ROAD BONDS WILL BE HELD BY THE DISTRICT

We have been notified by the commissioner of this precinct that the road bond issue has been settled by a decision being reached to retain the bonds as the property of the district and apply the interest and sinking fund on the roads each year thus retiring the coupons as they fall due and at the same time get the benefit of the large sum of interest that would otherwise be paid to some outside holders of the bonds. In this way the district will get the full value of the bond issue, interest included, and the money will be available just as it is needed during the life of the bonds. This has been determined as the best and most logical way to use the money to be derived from the bond issue.

Nothing more clearly indicates the great need for old clothing than the imperative necessity of making an appeal for such over the entire United States, and I am anxious for anyone who will take charge of such an old clothing appeal in the various communities to get in touch with me immediately at the Near East Relief Headquarters, Dallas. Literature and instructions will be forwarded immediately.

Mr. Lowry further announced that should it so happen that no organization or individual is secured to handle the old clothing appeal in certain localities, that the various family bundles may be sent direct to the National warehouse, shipping tags for which may be obtained from his office.

Cablegrams Report Conditions

Cablegrams recently received from the stricken area, bespeak of the great need. Among those recently received were: "Urgent need for food and clothing." From Constantinople: "Refugees arriving from Caucasus, escaping persecution, naked, destitute." From Beirut: "Aintap still ravaged by battle, cold and lack of supplies. Aleppo refugees problem growing worse. Cargo old clothing welcome for refugees. New tragedies along Turkish frontier. Probable American relief only hope for thousands."

Fifty Thousand Naked in Snow

Conditions last year are told in a report just made public, as follows, according to Secretary Lowry: During a three-inch snow fall in Kars on October 30, 1920, fifty thousand Armenian men were stripped of everything by the invading army, to be driven into the plains under Edward Fox, District Manager of the Near East Relief, had no clothing to give the men. He did have in his warehouse twenty thousand empty flour sacks. These he distributed as far as they would go and the men were driven off to the wintry plain with only these for covering. American boys have but to think of those heroes whose marching feet left bloodstains in the snow at Valley Forge, to realize the even more heroic endurance of these patient hosts of little children, girls, mothers and grown men in the Caucasus who are how so much more destitute of protection from winter's snow and biting cold.

The clothing cast aside as worthless by our people here in America would provide comfortable covering for every naked one in the Near East, and would be an untold blessing to thousands who have been stripped of all their possessions. Mr. Lowry stated, "and the clothing can be transferred to them through the agency of the Near East Relief, incorporated by Act of Congress, to relieve the suffering in that country."

Sudan For Hay

It has been found that the time to cut Sudan grass is when it is beginning to head well. If the hay can be well cut when cut in this stage it has a little higher feeding value than it does when cut earlier or later. Sudan grass makes a very good feed for cows when used with feeds rich in protein.

Often the second cutting of Sudan makes a heavier yield than the first. The second crop does not start out as soon when the first crop is cut in immature stages, as it does when it is cut in the milk or dough stage. The immature plants are full of moisture and when cut in this condition there is a heavy evaporation from the plants which weakens the stalks and starts the plants to shoot. It appears about the best time to cut the first crop to get the best quality of hay. To leave favorable conditions for a second crop is to cut the heads in the milk stage.

Editors as Exhibits.
They are shameless, abandoned people in South America. They make fun of editors!
The following paragraph appeared in the Buenos Aires Herald recently: "At the Press club carnival ball the editors of all the papers in town will be on view from one to two in the morning, free and for nothing, a special cage having been built to hold their bodies, and another arrangement for the support of their weighty brows. Those who have never yet seen such people in the raw, so to speak, are advised to look early and avoid the rush, but the public is hereby warned that nothing may be poked through the bars, the exhibits having regular feeding times, even as you and I."

Kindness to Animals Pays.
There are four important places from which purebred dairy cattle come: The Isles of Jersey and Guernsey in the English channel, the Ayr country in Scotland, and the Friesian country in Holland. It is a characteristic of the people in all the eight regions from which purebred cattle come that they are always kind to one another and to all animals. Kindness makes better beef, and more cream.

Parliamentary "Whips."
The parliamentary origin of the term "Whip" goes back to 1768. In that year, according to Sir Courtenay Jibber (clerk of the British house of commons from 1902 to 1921), there was a great debate in the house on a petition against the return of Colonel Luttrell for Westminster in place of John Wilkes, who had been expelled from the house by its order. The government made strenuous efforts to bring together all their followers for the division, and Edmund Burke, referring scornfully to the manner in which men had been summoned posthaste even from the continent, likened the activity of the ministers to the whipping-in of a pack of hounds. The phrase caught on. The treasury officials became "whippers-in," and, by rapid process of abbreviation, whips.

Disposing of the Dead.
Cremation was common in ancient days among the Greeks and Romans, the funeral pyre marking the final disappearance of many heroes. Certain tribes of American Indians wrapped the bodies of their dead and fastened them in cradles on the branches of trees. But burial remains the dominant custom and perhaps permanent. The art of disposing of the dead is a science.
