



National Wheat Allotment Cut, Individual Farmers Cut Same

The 1970 national wheat acreage allotment is cut 12 per cent. Individual farm allotments will be cut about the same. The minimum diversion will

be 30.3 per cent of the 1970 farm wheat allotment, with no payment on this acreage. This acreage has already been taken off the 1970 farm wheat allotment. A producer may divert an additional 50 per cent of the 1970 wheat allotment for payment, about 63 cents per bushel.

Wheat certificates will be paid on 48 per cent of the projected production on the 1970

Wheat permitted - 100,0 acres; Wheat certificates acres - 48,0 acres, (100 acres x 48%); Wheat certificate payment rate -\$45.60, (30 bu x \$1,52); and Wheat certificate payment -\$2188,80, (48,0 acres x \$45.60).

No. 2 Same farm diverting additional 50 per cent: Minimum diversion - 30.3 acres, (100 acres x 30.3%); Additional diversion - 50.0 acres, (100 acres x 50%); Total diverted acres - 80.3 acres; and Wheat permitted - 50.0 acres, (100 acres - 50.0 acres, additional

diversion); Diversion payment – \$945.00, (63¢ x 30 bu. – \$18.90 x 50.0 acres); Certificate payment – \$2188.80, (48.0 acres x \$45.60). Total Payment \$3133.80

DIVERTED ACRES - soybeans on diverted acres must be destroyed and this office notified by Sept. 30, 1969. It is the farmer's responsibility to keep weeds from infesting diverted acres. Diverted acreage may not be grazed until Oct, 15, 1969.

farm wheat allotment. For 1969, certificates are being paid on 43 per cent of the projected production at \$1.52 per bushel.

The option under which a producer can substitute the planting of wheat for feed grains or feed grains for wheat in any combination will be available. Whether barley will be included in the feed grain program in 1970 will be determined and announced later.

Payments will be subject to any limitation that might be required by Congress in the Department of Agriculture appropriations.

EXAMPLES:

No. 1 Minimum Diversion – 1970 Wheat allotment, 100 acres; 1970 wheat yield, 30 bushels. Minimum Diversion – 30.3 acres, (100 acres x 30.3%);

Pioneer Sorghum Company will host an Open House, Wed-nesday, Sept. 3, at its Plainview seed plant and research nursery. Everyone interested in hybrid corn and hybrid grain sorghum development and production is cordially invited.

The open house will be from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m. Wednesday and will feature guided tours of Pioneer's seed plant and research plots. Barbecue lunch will be served from 11:30 a. m. tolp.m.

Besides seeing modern seed plant operation, visitors will have a chance to look at some interesting experimental hybrids--corn and millet as well as grain sorghum.

Several crop management studies will also be available for observation: planting rates and dates; row width planting; herbicide applications; and pasture sorghum regrowth.


