NIGHT CREW NOW ON AT OIL WELL

Efforts Being Made to Proceed More Rapidly With Drilling. Prospects Favorable.

The Brazos Bend Oil Company has put on a night crew and hope to make more rapid progress in their drilling than they have made in the past. The work has been extremely difficult recently on account of the rocks which were encountered.

The crew was struck about 100 feet before it reached the clay and sand which is to be drilled to a depth of 150 feet. The sand is very hard and the crew is now working on it.

Estimate of Cost of Water and Sewer System for City

Montgomery & Ward, consulting civil engineers, of Wichita Falls, Texas, have been retained as engineers on a report for the proposed water supply system for Knox City.

Mr. H. L. Thackwell, hydraulic engineer for Montgomery & Ward, has just completed an exhaustive survey of the water supply of the city. Many samples of local wells have been carefully analyzed, both mechanically and bacteriologically. Mr. Thackwell says that with one exception the water is singularly pure from bacteria. The wells with the least salts, in solution, seem to be located in the southwest portion of the city.

A comprehensive water system, with a large well and double pumping units, 100-foot tanks and tower, and 8-inch mains, with adequate fire plugs and distribution system, will cost approximately \$55,000. A combined water and sewer system would cost approximately \$100,000. If the sewer system is the water supply on a bond issue, its cost would be from \$5,000 to \$10,000 if it was built in connection with the water system. Knox City can obtain a water and sewer system for less than Crowell paid for its water system alone, it would seem advisable to give the subject careful consideration and

vote a single bond issue covering both of these improvements. Knox City would be the cleanest and best city in the valley if the bonds are issued now.

There have been numerous calls for municipal bonds lately and we would have no trouble in disposing of the whole issue at par. Construction costs and materials are now at the lowest point, but lately there have been signs of a slight rise in materials, consequently the best time for building is the present. Insurance men say that the saving in insurance will pay for the water supply system in 20 years. Bonds could be issued to run for 40 years, bearing from 5-1-2 to 6 per cent interest. The total increased taxes will be very slight on long time bonds. Increased valuation will stimulate real estate and building operations.

The final report by Montgomery & Ward will be in the hands of Mayor J. E. Arnold the latter part of this month.

In the event an oil well is brought in here within the next few months or later, there will be a great influx of people into our town and then the question of a complete water and sewer system will be even of more vital importance than it is at the present time. We should be prepared for such an event rather than have to meet the situation without ample fire and sanitary protection.

"Dollar Day" Will be Feature of Our First Community Day

The executive committee of the Knox City Commercial and Agricultural Association, composed of O. L. Jamison, chairman, J. A. Wilson, secretary, and Joe S. Smith, met in the rear of the Orient Drug Store Monday evening. The suggestions, as published in The Journal, were read and it was decided that the first and seventh of these suggestions were the most important ones, in the matter of the appointment of committees, for beginning active operations of the organization. The names of the members not having been tabulated, however, it was thought best to wait until this was done before committees were appointed to look after the features of the work that are named in the first and seventh suggestions.

Following the meeting of the executive committee there was a meeting of the board of directors in the rear of the First National Bank. Dr. Jas. M. Green, president of the board was "tardy," but he promised to be on time in the future. Those present were: Dr. Green, J. A. Wilson, S. M. Clouse, J. H. Payne, Joe

S. Smith, W. H. Veasey, J. M. Craft, O. L. Jamison, J. O. Nash, Mrs. A. B. Reese, Mrs. H. M. Warren and Miss Daisy Smith. These members of the board were absent.

Prof. S. G. West was a visitor at the meeting and offered some additional suggestions to the outline of work for the organization. The suggestions of Prof. West were very appropriate in that they were applicable to the Knox City community, and that they merit the approval of the board.

After some discussion as to what was the proper manner in which to start the organization to work, it was decided to have a "community day" on Monday, December 11th, which will be a "get together" day for the entire community. The program and arrangements were referred to the executive committee, but some features were mentioned and favored by the board. One special feature was voted on and it was decided to ask all merchants in the town to put on a "dollar day" sale for that day, and also to close their store for two hours during the day.

Political Motives Are Seen in Flight Abroad Great Britain's Dreadnought Malaya.

Constantinople.—Fearful lest the Turkish Nationalists should carry out the edict of the great national assembly of Turkey and seize him and bring him to trial, the Sultan of Turkey, Mohammed VI, fled from the Yildiz Kiosk, took refuge on board the British dreadnought Malaya, and in company with his youngest son, Prince Eriogrul Effendi, is on his way to Malta.

ALLIES HAVE DEMAND APOLOGY FROM GERMANY

All Objections of Withdrawing Military Control is Dropped.

Paris.—The allied powers, through the Council of Ambassadors, have informed Germany that all questions concerning the withdrawal of the military control commission in Germany have been suspended until the German Government gives the fullest satisfaction for what are termed flagrant violations of the military clauses of the treaty of Versailles, committed during the last six months and shows willingness to abide by the commission's instructions.

