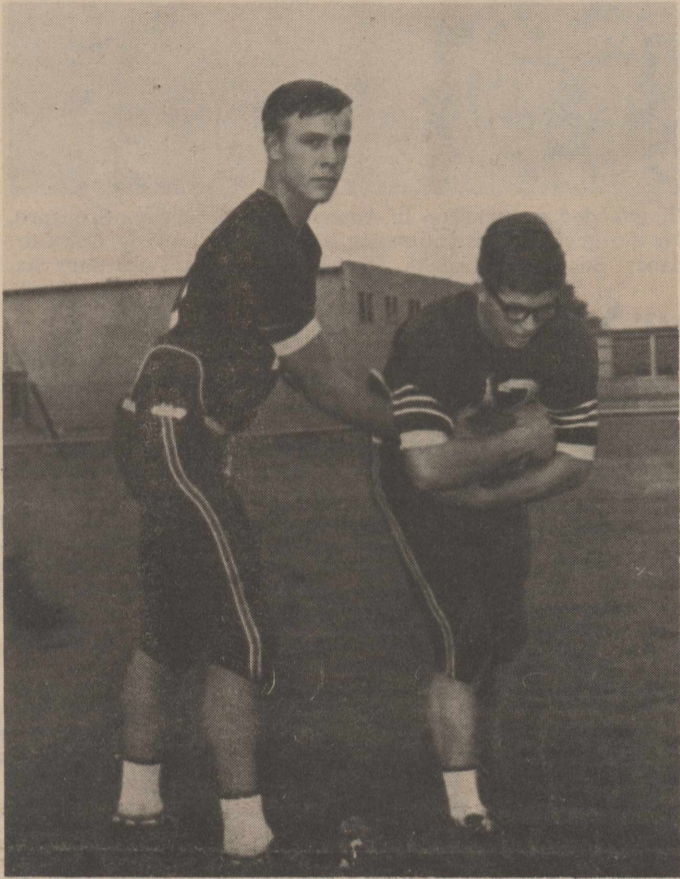

24 Nominations Received By PGC

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association revealed today that 24 nominations have been received for the Grain Sorghum Producers board.

The grain farmers within a 29 county area, of the High Plains and Panhandle of Texas, will elect 12 men from this list to serve as the governing board for their research and promotion activities, provided the grain sorghum referendum carries by a two-thirds majority.

The election will be held on Oct. 6 on the same ballot with the referendum proposition.

On this ballot the farmers decide whether or not they favor an expanding research and grain

sorghum promotion campaign, which will be aimed at improving the net profit in grain sorghum productions by assessing themselves an amount not to exceed five cents per ton to carry out this important program.

The names will appear on the ballot in the order of receipt by the grain sorghum producers association. This 12 man board will receive no pay for their services and will be charged with the responsibility of seeing that the five cents per ton is spent on the projects yielding

the best returns for the farmers.

Elbert Harp, Executive Director of GSPA, said, "We appreciate each of these men agreeing to serve on this board if elected. They will have a great responsibility, as well as a great challenge. One which we feel will be very profitable to the grain farmers in the High Plains and Panhandle."

Candidates from Castro County include John Gilbreath of Hart, Charles Heck Jr. of Nazareth and Melvin Barton of Dimmitt.

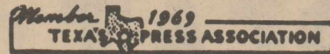
Admission for the two hours skating fun will be 50 cents. Refreshments will also be sold.

