FOR VETERANS
That They May Now Reinstale Their War Term Insurance.

Announced by the U. S. Bureau, through District Manager, E. O. Hart Worth, that the men now have the right of reinstating their war time insurance and putting it into an old line insurance backed by the U. S. Government.

Communication was received from the Bureau this week publication, but like most communications received from Government Departments and various other sources, it was so lengthy for us to publish, but we are glad to give the following extracts in the hope that some man may reinstate his insurance by submitting satisfactory evidence of insurability.

Condition just mentioned account of a disability contracted in or by active military or naval service during the World War, you may reinstate, if not permanently totally disabled, an examination being required to determine physical condition, by the payment of premiums due since the date of reinstatement, with interest at a rate of 5 per cent annually, compounded annually on such premium from the date such premium was due.

may reinstate any amount due, in multiples of \$500, and less than \$1000 no more than the amount originally due you.

any service man may reinstate his war time insurance into the old line of the six months term insurance.

THREE RAIL CHIEFS SEEKING CONFERENCE

THOSE AT CLEVELAND SIGN TELEGRAM TO THE PRESIDENT.

SITUATION GETTING SERIOUS

Immediate Consultation With Harding Desired Owing to Hourly Developments.

Cleveland, Ohio.—Legislative representatives of three of the four railroad brotherhoods in Washington have been requested by telegraph to arrange a conference between President Harding and the chief executives of the brotherhoods for the purpose of presenting to the President their views in connection with the present strike of railroad shop crafts.

A telegram was sent direct to President Harding by the three local chief executives of the brotherhood asking for a conference.

The matter has been under consideration by Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Engineers; W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen; and D. R. Robertson, president of the Brotherhood of Firemen and Enginemen, but because of failure to get a reply for joint action of the Order of Railway Conductors, and the other members of the "Big Four," it was decided to ask for the conference, through the legislative representatives of the engineers, trainmen and firemen.

Mr. Sheppard was telegraphed that because of the serious situation hourly developing it was decided to seek the conference immediately.

"If you decide to take similar action, you can wire your legislative representative direct," the telegram said.

State Department Works to Remove Obstacles to Recognition.

MEXICO GIVES U. S. TEXTS OF DECISIONS

Washington.—The State Department is redoubling its efforts to remove obstacles in the way of American recognition of Mexico. And the Oregon Government has just made an effort to remove one of the obstacles by giving the State Department the texts of five decisions by the Mexican Supreme Court, said to establish definitely that Article 27 of the Mexican Constitution is nonretroactive.

While these decisions are not held to be the main obstacles in the way of recognition, nevertheless, it was said, if upon examination they are found satisfactory, they will have removed the fear of confiscation of American property in Mexico. Article 27 of the Mexican Constitution provides that subsoil rights of all Mexican oil properties belong to the Government.

No assurance that this article might not result in confiscation of American property has ever been received by the State Department. These decisions are represented as giving the required assurances.

These were delivered to the department by Charge d'Affaires Telles of the Mexican Embassy here, and the full force of translators were at once set to work on the decisions. They will be made public soon, it was said.

Vickers Saved From Noose.
Port Worth, Texas.—Ernest Vickers has escaped the noose. Official notice of the commutation of his death sentence to life imprisonment was received by Sheriff Carl Smith from Governor Pat M. Neff about 7:15 o'clock Friday night and ends a desperate fight by his attorney, Harvey P. Shead, for many months to save Vickers from the gallows.

Sympathy Not to Prevent Mining
London.—British mine workers themselves caught in the throes of unemployment and depression, are not expected to allow their sympathy for the striking American miners to hold up the mining of coal to meet the American demand which has developed here because of the strike in the United States.

Has Biggest Rural Population
Washington.—Texas shows the largest farm population of any state in the Union, according to figures issued by the Census Bureau upon the 1920 enumeration. Those residing on farms numbered 2,277,773, or 48.5 per cent of the State's entire population. The census definition of a farm extends somewhat beyond the ordinary meaning of the term, in that it includes any fruit or market garden, poultry yard, dairy or apiary which yields \$250 in products.

