HABITS AND DIETS OF AMER- ICAN PEOPLE

American farmers seem to be as generously supplied with meat as any class of people. It will seem surprising to city housekeepers that eggs are not used as abundantly on farms as among people at large. Milk is generously used, even though there are fewer children than the average in farm homes. Other healthful dairy products assure farm families decided advantages over other groups. Except in the Southern States, where "quick" breads are often preferred to yeast raised kinds, wheat bread is the staple. Corn breads are popular every-where, but are chiefly used to give variety. A relatively large proportion of starchy vegetables was reported and a relatively small quantity of green and succulent kinds, although farm families have the best opportunities for growing vegetables at home.

These and other points about farm diet are brought out in studies recently made by the Office of Home Economics in cooperation with the Bureau of Markets and Crops Estimates of the United States Department of Agriculture, to show the food actually eaten by typical American families in this country.

of wet weather. The material for surfacing this road made only a small hole in the side of the creek by the roadside from which the gravel was taken.

Granite gravel from the creek-bed makes the surface of a fine road from Granite to Mangum, in Greer county, Southwestern Oklahoma. There are many other localities where materials close at hand applied with interest and intelligence have made excellent, all-weather roads at low cost in comparison with the kinds of roads which good roads enthusiasts so generally insist are the only ones worth considering.

Good roads, like all other good things, will not come to us from somewhere "away off yonder." There seem to be too much interest in big contracts for expensive roads and not enough systematic and sincere effort to make good roads with materials at hand at moderate expense. Road problems are strictly local. Some localities will find the most expensive roads the cheapest. But beyond question, more localities and more miles can be more economically served by gravel roads costing not more than \$5,000 a mile. And annual interest charge on a mile of road costing \$40,000 will maintain in fine condition about 10 miles of gravel road. Let's do some digging into the gravel bank.—Oklahoma Farmer



Hotbands Have Meaning.
There's a reason for placing the bow of the hatband at the left side, which dates back to the days when men used to settle their troubles with a sword. It was very necessary then to be able to draw one's weapon at a moment's notice—quarrels broke out almost without provocation. Feathers or hanging plumes were always worn on the left side, so that there was no chance of their interfering with the freedom of the sword arm. As time went on, feathers gave place to ribbons, sometimes used to secure the hat to the head; the ends of these were brought to the left side to be out of the way of the right arm. When men ceased to settle their quarrels summarily with weapons, the left side of the hat continued to carry any little extra decoration allowed on it; and there it has remained to this day.

For European Children.

Italy and neighboring countries, especially Switzerland, at the end of October held at Milan a conference on child welfare to discuss more specifically, seaside and country homes for needy children, placement of children in foreign countries; vacation camps; also provision of institutional care in cities; state, local and international organization of child welfare; better training of social workers engaged in child welfare service, and improvement of technique generally. The public welfare department of the city of Milan, which called this conference, is especially concerned over the duplication of efforts, the lack of proper care in the smaller communities and interaction between town and country. One definite aim is that of making international co-operation in this field a means of encouraging closer relationship between the peoples.

IDEA WOULD PLEASE DICKEN.

First Free Children's Library in England to Be Opened in Old Home of Novelist.

There is to be opened soon the first free library for children in England in a building in which lived Charles Dickens, spent several eventful years of his own childhood. It is an idea so appropriate and fitting that all supporters of the scheme must wish for its success, remarks the Christian Science Monitor. The house in question is 33 Johnson street, Somers town, and the Dickens family lived here after they left Chatham, being tenants of the house for five years. From this house Dickens, the father, was taken to the Debtors' prison, the Marshalsea, an incident which afterward supplied his son with "copy" for two of his most famous books, "The Pickwick Papers" and "Little Dorrit."

Dickens is a striking example of how much can be accomplished by a case of real genius under adverse conditions, and it is he himself in "David Copperfield," who tells us what help enlightenment he got in his shed surroundings from the few which made up his father's tiny

Though small, that library which treasure trove to a clever boy, Don Quixote and Gil Blas, of these masterpieces is composed of many stories—and from Fielding, Smollett, Goldsmith and Defoe, Dickens must have learned the mode of work and the grace and dignity of a tale well told.

If his old home becomes the home of a free library for children who like him, may have a chance to forget the hard times of their lives in the works of great authors, everyone who has the welfare of children at heart, must rejoice.
