Connie Mack English Receives Second Award From Company

Connie Mack English of Plainview, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert English, recently received a Distinguished Franchise Operator Award from the Jewel Tea Company. It was his second DFO award in three years.

Presentation of the award and other recognitions were made at the Oklahoma District Meeting held in Oklahoma City June 21.

The Distinguished Franchise Operator Award, the highest award granted by the company, was made in recognition of English's outstanding service as a route operator.

With the award, English received a trophy and a diamond-studded watch for his wife, Belle.

English also received congratulatory recognition in 11 areas of his work. He received a plaque and tie tac in recognition of sales excellence, having kept his sales at \$1000 plus for 52 consecutive weeks. Only four of the 45 operators

Panhandle South Plains Fair Offers \$37,000 In Prizes

Approximately 5,000 copies of a handsome new catalog listing a record \$37,235 in premiums is being distributed for the 1969 Panhandle South Plains Fair.

The premiums, boosted some \$2,652 over last year, includes some \$3,900 for three horse shows.

An open horse show is being added along with the Quarter Horse and Appaloosa shows on the last three days of the exposition, slated Sept. 22-27.

Red and White dairy cattle--once the black sheep of the Holstein breeders and now one of the most popular strains--replaces Guernsey cattle in the livestock judging events, according to the catalog listings.

The center layout highlights the country and western variety spectacular that will be presented in Fair Park Coliseum during the weeklong run.

Marty Robbins, Charley Pride and Buck Owens and his Buckaroos will be presented in two-day runs while Roy Clark and other attractions will be on stage for all six days.

Robbins will appear here on Sept. 22-23, Pride will headline the middle two days and Owens will be featured on Sept. 26-27. Clark, Gentle Ben of TV fame, Peggy Ann Nielsen, the Congregation, and comedian Mike Caldwell will appear at all 12 performances.

Tickets are priced at \$2, \$3 and \$4 for evening performances and all persons will be admitted for one-half price at daily matinees. Improved seating arrangements also are planned.

The catalog cover is a handsome color shot of the Gene Ledel Carnival, which will once again return to the Lubbock midway.

Included for the first time are messages of welcome from Gov. Preston Smith, Mayor W. D. (Dub) Rogers, Jr., and John E. Vickers, president of the fair association board of directors.

Many new improvements to Fair Park, including expanded parking facilities, rest areas and new entrance, are being considered.

The Panhandle South Plains Fair is one of the top expositions in the world. Of about 3,800 fairs in the United States and Canada, only 48 have large attendance, and most of those are state fairs or other special expositions which run eight to 16 days. The Lubbock event runs only six days.

Attendance has been increasing steadily, and hit an all-time peak of 275,028 last year.

The rising patronage has been maintained partially because admission fees rank among the lowest in the nation and have been at the bottom for some time.

"Family fun for everyone" once again will be the theme of the 1969 exposition, and free attractions are being considered as part of this year's fare.

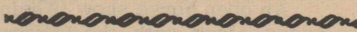

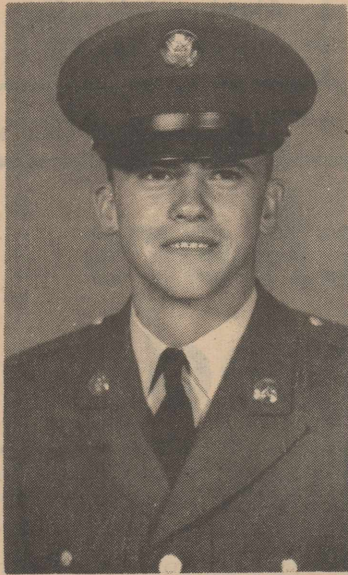

He also completed his high school credits and 125 hours in helicopter flying.

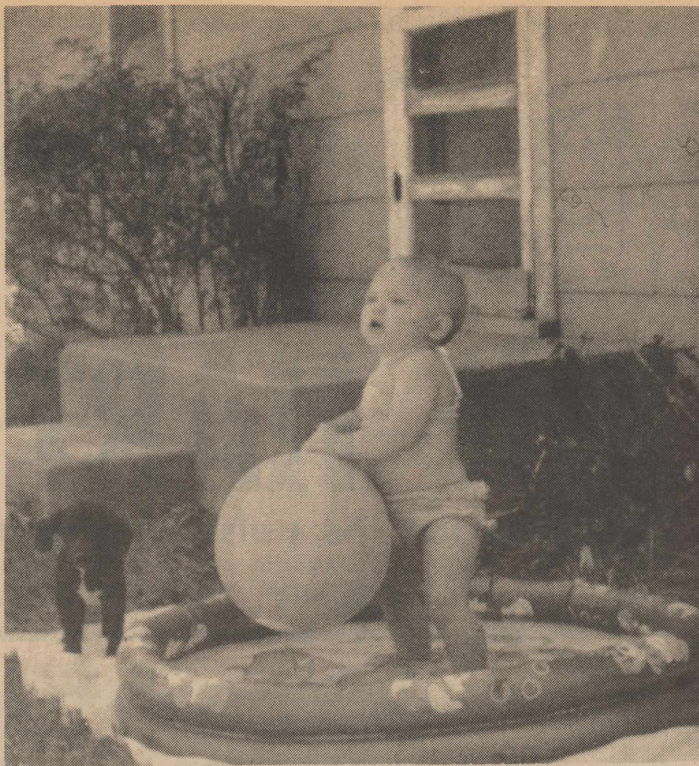
Davis is the son of Mrs. Jack Guthrie of Sunray. He is being assigned duty in Vietnam.

Financial Facts

By Willis A. Hawkins, Jr.

The "half dollar explosion" took place from 1793 to 1833.

The total silver coinage of that period amounted to \$36.3 million. Of that aggregate, \$33 million or 90.9 percent consisted of half dollars. Four percent of the amount was in silver dollars. The remaining 5.1 percent took in the smaller coins.

Half dollars predominated because they were cheaper to coin.

In those days, you could bring silver bullion to the Mint. By paying a brassage charge, you could walk away with half dollars.

Thus with half dollars, you didn't have to wait. Should you want smaller denominations, the delay was great. So people with silver bullion went for half dollars.

Strange that half dollars should have so predominated. Today,

they are very scarce.

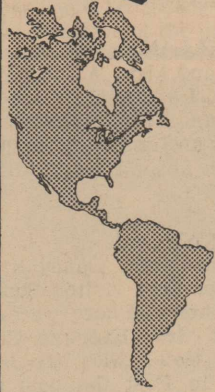
