More Premiums Are Added to List as Published in The Journal Last Week.

## CONGRESSMAN PARRISH DIES FROM INJURIES

Death Results From Cerebral Meningitis Following Auto Accident.

Wichita Falls, Texas, March 27.—Congressman Lucian W. Parrish of the Thirteenth District and candidate for United States Senate, died here at 9:30 o'clock tonight. The death ends a near two weeks' fight for life following an automobile accident near Roby on the night of March 15. It was at first thought that the Congressman's injuries would not prove fatal, although his jaw and skull were fractured. Cerebral meningitis later set in and little hope for his recovery has been entertained since.

Mrs. Parrish was at his bedside when he died. A large number of his friends had arrived here following announcement this morning that there was no hope for his recovery.

Mr. Parrish was a senatorial aspirant and was campaigning when he was injured driving from Roby to Stamford.

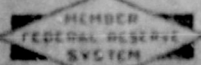

**BEST MAKEUP FOR FIREBRICK**

Exhaustive Researches Seem to Have Definitely Settled Matter for Good Results.

Le Chatelier and Bogitch have been engaged for some time in researches upon firebrick and the best makeup to be employed. Such firebrick is composed of granulated silica and various oxides in powder used as a binding material. It is found that the best binding substance is impalpable quartz powder, which is produced in special crushing mills. The use of this powder considerably increases the strength of the bricks at a high temperature of 1,600 degrees centigrade, and this is one of the most important qualities of firebrick.

Again, the proportion of 25 per cent of the powder gives much better results than 75 per cent, for when too much of it is employed the bricks all show small cracks after heating, which will become larger under a long heat.

**MUSIC ON THE TYPEWRITER**

English Clergyman Is Said to Have Invented Machine That Will Do the Work.

A South London clergyman has outdistanced the Prague inventor who has reported the construction of a typewriter for music. Rev. T. Walton, vicar of St. Andrew's, Lambeth, who for years has done all his parochial printing, has not only devised a typewriter for music, but also completed the design for a typewriter which will tackle the formidable Japanese language, and another for the Chinese tongue. One model of a typewriter for music upon which he had worked for several years was exhibited at the printing exhibition in London last year. The machine for typing music has a keyboard with 100 keys. That will be what may be termed all the "gear" characters met with in music. If the piece is an unusually difficult composition it may be necessary to change the "tray" of types. Ten words a minute is about the best the existing Japanese machine can do. Although Mr. Walton's typewriter is only two feet square there is a keyboard on it giving 6,424 Japanese characters and it prints a word at a time.