The note of the allies was sent after the receipt of a German communication on the subject which was termed "insolent to a degree." In this communication Germany is said to have disregarded totally the long series of notes of complaint sent by the allies and to have declared she was glad to learn the allies were about to end their military control and permit Germany to revert back to normal.

The note also ignored formal allied representation to the Berlin Government of Sept. 29 consequent on the large number of acts of aggression against the allied military in their work of inspection.

The allied note demands an apology and reparations for recent incidents at Passau and Stettin.

Vote of Confidence to Mussolini.
Rome.—The Italian Chamber of Deputies, by a strong vote of confidence given the new Government of Benito Mussolini, the Fascist leader, placed the seal of legality upon a Government which three weeks ago was considered by the then ruling authorities as a rebellion and revolution. The vote was 204 to 116.

Wont you please help us, citizens and business men of Knox City, to make The Journal an asset to your business, your town and your community? It takes news, too, as well as business, to do this. (4) Appoint a Big Music Committee to work with the Social and Home Entertainment Committees and organize support the Band and work with the school by the School Superintendent, teachers and arrange for musical organizations in the city. Urge better and more music in the churches, schools

and throughout the community.

(5) Appoint a big Civic Pride Committee to see that there is a united movement for the beautifying the city. To arrange for a week of cleaning up the town, planting trees and lawns and painting the buildings. To arrange to give prizes for the best kept front and back yards.

(6) A big Playground and Recreational Committee to arrange for playground equipment for parks and school campus and to arrange for organized play and a playground supervisor.

(7) To appoint a Community and Sales Committee to see that one does not get apart from the community, and get together and help each other.

(8) To appoint a Community Building Committee to see that the community has a place to meet and get together.

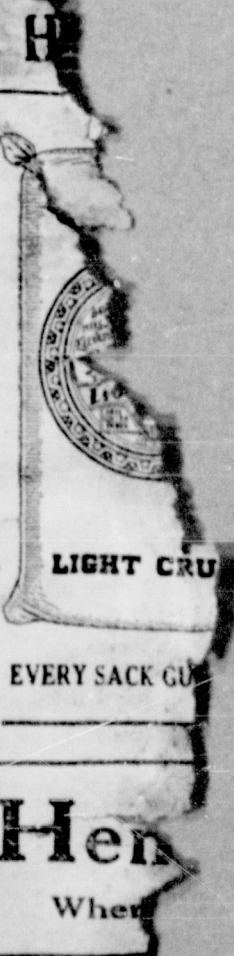

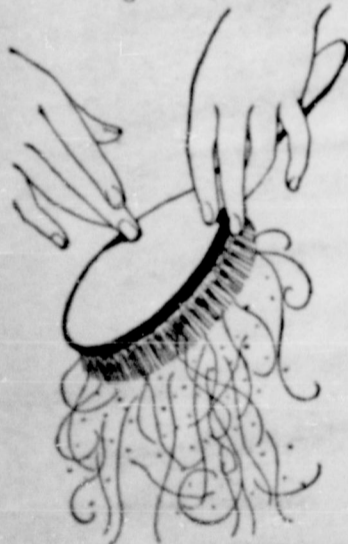

Truth in Assertion There Cannot Be the One Without the Other.

Therein Lies the Particular Betterment to All Men in the Devout Feeling and Celebration of Thanksgiving.

"He that urges gratitude pleads the cause of both God and men, for without it we can neither be sociable nor religious," says the pagan philosopher, Seneca. Thanksgiving, then, if this be true, is not only an act of worship, but an influence for social advancement. Gratitude is said to be the rarest of virtues, yet it exists, and it runs like a golden chain throughout society, binding men together. Nor is it as rare as we are likely from experience and observation to think it is. False gratitude may be eloquent, but it is not easy to express real gratitude in words. "No metaphysician ever felt the deficiency of language so much as the grateful," and through that deficiency gratitude is often dumb. Neither is conduct a true test, for circumstances may deny the opportunity of its expression, or conflicting circumstances may prevent its expression when opportunity arises. There is much gratitude in the world, between men and men, for which evidence is lacking, yet there is probably no man who cannot recall a feeling of gratefulness within himself which he never voiced and for favors which he never required. Knowing more of our own thoughts and feelings than we do of those of others we are likely to think the quality of gratitude is our peculiar possession, and cynically to agree with Rochefoucauld that "gratitude in the generality of men is only a strong and secret wish to receive still greater benefits." Undoubtedly there is much on the surface to justify that view, but while the quality of real gratitude may vary considerably in its strength there are few if any who are wholly lacking, and the mere consciousness of it makes it a potent force in the social advancement of man. Whether thanksgiving be expressed or withheld it is an influence for betterment within every one of us, for the feeling toward others is the test of our souls.

And that effect may be collective as well as individual. We are today a nation engaged in thanksgiving. We are, in totality, a hundred million souls expressing gratitude to Him for His blessings to us as a people. If that is a mere formality it is nothing—it is worse than nothing.