Condensed Austin News

General J. F. Wickers of Houston was in Austin recently and paid the gross receipts tax of the Pullman Company for the quarter ending June 30, amounting to \$18,571, being 5 per cent of gross receipts of \$371,423.

The strike of shopmen and carmen is responsible for the filing with the Railroad Commission by the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company of an application asking authority to remove the company's repair shops from De Leon, Comanche County, to Dublin, Erath County. Hearing has been set for Aug. 7.

The Railroad Commission has set for hearing on Aug. 8 the application of the Galveston Commercial Association for a maximum rate of 33 1/2c per 100 pounds to govern in the transportation of news print paper, car loads, from Galveston to Texas common points. The existing maximum rate is 38 1/2c per 100 pounds.

In proceedings before Federal Judge Duval West in San Antonio the receivership of the Austin dam and the power plant was terminated and all claims satisfied. This may preclude the completion or revision of the dam under amended plans. More than \$1,000,000 has been expended and no return is coming from it.

The State tax rate was fixed at 75c the maximum amount allowed under the Constitution. It was 62c last year and the increase of 13c on the \$100 of assessed valuation was made in the ad valorem rate, the assessments for schools and pensions having been at the constitutional maximum of 25c and 5c, respectively, which figures are carried into this year's State rate.

Governor Neff heard a plea for commutation of the death sentence to life imprisonment in the case of Ernest Vickers, under sentence to hang in Fort Worth. Those who were here to see the Governor in behalf of Vickers included District Attorney L. H. Jones and Deputy Sheriff Jess Vannoy of Bell County. Vickers formerly resided in Bell County.

General counsel for the I. & G. N. Railroad and representatives of the reorganization committee, which purchased the property, were in Austin conferring with the Railroad Commission and Attorney General regarding the corporate statutes of the company when reorganized, particularly as to whether it will have to get a new charter and what that document must stipulate.

Dr. Ethel Watters, child hygiene consultant, Children's Bureau, United States Department of Labor, after a four days' conference with State Health Officer John H. Florence, has returned to Washington. It was the opinion of Dr. Watters that the two most important items for Texas to strive for along maternity and child hygiene lines are to put the State in the birth registration area, and to correct the milk problem, which is a serious one, she said.

Attorney General Walter A. Keeling and R. H. Ward of Houston, who acted as a special Assistant Attorney General in the defense of the Red River boundary suits, are in conference and outlined a plan of action in resisting the bill introduced in Congress to fix the boundary between Texas and the Federal Government along Red River.

John S. Kerr of San Antonio, known Texas nurseryman, has been called one of the leading agriculturists in Texas, has been named by the State to establish a botanical garden and arboretum on the University property near Lake Austin, being the acres given the University of Texas by the late George W. Breckenridge of San Antonio.

A meeting will be held shortly by the trustees named to establish the Schreiner Institute at Kerrville, Texas, and provision made for constructing the first buildings. Announcement to that effect was made by Dr. R. E. Vinson, president of the University, who was named by Captain Charles Schreiner to head the board to found the school.

Ed Hall, Commissioner of Finance and Banking in a report to the State banks of Texas, called for a law against indiscriminate cotton during a year in which he predicted there will be large speculations in the staple commodity. While not very highly advanced on the subject, he urged that extreme care be taken that the bank financial deals actually controls the

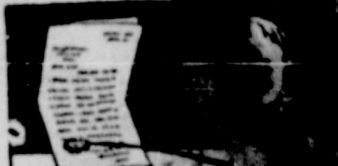

Concentrate on the Sleeves

...hear all sorts of rumors about sleeves that are to come—whether shall be tight or loose, flowing or—but always it is the sleeve. It is around which the clothes industry centers, observes a fashion writer in the New York Times. Col-skirts, bodices and waistsbands their own importance in the mode of things, but sleeves remain, center of attraction.

