**Condition of stock.**

The rain last week has revived the grass, and stock are doing better. If we have good rains in the near future the cattle will go into winter in very good condition.

There has been a very heavy crop of calves in this county this year, but the prospects for a good crop next year is not very good at present.

A great many cattle have been driven from this range which will leave better grass for what is left. All the drive from this county this year will amount to near 25,000 and that amount of cattle added to the sheep that have been and will be driven will be a great benefit to the stock that remain.

Horses are doing well on mosquito beans as there is a very heavy crop this year, but cattle do not do so well as horses on beans.

We have noticed that our merchants have been doing a good trade this spring with ranchmen, especially the trail men. We are glad to know this and do not see why our merchants should not supply our ranchmen as freight does not cost the merchants any more than it does the consumer.

We would like to see the business men of Haskell make an effort to secure the trade of Stonewall and Knox county, which are settling up very fast.

It is of vital importance to the business men of Haskell at the present to get the trade of the territory north West of Haskell well under control before we have a thrifty rival to share with us.

The merchant of this place are all courteous and genial gentlemen to emigrants and prospectors, who, owing to the number, make business lively in the grocery line, and though they may not locate in Haskell they go away favorably impressed with our county and people and give us a good recommendation abroad.

By this means alone Haskell and her people is the best advertised county in the state.

**Queer Purchase.**  
 For Six Hundred Dollars an Atlantic Coast Farmer Buys a Wife and Two Children, All Ready Made.  
 New York, June 29—A dispatch from Ocean Grove, N. J., says: Ellis Thompson, a wealthy farmer, living about a mile from here, has purchased a wife and two children, and is now living with them in a new house, handsomely furnished. Kate Carson, a Redbank girl, was five years ago sought after by Tompson, then forty years old, and a young man named Hiram Satterlee, getter-up of the girl and married her. They lived until a week ago in a little house along the railroad near Deal Lake. Satterlee was employed on the New York and Long Branch road, but intemperance has ruined him, and he has given but scanty sustenance to his family. Lately Tompson saw how poor the family was, and how the woman he loved was being ill-used by her husband. His sympathy went out to the injured wife, and he longed to take

her to the house he was building on his farm, and which was so rapidly nearing completion. How to overcome the insurmountable difficulties which seemed to present themselves was the one question in his mind. At length he had a happy inspiration, he would buy her, when he broached the subject to Mrs. Satterlee she received the proposition with fewer scruples than he had expected. She appreciated his solicitude, and if she could not return his affection her gratitude would go a long way toward it. Mr. George W. Childs' dinner table as it appears when set for a banquet of a dozen courses has been made the subject of a full-page illustration in a New England magazine devoted to the interests of the higher life of the household.

Standing by the candelabra at one end of the table is a silver wine-cooler, with four raised panels of cupids and graces.

Claret-jugs and wine-glasses from Bohemia, and a set of claret-tumblers from Chelsea, ornately enameled with sprays, flowers, and butterflies in gilt, crimson, and blue, give dashes of coloring and variety of form to the profuse and varied service.

Another odd bit is a silver bottle, shaped like an owl, copied from one in the British museum especially for Mr. Childs, and there are several novel bottles and vases wrought in the same precious metal.

But it is in the vast stores of valuable porcelain that the collection is so wonderfully rich, and the crown jewel of the lot is a marvellously large and splendid set of Minton ware, made with special care and decorated with exquisite daintiness and good taste.

Other sets of plates show nothing but fish; others only birds or flowers, while there are several harlequin sets, in which each plate is entirely different from any of its fellows, and each is a veritable gem.

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WHAT SCIENCE SAYS.
