even a 90 mile-an-hour trip to the emergency room of the hospital. What is really needed are people well trained in emergency care to prepare the injured for transport. This means being able to make a quick survey, to determine medical priority, and to take the necessary life-saving measures.

To furnish this instruction, doctors and nurses from the Northwest Texas Area and members of local police and fire organizations and others will speak and demonstrate on a wide range of subjects, including resuscitation, cardiac massage, splinting of fractures, burns, and other medical emergencies. Aid to snake and spider bite victims, smoke and gas hazards, handling of emotionally disturbed patients, emergency childbirth, and traffic control at the accident scene will be covered.