has not been applied to the scheme of sleeve construction and with the utmost success as a result. Each woman prides herself upon her personality pays much attention to the manner of the shaping of her sleeves. There it where the art of the modern gown is concentrated. By the swing and sweep of the sleeve is the style of the frock established. The sleeve, by all odds, carries off the bulk of attention. And so it shall be during the coming season—so the designers have decreed, if their advance models are to be taken as any criterion.

their sleeves ye shall know them. The new style slogan. The rest of the gown may be so simple that it is utterly devoid of interest. It may be the common level in every particular, but as for its sleeves, they are the important part. They are the part that tell at once whether the gown is of the ultra smart or may be plain, indeed. They manage to place the center around which the gown is built. That is their modern plan of dress. The art of Fashion. The sleeves if you would have them in fashion. Do not let them fall to the level of your banners that whether their design, they still

must carry that gracefulness which is so essential a part of the frocks that are new. The sleeve has only just begun to evolve. It promises, during the coming season to establish a real style interest never before achieved in exactly the ratio that this sleeve era shall attain. So, what could be more of fashion interest than to study the sleeve as it exists today, with an eye to its evolution in the future?

In one model there is used a combination of white against black kasha cloth. Then to join the two together there are rows of handwork in embroidery done with black threads. But it is in the sleeves that the real design converges. They are simple enough to be sure, but they carry with them that certain style which marks them as an insistent part of the modern era.

The blouse of this particular dress is cut in the kimono fashion that is so dear to the heart of the French. But the sleeves slope away in a very informal manner and then they are tied together with a band of the white kasha cloth made to form a sort of a tassel. They are inconspicuous enough, but they have that certain air of being the points of interest that dignify the gown as a portion of the season's mode. Again at the neckline the band is used to tie the collar together, and these three ties serve to form a pattern that draws the whole design of the garment into one.

The hat is white, as one might expect, and it is faced with a layer of black, while the roll that forms the trimming about the crown is made of white velvet twisted until it forms a sort of rope.

Capelike Sleeves.

The sleeves of this gown are full enough to run into a sort of drooping effect at the back which, when the arms are loosely hung at the side, form a capelike look across the back in spite of the fact that they are veritable sleeves when the arms are posed at other angles.

This is one of the happy parts of the modern sleeve. Besides being a sleeve, it is usually something else. They, together, form a cape, a scarf, a collar or what not? They are, only to begin with, sleeves, but they usually have some other function to perform in the design of the gown considered as a whole. There are sleeves which reach into side draperies for the skirt. And this they do most effectively.

For instance, there is a dress of brocaded silk in gray. It is straight enough and plain enough by itself. But then there are the sleeves. They are folded and draped and flung over the arms and when the chiffon has finished making sleeves to be worshiped for their very beauty then it takes itself into the skirt where it is draped and folded to such an extent that it makes the real interest of that skirt. Of course the drapery congregates at the sides and at the hem it falls in points over the hemline. But the sleeves are the things which start the idea and from them the folds of the skirt take their way in unalloyed enjoyment. To finish the gown there is a wide band of silver lace to make a girldle and then there is a choux of flowers made of chiffon posed at one side to finish off the girldle. On the whole it is a notable gown, in perfect harmony with the style of the present mode, but after all, its sleeves are the central points of interest. From them the draperies that make the gown distinctive emerge, and in them are the lines that establish the continuity of the shaping of the gown itself.