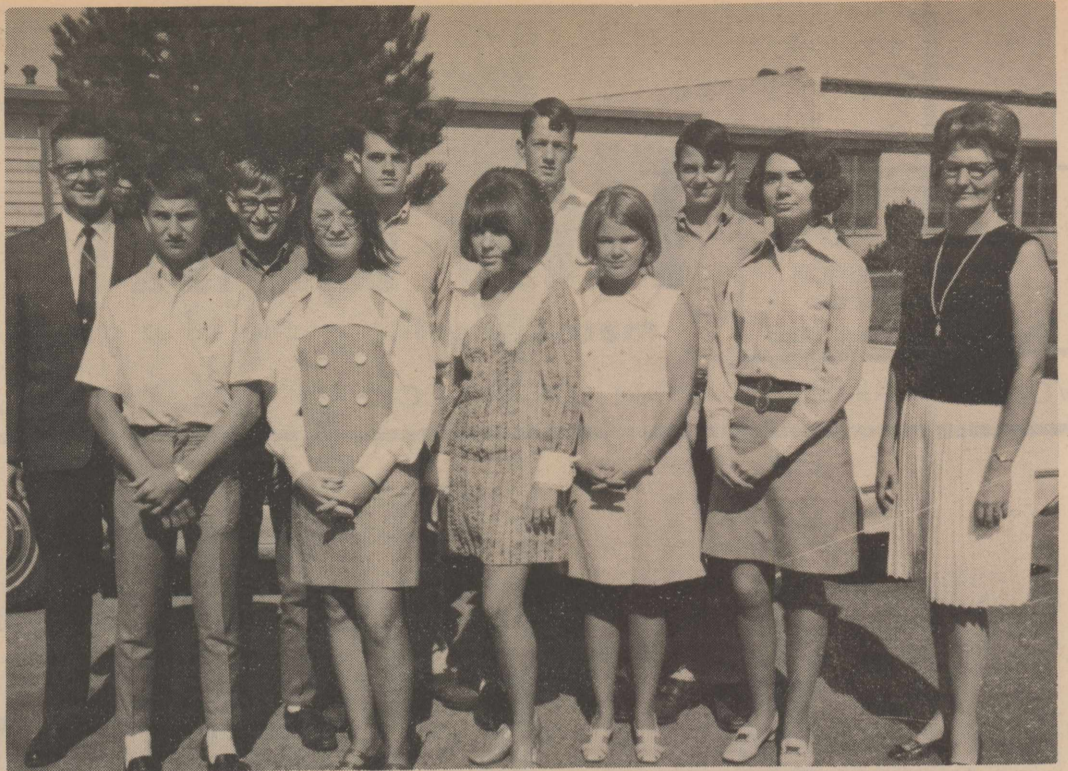

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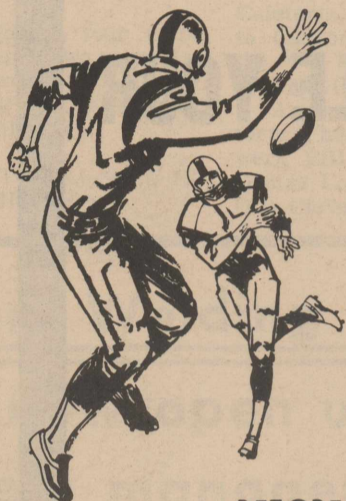

Horns Pluck Eagles

Hart Longhorns won their home opener for the 1969 foot- ball season Friday night as they whipped the Ropesville Eagles 25-6.

The game started as the Horns kicked off to Ropesville and Rick Braden of the Eagles ran the kick back 15 yards to his own 35.

The Eagles started a long drive to the goal behind the running of Rick Braden and Rosie Lara. It took the Eagles eight plays to reach the 15 yard line of Hart, and that was where the drive ended.

The Horns' defensive line held and Hart took over the ball.

Hart started their longest drive of the night. With quar- terback Harold Bob Bennett al- ternating running plays between Johnny Ethridge, Jimmy Rob- inson, Landria Bruington and Danny Smith, the Horns began pushing their way downfield.

Near the end of the first period Landria Bruington broke loose for a 50 yard run for a touchdown.

But the T. D. was called back for clipping and the Horns started again.

The second quarter began and found Hart continuing its drive for a touchdown.

Jimmy Robinson finally found the goal line with a 4-yard run.

The kick for extras by Andy Rogers was good and Hart led 7-0.

The next drive by Ropesville led to a quick exchange of the ball. Roy Etheridge recovered a fumble for the Horns on the 35 yard line of Ropesville.

The Horns began their second drive of the night and again it was Jimmy Robinson pushing in from the 8-yard line. The kick for extras by Rogers failed but Hart led 13-0.

Ropesville's next drive led to nowhere and the Eagles kicked the ball back to Hart.

Hart began to move their way back down the field with running plays and Landria Bruington pushed over from the one making the score at the half 19-0 in favor of the Horns.

The second half began with the Eagles kicking off to the Horns and Johnny Ethridge ran the ball back to his own 36 yard line.

It looked for a while as though the Horns might turn the game into a rout as Harold Bennett threw his first com- pleted pass of the night.

But the pass he threw was a 30-yard touchdown pass to Quincy Hawkins. The kick by Johnny Ethridge failed and the Horns led 25-0.

Ropesville scored its only touchdown in the same quarter when Rick Braden ran from 15 yards behind the line of scrimmage for a 50 yard touch- down.

The run for the extra points failed and the score stood at 25-6.

The fourth quarter was really a defensive battle as both teams would take the ball a few yards downfield and then punt. The defensive lines of both teams did a very good job of stopping running plays.

