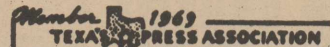

## Financial Facts

Have you ever heard of Ben Franklin's fugio? Chances are you have a couple in your pocket or purse

right now. Today we call them pennies.

In 1787, five years before the United States established a thorough monetary system, there was a money famine in the colonies. The only available stable coinage came from other countries.

In an effort to ease the shortage, Franklin devised the "fugio." It was made of bronze and worth approximately one hundredth of a dollar.

Among other details, there was a Franklin admonition on each side of the coin. One side had "Mind Your Business" on it and the other "We Are One." The latter phrase had an endless chain of 13 links circling it.

By popular demand, the name

"fugio" was changed to "century." Later still it was shortened to "cent."

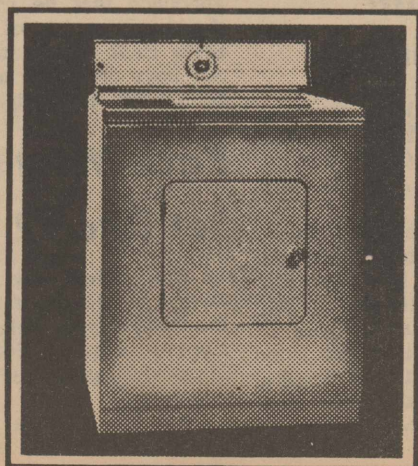

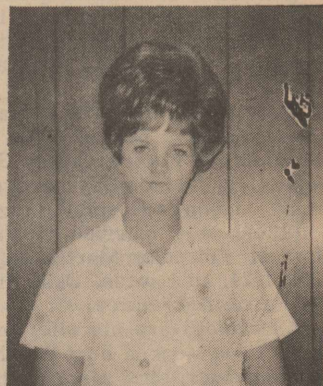

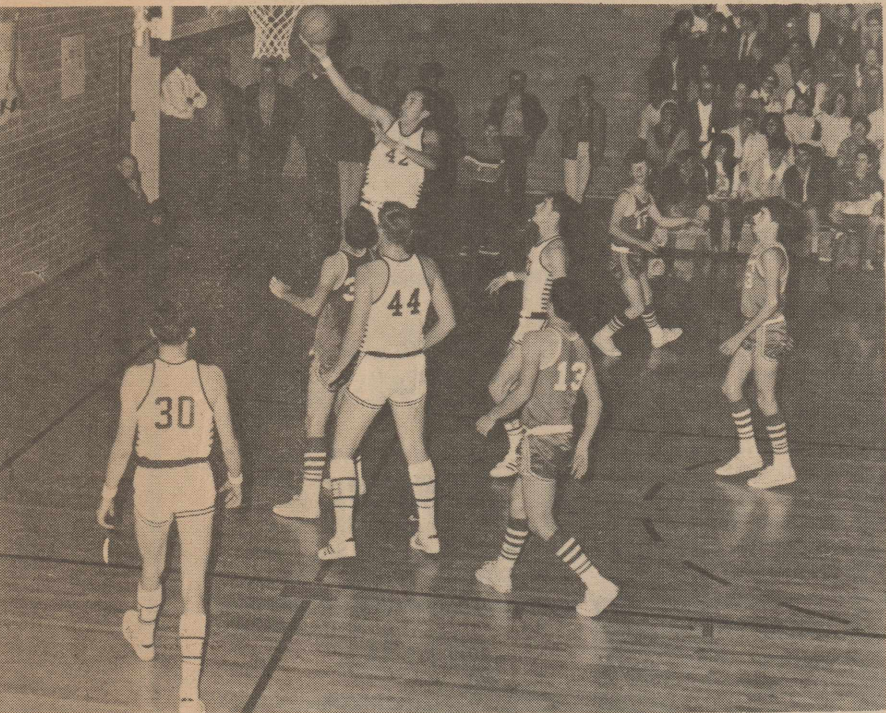

## CVAE Classes Completing Trial First Semester

At the beginning of the year Hart High School decided to try something new. A renovated storage room, equipped cheaply but well was initiated as the site of a new department.

This department, comprised of an arts and crafts class and two classes in Coordinated Vocational Academic Education (CVAE) has now all but completed its first semester trial run.

The arts and crafts class, restricted to 28 seniors, has already produced a number of decoupaged pictures and ceramic articles. During the first six weeks each student was required to complete at least three projects in ceramics. The second six weeks was devoted to linoleum block printing. Plans for silk screening next semester are currently being made.

Each student enrolled in the arts and crafts class pays a \$3 fee to cover the cost of materials and is entitled to keep his finished project. Although the course is operating under a limited budget, Vaughn Ross, instructor, says that the school board has been very cooperative and generous.

The two CVAE classes have also tackled several projects. Starting off, their first project was painting the shop. Once done, they tackled the making

of picture frames. Twenty-one students are currently enrolled in the class and collectively they have produced now more than 50 frames. These will be on display in room 4 in the high school building all next week.

Other projects completed include a well house, hoghouse, portable pens and several welding jobs. Currently the boys are repairing toys to present to needy families at Christmas. Persons are asked to bring toys to be repaired to the CVAE shops. Also small jobs are welcome from citizens.

The CVAE classes are part of the junior high curriculum for some seventh and eighth grade boys. Those who have shown a great interest in the course are also taking coordinated courses in math, science, social studies, language arts and physical education in Hart Junior High.

Instructor for the course is retired principal and former ag teacher of Hart High, J. V. Wescott. Commenting on his current position Mr. Wescott chuckled and said, "I'm right back where I started!"