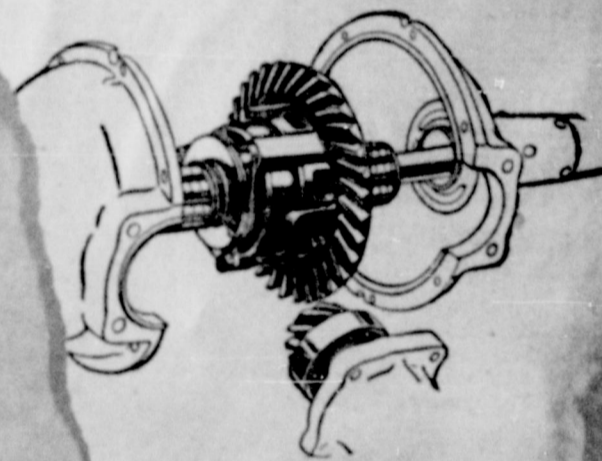

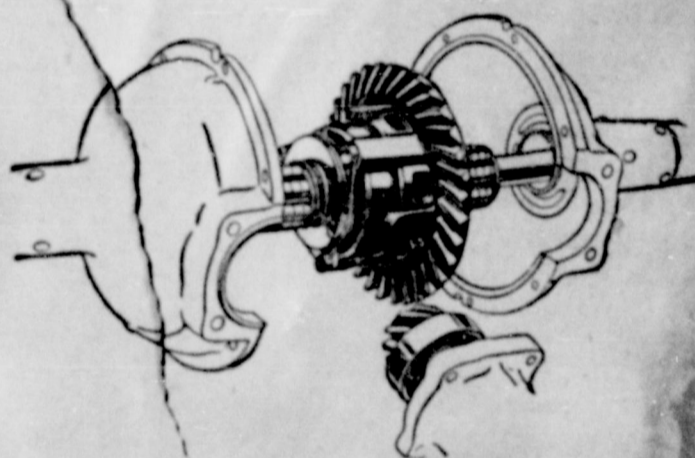



TOWN OF KNOX CITY

Ordinance No Twelve
 An ordinance prohibiting the sale of Beef, pork, etc.
 Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Texas:
 That no person, persons, firms, or corporations shall sell, peddle or offer for sale, within the fire limits of said town, beef, pork, sausage, or any other meats or beef.

Any person, persons, firms etc. selling or offering for sale any of the above mentioned articles in the resident section shall comply with the regulations of the City markets to wit:
 All such mentioned meats and etc. shall be slaughtered in a fly proof building.
 Penalty for violating the above Ordinance will be a fine not less than \$1.00 nor over \$25.00.

Ordinance No Thirteen
 An ordinance prohibiting loafing, loitering, etc. and providing fine for same.
 Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Texas that:
 Any person or persons found loafing or loitering in the corporate limits of the town of Knox City, Texas, who have no visible means of support, shall be deemed guilty of Vagrancy, and shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor over 10.00.

Any person or persons unable to pay the fine assessed shall be made to work the streets of Knox City.

Ordinance No. 14.
 Any person or persons found guilty of peddling water, milk, fruit, or vegetables on any washable products on Central Avenue, within two blocks extending south to Main Street and north to Third Street, including these two streets, or on Fourth Street, within two blocks extending east to Austin Avenue and west to Nolan Avenue. Violating these two avenues shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$25.00.

Ordinance No. 15.
 An ordinance demanding that sidewalks on Central Avenue in the business district of the town be constructed of brick or concrete and of an form height.

A number of our citizens met the southbound train on Thursday afternoon of last week and heard Hon. Clarence E. Gilmore, chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, and Judge Reed, chairman of the Kansas Railroad Commission, make brief talks in regard to the present condition and future outlook of the Orient Railroad. They stated that without the cooperation of the towns served by the road it would not be able to get by and that it could not give the service that is desired by these towns without more business. That the only apparent relief or the only promise for the service desired would be for some trunk line to take over the road and conduct it as a branch of their main line. Judge Reed stated that the branch lines of the important railroad systems of the country would be operated at a loss if it were not for their connection with these trunk lines, and that the Orient could be successfully operated only as a branch road of one of these lines, backed and financed by them.
