Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Speaker Gus
Mutscher must accept the blame, for the
sponsibility for running the Senate with full responsibility for forcing through the Senate the bill to place food under the sales tax. He has too long escaped the responsibility for running the Senate with an iron hand, and that bill was just one more example of his tactics. As the attached article points out, he pays lip service to open meetings but acts otherwise. In reality, the tax and appropriations conference committees consist of Barnes and Speaker Mutscher. Their bull-headedness is causing most of the problem. Their conference committee

members unfortunately are go-along boys.

The news media, for reasons known only to themselves, have been overly kind to Barnes in letting him escape the responsibility for excessive spending programs. Perhaps Barnes is held in awe by many because he is the hand-picked heir apparent of the LBJ-Connally machine, For too long Barnes has "ridden" with both the lobbyists and the liberals. The liberals have helped pass all his spending programs but the lobbyists will not go along with him now in paying the tab.

This article for the first time to my knowledge tells what actually has been happening in the Legislature in both the Regular and Special Sessions, I thought you'd be interested in it.

The legislative leadership deserves whatever kicking around comes its way over

the child of darkness called a tax bill.

This is not to judge the bill on its merits or lack thereof - for certainly the big food tax and little gas tax have been indicted venomously already.

But what else could be expected from the shuttered rooms where a handful of men, brazen with power and seniority, gave birth to the thing - with only a tight clique of lobbyists for midwives,

The whole story of the tax bill has been one of the leadership making mockery of the idea of doing the public's business in

There are honest and logical and legitimate reasons for working out knotty problems in private, without the hot winds of pressure blowing over the shoulder. But if that be true and if that be the decision. then it should be honestly announced as the

From the secret sessions of the conference committee to the final, ludicrous bomb threat lock-out of the press from the House

Barnes is the prime offender, but let it be said in fairness that he does less complaining when the news media makes its points about the secrecy. Barnes also is much more polished than Mutscher in slipping it

Barnes coordinated and hosted most of the secret sessions of the conference committee writing the tax bill.

The lieutenant governor's front man for the tax bill, Sen. Bill Moore of a rural district around Bryan, is from the oldschool of politics, a school that gave America the "smoke-filled room" and perpetuated itself in office without worry about its image or its public.

Moore was the man - call it haughty or call it gutty - who emerged from secret sessions of the tax conference to announce that the bill would exempt auto race tracks from admissions taxes because a big, new track is being built in his district.

The rest of the Senate "team" is less strengthy than Barnes and Moore; in fact, perhaps they are go - along - to - get along people. But they deserve to be on the same secret session indictment: Doc Blanchard, Lubbock; Don Kennard, Fort Worth; Jack Strong, Longview, and Ike Harris, Dal-

Mutscher began his role in the trail of secrecy by breaking a promise to Rep. John Hannah of Lufkin.

On the day of the appointment of the conference committee, Hannah tried to sponsor a resolution binding the House conferees to attend only open meetings, But Mutscher made him pull down the resolution, promising that he would see to it that all meetings were open.

The meetings were closed, It was brought Mutscher's attention. He did nothing.

Mutscher's counterpart for Moore is Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria, a tough little lawyer who knows he can't be hurt politically by the big city newspapers which cover the capitol.

That same assumption goes for the bulk of Mutscher's team - Bill Heatley, Paducah; John Traeger, Seguin; and Forest Harding,

San Angelo.

The titular chairman of the House conferees, Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas, largely ignores most of what is going on and being said. He is well entrenched in the Legislature and in Dallas, so your opinion doesn't really out much ice. really cut much ice

Is it really surprising that the folks paying the bills - grocery bills and tax bills - didn't give the legislators a pay raise in the Aug. 5 election?

PECAN WEEVILS

Pecan producers should be on the alert for the destructive pecan weevil. The adults begin emerging from the soil in Augand early September and begin feeding on the developing nuts. Feeding punctures cause the nuts to drop. The females puncture the pecan hull and deposit their eggs. The grubs feed on the kernel and destroy it. Local county agents can supply detailed information on the insecticides to use for control and precautions about their use.



'Little Man..Great God'' "I was no prophet, neither was I a prophet's son; but I power. was a herdsman, and a gatherer of sycamore fruit; and the the flock, and the Lord said unto me, Go, prophesy unto my people Israel. Now, therefore, hear the words of the Lord." Amos 7:14-16

The man who spoke these words lived in a time of national crisis. Eight hundred years before Christ the kingdom established by David and by Solomon had split asunder so that there were now two kingdoms - the Northern and Southern.

When God called Amos to go north and take His message to the people of the Northern King dom, He was assigning him no easy task. And since Amos was no preacher, the task which God assigned to him seemed almost impossible. Surely there were other men more fitted for this task?

What was the message which he was asked to take to his people? That message is best illustrated by a parable which he used: "The Lord was standing beside a wall built with a plumb-line. I will test my people with a plumb-line."

Amos called the attention of his people to the fact that all their efforts were directed toward the material. While they still observed the Sabbath, they longed for the day to end so that they could "start cheating" again. (8:5). They were guilty of making money at the expense of the poor, whom they encouraged to get into debt so that they might be ground under their heels, and be in no position to complain when the rich sold them inferior merchandise at high prices.

But it is not of Amos' message that we would speak, but of the power of God to take

First we see that the little "cog" is important. 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