Ropesville's last drive al- most hit paydirt, but was stop- ped by Hart's fine defensive line.

After the Horns stopped that last drive, they were content to run out the clock. The final score was Hart Longhorns 25, Ropesville Eagles 6.

In 1449 Cosimo's son Lorenzo was born. Called "Lorenzo the Magnificent," he became a great patron of the arts.

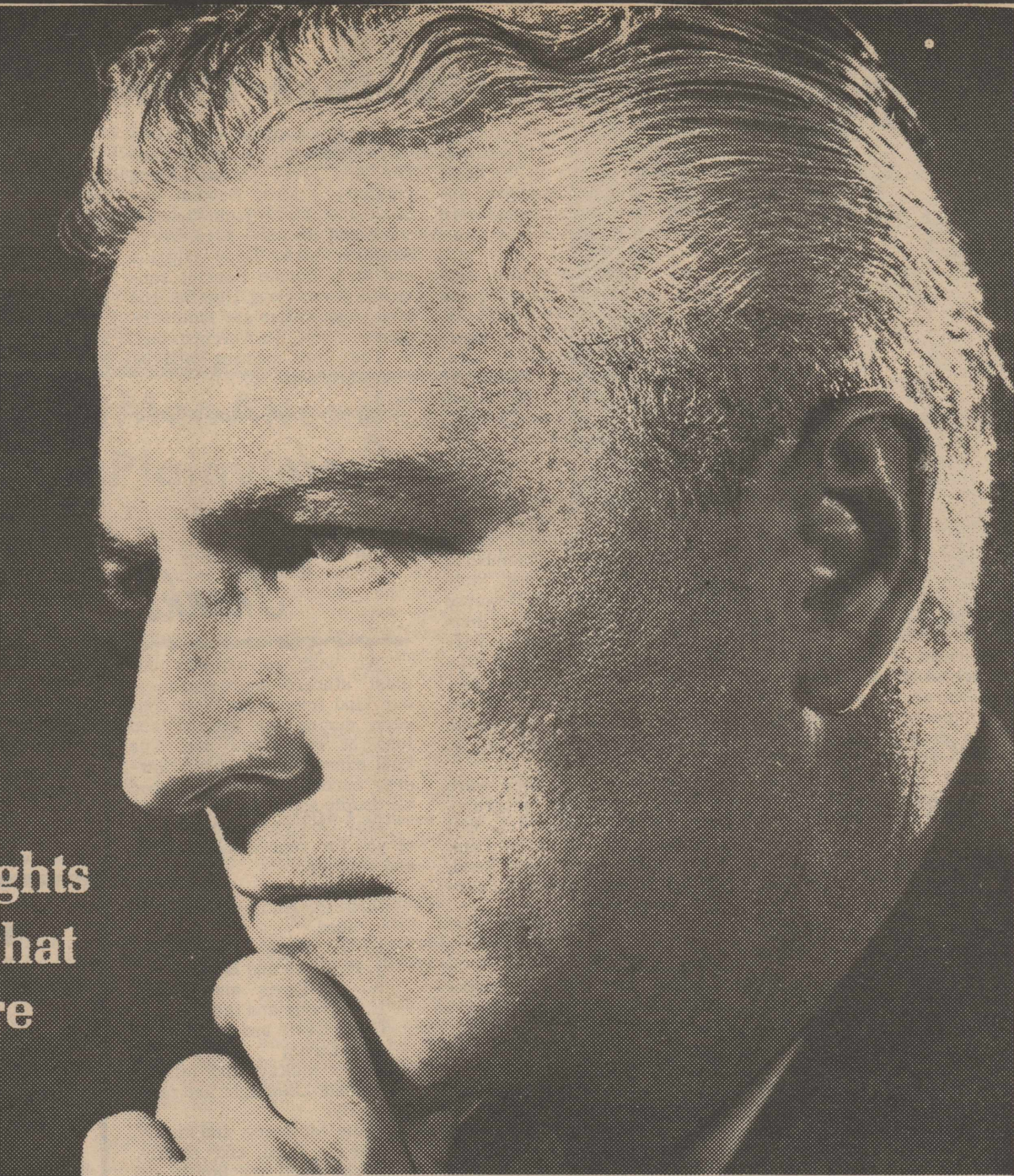
Two centuries after Lorenzo's

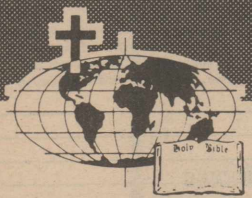
